FOWLER'S BANK ACCOUNTS ORDERED TO BE PRODUCED

Insurance Commission Prevents Attempt to Conceal Them—Ottawa Journal, Independent Conservative, Indicts Foster, Fowler, Pope and Others as Grafters and Reads Them Out of Public Life.

TORONTO, Oct. 2.—C. A. Masten, K. C., acting for the Bank of Nova Scotia, made what proved to be an unsuccessful attempt to limit inquiry into the sale of the Okeanogan Lumber Co., as financed by George W. Fowler before insurance commission this morning. Yesterday Shepley had asked the lawyer for all checks, deposit slips, accounts, vouchers and any documents connected with accounts held in the bank by Geo. W. Fowler. Masten argued before the commissioners that their power was very limited. He said section B, of the order in council creating the commission, restricted their jurisdiction to the Union Trust Co. and the Okeanogan Co. could be called such, and the checks which were deposited in the Bank of Nova Scotia could not affect the Foresters, the company under investigation. As his client was away Masten said he would have to proceed on strictly legal lines, and as the documents were irrelevant to the inquiry he did not feel called upon to produce them.

G. F. Shepley, Dominion counsel, said that the books must be produced. The commission adjourned till this afternoon to give the lawyers a chance to get them. Judge McLaughlin said he would have to repeat his former ruling, that the documents were relevant and must be produced. John M. McWhinney, acting manager for the Union Trust Co., was placed on the stand. He brought with him the investment ledger of the Union Trust Company and a map, showing what Northwest land they had bought. The company was engaged in there were vouchers, etc., relating to \$225,000 put into lands there by the Trust Company. An account of shares in bond investments was asked for, and witness said he could produce the papers relating to the investments. Shepley asked for minutes of shareholders' meetings in 1927 relating to increase in the Standard Bank loan, the further loan from the Traders' Bank, the inspection committee's increase on the directors, the all of fifty per cent. capital for the northwest lands and many more. When the commission resumed this afternoon they made another adjournment till tomorrow morning to enable Shepley to visit the Bank of Nova Scotia and examine the books.

OTTAWA, Oct. 2.—The Ottawa Journal (Independent Conservative) tonight prints a strong editorial condemnation of the Foster-Fowler land transaction with Foresters' funds. Under the title "Graft" the Journal says: "A considerable time has elapsed since evidence given before the Insurance Commission indicated that a number of prominent men, some very well known in politics, Hon. The Paris immortals will have to do a vast amount of work over to catch up on this record. At the present rate of progress the academy dictionary will be completed in 250 years—or, perhaps, 200. If the new official spelling of the United States is ignored. The first edition of the academy dictionary was begun in 1655 and finished in 1658. The last edition up to the one now in progress, occupied forty years, and was begun in 1535. The slow progress of the 'immortals' brings to mind the story of Burford, the naturalist, and the crab. The wisecracker of the day puzzled how to define a crab in their dictionary. They finally voted to describe it as 'a fish which walks sideways.' Burford was sent for and his opinion asked. The 'forty' were more discomfited when the naturalist replied: 'Well, except for the fact that the crab is not a fish and does not walk sideways, it is a good description.'

ZION RENT BY FACTIONS

PROSELYTERS AT WORK

Voliva, Disgusted by Developments, Said to be on Point of Abandoning Field.

CHICAGO, Oct. 2.—Zion City seems to be the scene of another upsurge of the dream that Dowie, the head of the religio-industrial community founded and lost by John Alexander Dowie, is being resurrected. It is said to be on the point of abandoning the strenuous battle he has made for the perpetuation of Zion.

It is conceded that if he takes this step, the last vestige of hope for realization of the dream that Dowie and his followers shared will have been shattered, and the property of the once thriving community will go under the hammer, leaving nothing to those who enthusiastically joined the enterprise.

The greatest asset that Zion City could boast—the unity of the people—is being disrupted by schism, jealousy and factionalism, and it is this condition that has made Voliva waver in his efforts to restore the peace and prosperity broken by Dowie's ruthless mismanagement.

Overseer Voliva, it is expected, will soon make plain his position to the people. He already has given a tentative ultimatum to the officers of the church. He demands the undivided loyalty and support of officers and people alike, and if he is to continue the fight, those who are now charged with responsibility for the present crisis must surrender completely or there will be a wholesale ousting of officers and members.

The trouble may be summed up in one sentence: Zion City is prophetic- ally and financially a failure. From within the church itself and from far and near outside have appeared proselyters who are scrambling for the fragments that remain, from the explosion which ended Dowie's dream and placed Voliva in power.

A variety of cults and creeds are represented and meetings are held nightly by self-proclaimed prophets and messengers whose teachings, while not widely divergent from the faith proclaimed by Dowie, still tend to breed discontent and disorganization among the rank and file.

NEW "DREADNOUGHT"

Will be More Powerful Than the First.

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—In a special cable from London today, the New York Herald has the following: "Preparations are, it is understood, being made for the building of the new 'Dreadnought' at Davenport, under the supervision of officials who have been studying the first 'Dreadnought' now at Portsmouth. A fresh record is to be attempted in building this vessel, and it is hoped that it will be launched within six months after the laying of the keel. If this is accomplished, it will be the first 'Dreadnought' to be built in America. It is enough to make old naval constructors turn in their graves, particularly as the new 'Dreadnought' is to be a more powerful engine of war than the first.

I learn that her plans are already practically prepared. In view of the extraordinary result of the heavy gun trials of the new battleship 'Hibernia,' this week, the gunnery trials of the 'Dreadnought' will be awaited with much interest. In fact, the incident referred to may, it is said, have a far-reaching effect on the future construction of armament or warships, especially as regards the main battery.

During the 'Hibernia's' trials, the conclusion resulting from single-gun firing was so great that the battleship was seriously damaged, and several members of her gun crews were temporarily disabled. The 'Hibernia' returned to Plymouth Sound, after firing half her quarter's allowance of full service charges from her four twelve-inch and four 9.2-inch guns, and she reported serious results in consequence of concussion. Cordite was used, and the black blast was so terrific that it was only with great difficulty that the crew could finish their practice. Several men were bleeding at the nose and ears when the firing was over. The quarter-deck is reported to have buckled so violently that the hoisting with the iron plates of the after turret is covered, yawned in places, ventrators and other deck fittings were strained, and glass in the quarter deck stowage was shattered. The 'Hibernia' carried the latest pattern mark X guns of 50 calibre, and the weapons were discharged singly. The 'Hibernia' which cost \$14,449,939 (\$12,220,000) is one of eight vessels of the 'King Edward VII' class. Of these five—the 'King Edward VII,' the 'Hibernia,' the 'Commonwealth,' the 'New Zealand' and the 'Dominion'—form part of the Atlantic fleet.

PRACTICALLY A PRISON.

Woman Who Left Sandford's Colony Speaks Disparagingly of It.

SHILOH, Me., Oct. 2.—The wife and five children of Fred Killot, a Tacoma, Wash., family, who have been members of the Sandford colony at Durham, have left that institution and are now with friends at Lisbon Falls. Six years ago when Sandford was in Tacoma after recruits he induced Killot, who was a prosperous plumber, to sell out his business and move his family to Shiloh. The proceeds of the sales were turned over to Sandford and the man and his wife and children have been living here since.

When Sandford went to Europe last summer, he took Killot with him. Shortly after their departure, Mrs. Killot wrote to a friend in Tacoma for money and when she received it the elders tried to induce her to give it up. This she refused to do, and she was banished to the Higgins house, one of the farm buildings owned by Sandford. She determined to leave the institution and sent for someone at Lisbon Falls to come and get her trunk. The elders used every means to persuade her to remain, but she would not do so, and her effects were moved across the river to Lisbon. The elders followed her to try to induce her to remain, but without avail. She says the place has been little less than a prison to her since she has been there, and she now proposes to work and support her children until she can get money enough to return to her home. She says she never expects to see her husband again. She is about 45 years old.
