LOVE UNREQUITED, SEVENTEEN YEAR OLD BOY ENDS HIS LIFE.

NEW YORK, Sept. 10.—Because of a difference in religious beliefs that prevented Miguel Werth, 17-year-old, of No. 417 East Ninetieth street, from reciprocating his love, Jesse Weinstein, seventeen years old, committed suicide yesterday morning by shooting himself in the head at the apartment house at No. 403 East Ninetieth street, where he resided with his parents.

Max and Lena Weinstein, the boy's parents, are prostrated by their son's act, and bitter against the girl, who they say led the boy on to love her and then spurned him because of the difference of religion, she being of the Christian faith and he a Hebrew.

The mother said that her son had brooded over it until, without warning, he shot himself.

Jesse left some boy friends at half-past eleven o'clock Saturday night at the corner of First Avenue and Ninetieth street, where he had been laughing and talking with them.

"Goodby, goodby, friends, I am going for a journey," he said.

Something in the strained way with which he bade them good-by, and the peculiar look in his young face, guided them all to ask:

"Where are you going, Jesse?" "You will learn tomorrow," replied Jesse sadly, and hurried toward his home.

His mother, who was in the window looking out for her son, saw him enter the hallway. Shortly afterward she was startled to see her son pass no attention to it at first, and evidently all the other tenants thought it had been a shot fired in the street.

Fifteen minutes later the mother and father went down stairs to look for their boy. They found him lying unconscious, still tightly clasping in his right hand the revolver with which he had shot himself.

His father carried him to their rooms. Neighbors notified the police, and Dr. Jamieson, of the Presbyterian Hospital, was called. The boy was taken to the hospital and the parents were told that there was no hope of his living. At one o'clock he died without regaining consciousness.

"My son died for love," said the heart-broken mother yesterday. "His heart was broken by a 17-year-old girl—some school-girl with her skirts at her heels—had asked her mother not to let her associate with my son. I felt that she would do as she did—spurn his honest, manly affection because he was a Hebrew."

Miss Weinstein's father denied that the girl was in any way responsible for the boy's death, and said that the bereaved parents were making a ridiculous statement. He said the mother and her mother had been in the country for two months, but that they would soon be home.
