

supporting this mission. Now there was no experiment about it; it was an established and successful institution. It has opportunities for good which much older missions do not enjoy.

Rev. Mr. Matheson addressed the meeting on the adaptation of the gospel to mankind.

Rev. Mr. Patterson, of Bedeque pointed out a number of motives for consecration to the missionary cause.

Rev. Mr. Sutherland in a short but energetic speech showed that missions preserve life, zeal, and activity in a church. God has blessed those churches most which have most devoted themselves to missionary enterprises.

PRESBYTERIAN.—A new Church recently erected on the West Branch, East River, by the congregation in connexion with the Presbyterian Church of Nova Scotia, was opened for divine service on the 26th ult. A large concourse of people assembled on the occasion. The Church thus opened is a large and handsome edifice, and reflects much credit on the congregation which, though small in numbers, has put forth most creditable exertions in its erection. It is 75 feet long by 45 wide, is completely finished, with an end gallery, and is calculated to seat 700 persons. Total cost \$900.

SOUTH CAROLINA.—A correspondent of the *Southern Baptist* gives an account of the baptism of two hundred and twenty-three rejoicing converts, at Beaufort, S. C., in the presence of thousands of interested spectators, most of these conversions are the fruits of the revival, which has been prevailing among the colored people for the last five or six months, and which was commenced and has been carried on chiefly through the efforts of the Church at that place. Since this interest commenced, that is within the last three months, three hundred and fifty persons have been baptized, and there is yet no abatement of the work. The correspondent adds further, that the baptism, though performed with all due deliberation, occupied only an hour and five minutes. "And thus we have it actually demonstrated, that the three thousand on the day of Pentecost could easily have been baptized by the twelve Apostles—each taking two hundred and fifty,—in an hour and thirteen minutes?"—*N. Y. Chron.*

Rev. William P. Everett, formerly a resident of this City has accepted an invitation to become Pastor of the Second Baptist Church, Williamsburg, New York.

Mr. E. was a member of the Granville street church, in this City, kept his hat store opposite the Ordnance gate, and has many sincere friends and well wishers in Halifax.—*Chronicle*

The *Baptist Almanac* for 1858 gives the following as the total of Baptists in the United States at the present time:—Associations, 545; churches, 11,039; ordained ministers, 6,648; licentiates, 942; baptized in 1856, 61,771; total number of members, 897,718. In the British Provinces there are 18,812, and in the West India islands 36,050, making the total number of regular Baptists in North America 962,580. They have in the United States 31 weekly periodicals, 16 monthly and 1 quarterly. They have 33 colleges and 11 theological institutions. The contributions to the several national benevolent societies conducted by the Baptists, for the last fiscal year, was \$392,475.

Brother John Hughes, who left this Province to take up his residence in Minnesota, has returned. The grasshoppers are making such sad havoc in the section of Minnesota where he was, that the most serious alarm is felt in relation to the issue.

We shall be glad to know that our brother has decided to remain permanently in his own native land. Surely the Gospel field here calls for more faithful laborers, and if we have some drawbacks to prosperity which are not found in the "far west," we are not likely to be eaten up this year, at all events by grasshoppers.—*Visitor.*

The Baptist Union.

This body which stands as the representative of the Denomination in Great Britain, held its Annual Meeting at Nottingham, during the past month. An important movement which has been the subject of discussion for some time past, was virtually carried into effect—that of combining the two sections known by the terms Particular and General Baptists.

After the transaction of the business of the Union a public meeting was held for the purpose above referred to. The *Freeman* speaks of it as highly gratifying to all concerned.

"It was delightful to us, therefore, to wit-

ness the spirit of unity which pervaded the meetings last week. As one of the speakers truly remarked, it did not then seem as if there were any such distinctions as that of General and Particular Baptists. All met as brethren, and as brethren parted; and from first to last there was nothing but the utmost love and brotherliness—not so much expressed in words, after the modern fashion, as shown by the ardent desire of common objects, and the self-forgetting pursuit of the same great ends. We cannot but argue well for the future from the success of these meetings. Altogether there was a spirit of joy and gladness manifested by the brethren, at once the result of the love they felt for each other, and the recognition of the blessings with which their labours had been favoured by the Great Head of the church."

The following resolutions were severally moved and spoken to by Ministers of the two bodies, and unanimously carried.

"That this meeting, consisting largely of ministers and members of churches connected with the General and Particular Baptist denomination, gratefully acknowledges the vital unity which prevails among them, through their common regard to 'one Lord, one faith, and one baptism,' and rejoice in the opportunity of cultivating and expressing their sincere mutual love."

"That it would have been highly gratifying to this meeting, if the Committee of the British and Foreign Bible Society had by restoring their patronage to translations of the Scriptures effected by Baptist missionaries, healed a breach, always causeless, and now of long standing; but that, since that has not been so, it is, in the judgment, of this meeting, imperative on all churches of the Baptist denomination to render an enlarged and persevering support to the efforts of the Bible Translation Society."

"That this meeting fraternizes in the most cordial manner with their brethren comprehended in the German Baptist Associations, and feels in common with them the undisguised and inveterate hostility with which they are assailed; that the meeting rejoices in the success with which God so graciously crowns their labours, and in the blended firmness and patience with which they have been enabled to endure persecution."

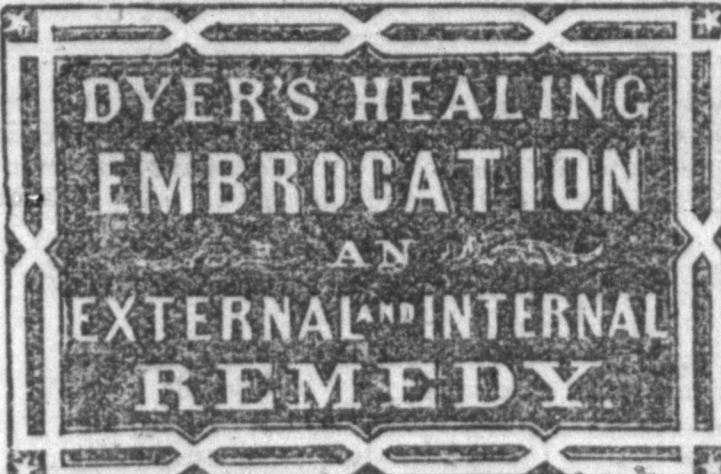
