

General Trollope, and his Ade-de-Camp Capt. Armstrong, were among the passengers by the steamer Niagara from Boston this morning. Upon the landing of the General a salute of 11 guns was fired from the Citadel, in honor of his arrival. Shortly afterwards Sir Gaspard and Suite went on board, when the Niagara sailed for Europe.—*Express*.

On Monday evening last the sale of preference of pews in the Brunswick Street Church took place. About fifty were thus disposed of, and the sum of £. 750 realized. The remaining pews will be let on Friday evening, March 5th.—*Westeyan*.

RAILWAY ACCIDENT.—It will be seen by our Parliamentary Report that a rather serious accident occurred on Wednesday last. A locomotive was on its way up with a number of platform cars, for the purpose of bringing down wood. Near the 8 mile house a switch had not been properly adjusted and the consequence was the locomotive and trucks ran off the rails and dashed against a rocky bank, destroying a fine new engine which cost £4,500. The trains did not run on Thursday and Friday in consequence of the obstruction on the road. Provisionally no life was lost. Mr. Boyd, the Engineer, was slightly scalded, and a boy was much bruised.

MISSING.—A man named Martin Barry has been missing for some days from his residence, Victoria Street. The unfortunate man left his house at night, only partially clad, while suffering from the effects of drink, and it is much feared, has made away with himself.

[Since writing the above we learn that the body of Mr. B. was found among some pipes in one of the buildings attached to the Gas works. The effect produced on the man who discovered the corpse was so powerful as to throw him into convulsions.]—*Sum*.

THE QUEEN VS. KENNEDY.—Kennedy who was last Summer convicted of Murder, at Windsor, but recommended to the merciful consideration of the Executive authorities, has received a conditional pardon. The Executive have commuted the death penalty for the two years imprisonment in the Provincial Penitentiary.

The damage done to the new Barracks by the explosion of the Magazine last summer, is said amounts to no less than £2,500.

FIRE AT AMHERST, Feb. 27.—A House and barn belonging to Martin Black, at this place, were burnt down this forenoon. No insurance.

MURDER AT GUYSBORO.—*Gaysboro, Feb. 23rd, 1858.*—A man named John Griffin, in coming out of Church last evening, tripped up, in a joke, a mulatto man named Charles Devos, who, on getting up, stabbed Griffin, which caused his death in ten minutes. The murderer has not yet been arrested.

FIRE AT WALLACE.—*Wallace, Feb. 20, 1858.*—A house belonging to William B. Oxley, Esq., was discovered to be on fire this morning, and notwithstanding efforts made to save it, was burnt to the ground. All the furniture was saved. The building was one of the finest in Wallace, and not insured.

The *Bridgetown* papers give an account of a melancholy state of a family named Dougherty, one of whose members, a child of 3 years old, had died. An inquest was held and the jury brought in the following verdict:—

"That through the inclemency of the weather and the wilful and inhuman treatment of Jane Dougherty—and by no violent ways or means whatsoever to the knowledge of the Jury the said child did die."

Another little girl of nine years old was lying on a bed of straw, wretchedly clad, with a very large sore on her back (occasioned by a burn) her feet frozen, having lost three toes on one foot, and a part of the heel on the other.

The Rev. N. Vidito delivered an able lecture on Temperance, last week, before a large audience under the auspices of the Olive Branch Division of the Sons.

The Barque *Eclipse*, owned by Thomas Allen, Esq., of Yarmouth, went ashore on the Shetland Islands after encountering heavy gales. *Eclipse* was bound for Madras with a cargo of coals.

The Yarmouth Harmonic Society advertised a Sacred Concert for Thursday, February 18th.

Mr. A. M. Gidney, delivered a lecture on Intellectual Pursuits, before the Yarmouth Mutual Improvement Association. He was also engaged to lecture again this evening on Language.

An INQUEST was held at the Sydney Mines, on Friday, the 12th inst., before L. Robertson, Esq., Coroner, on view of the body of William Johnston, a native of England, aged 23 years, who came to his death whilst lowering bales of Hay from the surface into the Coal Pit at the Sydney Mines, when missing his footing he was precipitated down the shaft of the pit. The unfortunate man's arms and back were broken. He has left a wife and one child to lament his untimely end. The deceased bore the character of an industrious, steady man.

Verdict in accordance with the foregoing facts.—*Cape Breton News*.

Large quantities of very superior coals are said to be raised at the Albion Mines. Good seams of coal are said to exist in the vicinity of Pictou town, and that attempts will shortly be made for the purpose of ascertaining the value of the opinion.

A steam hod-carrier has been invented and is in constant employment in Philadelphia. It performs quietly and cheaply the work of twenty men.

New Brunswick.

The LEGISLATURE was opened on the 10th inst. One of the most important items in His Excellency's Speech was the following:—

"The subject of Education will necessarily occupy your attention, and will, I doubt not, receive from you that calm and careful consideration which its importance demands."

A motion was made on the same day by Mr. Allen condemning the late appointment of Sergeant-at-Arms, contending that it was not properly an Executive appointment. This led to a debate which occupied that and the following day. The Government were, however, sustained by a majority of seven.

On Wednesday, the 17th, a bill relating to the currency was agreed to in the Lower house, which makes the American, Spanish and Mexican dollars and half-dollars legal tender, for a sum not exceeding fifty shillings. At present, English silver is the only legal tender. Progress was reported, after some discussion, on a bill relating to co-partnership. It requires persons doing business under the style of "& Co." to file a certificate in the Registry Office of the names of the parties composing the firm, within a specified time, under a heavy penalty. A bill was introduced to amend the Act relating to highways in Portland. On Friday, a bill was introduced by Mr. Steadman to abolish the Inferior Courts of Common Pleas in the Province. The debates were ordered to be printed in French.—On Monday the house was occupied with the important question as to the number of sleighs which should be employed for the use of the members. At a late hour in the afternoon it was decided that two should be engaged.—An attempt was made yesterday to expunge these proceedings from the journals, but without success. A bill was introduced to abolish Judge's fees in the Supreme Court.

The number of inmates under treatment in the Provincial Lunatic Asylum of New Brunswick, for the year 1857 was 227; of these, 28 were discharged recovered—six much improved; fifteen improved, five unimproved, and twenty-four died; leaving 149 in the institution on the 31st October last. The total expenditure of the Commissioners, was £5,374 6s. 4d., of which the Province paid £4,000; £166 less than the preceding year.

The FREDERICTON correspondent to the *Leader*, writing on Sunday evening, says:—

This morning the city was alarmed by the fire-bells. I say the city, for I heard nothing of them till church time. About half a block, commencing at the Barker House alley and ending at Regent Street, was consumed, and, melancholy to relate, two persons perished in the flames. I regret further to say that this fire is said to be the result of carelessness, arising from intemperance, and that the two deceased were supposed to have caused the calamity. The property destroyed is perhaps £2000, and the insurance does not cover more than three hundred pounds. Something, I hear, will be done for the sufferers, by way of public subscription.—*Christian Visitor*, Feb. 17.

STEAM COMMUNICATION WITH QUEBEC AND THE GULF SHORE.—A correspondent at Moncton informs us that the steamer to ply between Quebec and Shediac, weekly, will be ready for service the coming season, and also another to connect the principal ports on the Gulf Shore with Shediac. We are happy to learn this intelligence, indicating as it does the progress of New Brunswick notwithstanding the depression of trade.—*Borderer*.

Acadia College.

I learn that Acadia College is in pecuniary difficulties. This is nothing new in the history of institutions of learning, or of other benevolent organizations. The usefulness of this seat of learning must be acknowledged by every unprejudiced person, particularly so to the Baptist denomination; and therefore ought to be sustained by it. To shut up the College, even for a short time, whilst reflecting on what further is to be done, would be ruinous. It can be sustained without much difficulty if a little zeal is felt in the matter. Some of your Correspondents propose sustaining, by £5 annual subscribers, till the endowment notes be collected and invested. This is, I think, a good plan, but he aims at too low a sum. We want £750 to pay three professors—leaving all of the endowment to be invested, interest on it to be added to meet losses and deductions for bad debts. We have three Associations—let £250 each be raised in the Western and Central, and £150 in the Eastern, then £100 might be reckoned on from N. B. and P. E. I. Some of our large churches would easily make £100. So to pick out three or four largest churches in each Association would make the sum small to each. Perhaps a better plan can be thought of; the Governors will, I presume, shortly determine. I dare say they will gladly receive suggestions from any quarter.
