United States.

A FREE LIBRARY AND LECTURE-ROOM FOR WORKING WOMEN has been started in New York. At the first public meeting called to promote its establishment £2000 were subscribed. It is stated that there are not less than 80,000 working women in the City of New York. Mrs. E. S. Powell has been the principal means of awakening an interest in their behalf. It is now taken up by Mayor Teiman and other influential gentlemen.

POISONED.—Patrick McCormick, a lodger in the Bowery Hotel, died suddenly from the effects of arsenic, which he had purchased to kill rats, and which became mixed with some candy in his pocket by the leaking of the paper containing it.—*Life Ills.*

INDICTMENT OF OFFICIALS.—A large number of ex-officio-holders have been indicted on various charges of malfeasance, such as conspiracy to cheat, fraud, perjury, false pretences, violation of city ordinances, misdemeanors, and other technical peccadilloes, which seem to be rapidly becoming the rule rather than the exception with such men as manage to get themselves into the places where the people's money is to be handled. Warrants have been issued for the arrest of just one score of the "powers that were."—*Id.*

FANTASTICALS.—The Irishtown Rangers, a company of Fantasticals from the Fifth Ward, Brooklyn, paraded yesterday, and marched to Flushing for target practice. They were dressed in grotesque uniforms, and presented altogether a novel appearance. Their band consisted of a hand organ, tin trumpets, pans, etc. The target was ornamented with curious devices, and instead of muskets augers were used by the men, blindfolded. The one who bored nearest the bull's eye won the prize.—*Id.*

BURNED TO DEATH.—Two men and twelve horses were burned to death by a fire which broke out on Thursday evening of last week in the stables in rear of No. 494 Sixth Street.—*Id.*

HIGH TIDE.—On Monday of last week, the prevalence of easterly winds caused the water of the Bay to overflow several streets near the Battery. Some damage was done to property in the cellars, and an immense number of wharf rats found a watery grave. The tide has not been so high since 1850.—*Id.*

THE ATLANTIC CABLE.

VALENTIA, October 15.—Nothing stirring beyond the fact that the cable between the island and the mainland, which belongs to the British and Irish Magnetic Telegraph Company, again failed on the 12th, and although the weather was far from fine yesterday, it was under-run by their agent, Mr. Walker, and found to have broken or been severed about ten yards nearer the island than the last time. To-day, if fine, it is to be again spliced; in the meantime, Mr. Walker has now and then to cross over to the mainland, where the iron hut forms an office, to see if there are any messages waiting at Killarney. It is still quite possible that the damage may be near shore, notwithstanding the contrary opinions of Professor Thomson, Mr. Varley, Mr. Henley, &c. One thing is very certain, if the new shore end, when laid, does not improve matters, the season is too far gone to do anything more this year, although signals from Newfoundland were evident yesterday afternoon. The Atlantic Telegraph staff at present consists of the Superintendent, Mr. Bartholomew, and five clerks or assistants, viz., Collett, Kingsford, Calcutta, Bull, and Smith. These latter each daily watch four hours and forty-eight minutes, and the present system is to try and send messages from Valentia at the even hours, say four to five, six to seven, &c., and received at the old Valentia all the staff here have got notice to leave the company on the 30th November, unless anything favourable turns up.

It appears that on the 20th of Sept. the powerful instruments made by Mr. Henley were first used, and intelligible signals were received in Newfoundland on that and the 3 following days. Their very power, however, appears to be fatal to the hope of their being long successfully employed, as the wire must quickly, it would seem, be oxidized and injured immediately at the fault. It is still thought that the injury is nearly 300 miles from the shore, and beyond where it could be successfully raised.

THE PRINCE AND PRINCESS FREDERICK WILLIAM. A letter from Berlin, of October 9th, says:—"In all the intrigues which are taking place for power and influence it is satisfactory to know that the Prince Frederick William keeps most steadily aloof. His royal highness is never seen or heard of except in connection with his military duties, while he and his royal consort, following the dictates of their own good sense, appear to be much more disposed to enjoy their domestic felicity at Babelsberg than to intermeddle with Court politics at Berlin. The services of the Prussian Consul-General in this city are often put in requisition to convey from Queen Victoria to the Princess some token of affection—on one occasion a Japan table of exquisite workmanship is sent, and on another, an African pony of rare beauty—besides many other instances, all tending to prove to the Princess Royal that, though no longer present, she is never absent from a mother's thoughts."

DEAF AND DUMB.—Mr. Thomas Pattison, a deaf and dumb coach painter in Edinburgh, about to emigrate to Australia, was last week entertained by eighty of his friends, labouring under the same privation. An elder of the

Deaf and Dumb Benevolent Society, he was held in high respect; and during the evening he was presented with a copy of Kito's Illustrated Bible. Eloquent and effective speeches were made by the mutes; but as there was no deaf and dumb reporter present, the oratory is not found in the newspapers.

The London Board of Works have taken the first practical step for the main drainage of the metropolis. On Friday they resolved to advertise for tenders to construct the high level sewer on the north side of the great city. This drain will be seven miles and a quarter long, and its estimated cost is 150,000; but its execution will also entail the necessity of continuing the sewer from the river Lea to Barking, which is estimated to cost 464,000.
