DEAF AND DUMB.—On Wednesday morning last quite an interesting interview took place in the House of Assembly. The pupils of the Deaf and Dumb School, with their teachers, Mr. J. Hutton and Mr. Gray, were introduced by the Rev. Mr. Cochran, to the members then present.

A number of questions were put to the pupils for the purpose of ascertaining the progress these poor mutes had made in knowledge and the capability of communicating their thoughts. The Attorney General, Hon. Mr. Young, Hon. Mr. Howe, Hon. J. Campbell, Hon. Mr. Whitman, Messrs. Martell, Bent, and McLearn, and others shewed deep interest in them. They gave ready and intelligent answers to the questions put to them, affording satisfactory evidence that the appropriation last year for this object had been well applied. Twenty-two young persons—more than half of them quite poor—are thus supplied with the means of instruction, and their parents comforted by knowing they are objects of public sympathy.

A public examination of the N. B. Sackville Academy is spoken of in the *Wesleyan* as affording much satisfaction to the visitors present.

In the same paper we find an account of the numbers of members, increase and decrease during the past year, in the several conferences of the Methodist Episcopal Church in the U. States. In 15 Conferences there have been diminutions. In the rest there have been sufficient additions to make a total increase of 21,300 members.

We are pleased to hear that an invitation has been accepted by Professor Hill to deliver in Halifax the lecture on "Nova Scotia and the Nova Scotians," recently given by him at Windsor. The Rev. gentleman has consented to do so in the Easter vacation on behalf of the Athenaeum Reading Room.

On Lord's-day evening Rev. Dr. Cramp delivered a discourse at Wolfville on the life and character of GENERAL HAVELOCK.

The Rev. Mr. Brock, we learn, is preparing a Memoir of the General from papers written by himself and placed in the hands of Mr. B. for that purpose by Lady Havelock.

In our obituary notice of to-day, we record the death of another of our venerable and highly respected inhabitants, the Hon. JOHN MORTON, of Kentville, in King's County. Mr. Morton arrived in this city but a few days since, to enter upon his duties as a Legislative Councillor, and has thus been suddenly removed from a large circle of friends and family connections quite unprepared for the melancholy event. For upwards of thirty years the lamented subject of our notice has occupied a prominent position in the Province, chosen at several successive elections in King's County as their representative, he continued to serve his constituents faithfully and zealously, until he was removed to the Upper House, where he carried with him the same desire to make his services useful to the Province. In public, as well as in private life, the distinguishing features which marked his character, were firmness and consistency of conduct in what he approved. He has left behind him many sincere friends, who regret his removal from amongst them.—*Colonist*.

The House of Mr. John Kilcup, Gore, Douglas, was totally destroyed by fire, with its contents, on the night of 27th February. Besides his furniture, beds, bedding, &c., there was in the house at the time about Ten Pounds worth of timothy seed and all his grain.
