

GENERAL WILLIAMS may be expected in the next steamer en route for Canada.

THE EIGHTH OF JUNE.—The Sons of Temperance are proposing to make an Excursion to Windsor on the Anniversary of the settlement of Halifax. It is intended to make it a fraternal visit to the Temperance friends in Windsor.

THE WELSFORD AND PARKER MONUMENT, we learn, is to be erected on the old burial ground, opposite Government House. Mr. Laing, the Contractor for the Court House, has already made some progress in the work. With a little effort this piece of ground might be made highly ornamental to that very pleasant part of the city.

FATAL ACCIDENT.—A young man named James Sullivan was killed, and another named Roman was, it is feared, fatally injured, at Sydney, C. B., by the bursting of a cannon whilst firing a salute to celebrate the return of Messrs. Caldwell and Bourinot for that County.

Prince Edward Island.

The Legislature was prorogued on the 19th ult. Governor Daly read his Speech, it is said, with much emotion, especially the allusion to his departure from the Island. It closed with the following paragraph:—"In bidding you adieu, I fervently trust that the favor of Divine Providence, which has ever been so signally manifested toward this Island, may ever be continued to it, and conduct its inhabitants to the condition of prosperity and improvement which is ever attainable by the united and harmonious cultivation of such capabilities as are possessed by Prince Edward Island. Farewell."

Her Majesty's assent has been received to the Act passed by the Legislature, excluding all persons holding offices of emolument from seats in the Assembly.

New Brunswick.

The St. John papers contain a rumor that R. Jardine, Esq., has resigned the office of Chief Commissioner of Railways in New Brunswick.

A Saw Mill, four dwelling houses, and a blacksmith's shop, were burnt at Portland, N. B., last week, supposed to be the work of incendiaries.

MUTINY AT SEA.—Captain Freeman, of the ship *Undaunted*, at this port from Boston, reports that on the passage the crew were called on deck, the ship being on a lee shore, and blowing heavy, when some of them refused. In attempting to rouse them out, the Captain was assaulted, and stabbed in the neck, shoulder, and face with a dirk, and the mate knocked down. The principals were secured, and on arriving here, three of them were lodged in Jail. The captain received some rather severe cuts, but none of them, it is satisfactory to state, are of a dangerous nature.—*New Brunswick.*

MELANCHOLY ACCIDENT.—On Tuesday afternoon, about 2 o'clock, while Stephen, youngest son of Stephen G. and Rebecca Blizard, was playing in the vicinity of a pond near Peters' Saw Mill, Carleton, with another little boy, accidentally fell in and was drowned. The kind and humane Dr. Waddell made every exertion to restore life, but the vital spark had fled.—*Globe.*

MELANCHOLY ACCIDENT.—A St. George correspondent sends us the following:—

"Yesterday (Tuesday, 24th instant), six men undertook in a light skiff to go over a rapid in the Magaguadavic River, which the oldest inhabitant of this place has never known to be accomplished. Shortly after reaching the rapids, the skiff filled with water—four men gained the shore with much difficulty, but the other two were drowned; their names are Robert Hall, of Nova Scotia, and Patrick Noonan, of St. George. It is said that one of the drowned men was a superior swimmer, but it is thought that the other grappled with him—and both found a watery grave. Their sad fate is much lamented in this village, as both were steady, industrious young men. Their bodies have not yet been found and probably will not be until the water falls."—*Colonial Presbyterian.*

MELANCHOLY.—A lad some twelve years old The son of a Mr. Day, residing above Woodstock, is supposed to have been drowned a few days since under peculiar circumstances. He rode a horse to the river for the purpose of giving him water, and has not since been seen. It is thought that on the descent of the horse down the bank of the river to the water, which was deep, and running rapidly, and was swept away by the current and was drowned.—*Intelligencer.*

Canada.

There are seven executions to take place in Canada in the course of next month: one in Toronto, one at Merrittsville, three at Brantford, one at Coburg, and one at Belleville.

The Governor-General of Canada has made a demand on the American Government for the surrender of Deputy Marshal Tyler, who shot the Captain of the American brig *Concord*, while lying in Sarnia, Canada.

The wharves at Lachine are completely lined with rafts, and a great part of the St. Lawrence opposite there, is also crowded with them.—They are principally from Ottawa and Hawkesbury. The little village is in a perfect state of bustle; and the hotels and boarding houses are doing a large amount of business. The timber is selling well and readily.—*Montreal Pilot, May 14.*

United States.

The government is seriously prosecuting the enterprise of introducing into the United States the culture of the tea plant. A ship is now on her voyage from Canton to New York, with 60,000 plants, selected with great care by a special agent from the patent office.

EXTENSIVE FIRE.—Fifteen thousand acres of valuable pine trees were totally destroyed by fire in the woods of New Jersey. Several farm houses, barns, etc., were also destroyed, and in some instances the people barely escaped with their lives.

A movement is being made towards the establishment of public drinking fountains in New York.

In one part of London people live in the proportion of 243,000, per square mile; and in part of Liverpool, 460,000. In a portion of Broad-street, Boston, they have only nine square yards for a person, which is equal to 441,552 per square mile.

The *Chicago Herald* states that the wheat has been headed out in the Southern part of that State for some two weeks and is in most excellent condition. The farmers expected to commence harvesting at about the middle of this month, which will be about two weeks earlier than usual in that region.

St. Louis, May 15.—The steamer *Monongahela* and *Edinburgh*, moored on the Illinois shore, opposite this city, caught fire and burned to the water's edge at 3 o'clock this morning. Loss \$38,000, insured in Pittsburgh offices. No freight on either boat.

Mrs. Key, relict of the author of the "Star Spangled Banner," and mother of the late Philip Barton Key, died at Baltimore, a day or two since, at an advanced age.

A correspondent of the *New York Express* reports that the Law students in Gallatin, Tenn., were recently trying the Sikes case in mock court, when the young man who took the part of Sikes, jerked out a pistol which he did not know was loaded, and shot his most intimate friend, who was taking the part of Key, through the chest. The shot was purely accidental. Mortification set in, and there was no hopes of Burk's recovery.

Rev. Dr. Hackett is now on his way home, expecting to reach the United States early in June.

THE PILGRIM MONUMENT at Plymouth is progressing. Nearly a thousand tons of granite have been delivered upon the hill in the vicinity of the proposed Monument to the Forefathers.

The *Detroit Advertiser* states that 70 fugitive slaves arrived in Canada by one train, last week from the interior of Tennessee. But a week before a company of twelve arrived. Nearly the same time, one of seven and another of five safely landed on the free soil of Canada, making 94 in all, worth at the present market price the handsome sum of \$94,000.
