THE UNION PRAYER MEETINGS continue to be largely attended, and increasingly interesting. On Monday morning a request was handed in on behalf of three men confined in the Penitentiary, who were convinced of their lost condition, and desired the prayers of God's people, that his mercy might be extended to them.

After a few suitable remarks, on the state of those separated from society for crime, and the efficacy of intercession, prayer was offered, the hymn:—

"Plunged in a gulf of dark despair
We wretched sinners lay, &c."

was read, and the congregation joined in singing the two latter verses,—

"O for this love that rocks and hills
Their lasting silence break!
And all harmonious human tongues
The Saviours praises speak," &c.

An excellent spirit pervaded the meeting. Earnest prayers were offered, and very brief remarks made by eight or ten persons.

WHAT PRESBYTERIANS IN CANADA THINK OF DAYS OF THANKSGIVING.—"Gov. Head, of Canada, having set apart the 3rd day of November, as a day of Thanksgiving, in accordance with the custom in the States, the United Presbytery of Toronto accept the appointment, though rather ungraciously, saying, 'that while they hold it an important Christian duty to obey magistrates, they cannot recognize the right of civil rulers to interfere in matters of religion.'—*N. SUPREME COURT.—The Trial of Preepor was not proceeded with on Wednesday last, as expected, in consequence of only eleven jurors answering to their names. It was therefore put off till Friday, when proceedings were commenced, by the Hon. Attorney General introducing the case. Three witnesses were examined on that day. There were, we understand, near fifty witnesses summoned. Counsel for the prisoner the Hon. W. Young, Hon. J. McCully, and W. Sawers; for the prosecution, Hon. Attorney General and W. Johnston. At the close of each day the jury were taken in charge by a constable and kept together, much against their desire. The jury consisted of Charles C. Tropelet, Thomas Morris, Archibald Morton, E. W. Chipman, David Shepherd, John Parker, Junr., Eyan McPhee, W. M. McCulloch, Alex. Dow, John McNob, H. G. Laurillard, John Geldert. Mr. Tropelet was chosen Foreman.

The following Jurors were challenged by the prisoner: Owen Donohoe, P. S. Kelly, George E. Morton, John Dunphy, Richard, Phelan, Dennis Shea, John Murphy, Wm. Casey.

The receiving of evidence was brought to a close yesterday morning and the Hon. Mr. Young occupied the afternoon in his address to the Jury. It is likely to be brought to a close to-day.
