The words of James are in point 'Behold how great a matter a little fire kindleth.'" We fully endorse that opinion, and are thankful at all times for good advice, especially for lessons of "caution." We would suggest however, that the danger lies in bringing combustible materials into too great propinquity to the spark. Let our brother be careful that in his efforts to extinguish the "little fire" he does not pour on oil instead of water. We assure our brother that we shall not allow "unprovoked accusations against pastors or editors" to "find a place" in our columns. We trust they may be as rare in New Brunswick.

PROVINCE OF NOVA SCOTIA.

By his Excellency the Right Hon.

the Earl of Mulgrave, Lieut. Governor, Commander-in-Chief in

MULGRAVE and over Her Majesty's Province

of Nova Scotia and its Dependencies, etc., etc.

WHEREAS, upon reference to the trade returns annually made and laid before Parliament, there are reasons to believe that the payment of duties is in many cases evaded, and that the public revenues are in consequence largely diminished—

I do therefore, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, hereby command and enjoin upon all Collectors of Impost and Excise, all Seizing Officers, Tidewaiters, Magistrates, Sheriffs and others authorized to collect and protect the Public Revenue of the Province, to be vigilant and efficient in the discharge of their duties, and all other Her Majesty's liege subjects to be aiding and assisting in the prevention of smuggling and the carrying on of contraband trade, it being the fixed determination of Her Majesty's Government to protect fair dealing in all lawful ways, and to punish parties engaged in illicit traffic by the confiscation of smuggled and contraband goods, and the infliction of fines and penalties as the law directs.

Given under my Hand and Seal at Arms, this Twelfth day of June, in the 23rd year of Her Majesty's reign, A. D. 1860.
