

BIOLOGY AND THE TOOTHACHE.—Dr Stone is again astonishing and amusing the people of Halifax by his Phrenological examinations and Biological exhibitions. This is but one of the very surprising experiments, for the perfect integrity of which the numerous highly respectable individuals present can vouch, amongst whom we may take the liberty of mentioning the name of our respected and skillful fellow-citizen, James Palmer, Esq. (Custom-house Quay), who can fully bear us out in the foregoing statement. As a professional man his testimony is invaluable in such a case. Yesterday evening the second lecture of the course was given, and this evening (Wednesday) concludes the last of the series.
