News Summary.

THE Presidential electioneering campaign in the neighbouring Union has had a significant indication as to what party is likely to be triumphant. The results of the election in Maine have shown that the Republican Candidates there have a large preponderance of popular favor. Every one of the Republican Candidates for Congress were elected. Mr. Washburne was chosen for Governor by a majority of 20,000 votes. It is commonly remarked that "As Maine goes so goes the Union." The strife of parties will not be likely to be allayed by this augury. The South will of course be aroused to fiercer hostility.

The Steamship *Melita* arrived at 10 o'clock on Sunday night with freight. She brought news to the 5th inst.

Sardinia was about to interfere in Neapolitan affairs, with troops. The object is to prevent Naples becoming a prey to anarchy, in view of the fall of the Bourbon dynasty. All the disposable vessels of the Sardinian navy are to be sent to Naples. The military preparations at Piedmont are most vigorous. Ancona is declared in a state of siege.

It was expected that Victor Emanuel would ask the Pope to allow Sardinian troops to pass through his dominions for the purpose of aiding Garibaldi. It is doubtful what reply would be given to such request.

Details of executions in Damascus show that individuals of the highest families were guilty, and had suffered the penalty without distinction. 167 additional executions had taken place at Damascus.

LOSS OF THE SCHOONER EMERALD.—The steamer America, which arrived at this port Saturday noon, ran into the schooner Emerald of Barrington, N. S., about four hours after she left Halifax, and sunk her. The steamer struck the schooner on her quarter, and running its bowsprit into the main rigging, held the vessel aloft until the captain and crew, consisting of ten men and a boy, were enabled to scramble aboard the steamer. The passengers and officers of the steamer subscribed \$387, which they presented to the captain.
