N. S. INLAND NAVIGATION.—The Shubenacadie Canal so long talked of is now a reality.—The inclined planes are working with much ease and regularity. The machinery by which the wire-rope is pulled is turned by the water, carried in a race. This rope pulls a heavy carriage for the boats over an iron railroad. There is one lock at the entrance to the first lake. One inclined plane runs from the harbor to the level of this lock; another similar inclined railway is at Marshall's, seven miles above Dartmouth.—These works are well worthy of a visit. A considerable quantity of cord-wood and plaster, we learn, has by this means been brought down from the interior. Several pleasure excursions have gone up on the railway to different points on the shores of the lakes. This will doubtless soon become a favorite resort and afford a delightful variety for excursionists.

We are informed that the quartz-crusher for Tangier, has been shipped on board the "Rosenath," at Glasgow, and will arrive here in a week or two, at the furthest. The want of a crusher is sadly felt by the miners.—*Express*

THE WEST INDIA STATION.—It is stated that Rear Admiral Sir L. T. JONES, K. C. B., on his return from China, will be dispatched to the North American and West India Station, as second in command of the Squadron on that Station.—*The United Service Gazette.*

BURGLARIES.—Mr. Charles Mott's store in Duke street was entered on Friday night last, and \$14 stolen from the money drawer. The thief entered through a skylight in the roof of the building. The boot and shoe store of Mr. James Romans, Hollis street, was also broken into on the same night, and a quantity of goods carried off. The robbers succeed in gaining an entrance in the rear of the building.—*Chronicle.*

THE GREAT EASTERN.—It is rumoured that Prince Alfred is coming out to Halifax in the Great Eastern, which leaves England on the 28th instant.

We are pleased to notice that the first pile for the Public Wharf at Digby, was driven home on Wednesday last.

We have been informed that the steamer *Experiment* will be on the route again between this port, Annapolis, and Bridgetown, for the remainder of the season—commencing next week.

PORT MARIE, JAMAICA, Aug. 22nd.—Arrd, brig Esquimaux, Chisholm, Halifax.

On the night of the 30th ult., when off Cape George, the ship Levi Woodbury, from Havre for Pugwash, ran into a schr from St. Andrews, carrying away her bowsprit and all her spars. The cook of the schooner, a young man belonging to New Glasgow was seriously injured. The schooner was towed into Plaster Cove, where she is being repaired.

The brig Ornate, of (Halifax), from Cienfuegos, with a cargo of molasses, bound to Boston, struck on Crocus Reef night of 16th ult., and soon after became a total loss.—Mr. William Mann, of Kingston, Jam. passenger, and two Chinese, were lost soon after the vessel struck. Two of the seamen were soon after washed off and lost. Their names were John Wilson and Charles Brown. Captain McCulloch the rest of the crew escaped to the Keys on a They landed on old Melacumbe Key, and were kindly received and cared for by Mr. Russell, a worthy planter, alone inhabiting the island.

MILITIA GENERAL ORDER.

HEAD QUARTERS,

HALIFAX, N. S., Sept 3, 1861.

(Circular)

The order concerning the competition for the National Rifle Association's Medal at Halifax, dated August 5th is rescinded as far as regards date and place. The Medal will be shot for at Windsor, on the 1st of October, 1861.

Details will be settled on the ground. Should the weather be unfavourable on Tuesday, 1st of October, the authorities on the spot will postpone the practice with due regard to the convenience of competitors.

A Silver Cup, presented by His Excellency the Earl of Mulgrave, will also be open to the competition of Volunteers belonging to this Province, being certificated effectives by their respective commanding officers. For this prize, five rounds will be fired by each competitor, at 300 yards.

The names of competitors for the Medal and the Cup, will have to be given into this office, on or before Wednesday, the 25th of September, 1861—vide General Order, dated the 8th August, by which companies are directed to select two members each, to compete for the Medal.

A Pool Target will be provided for the use of all comers, which will be placed under proper superintendence, and will be regulated according to the Wimbledon rules. Rifles and ammunition will be afforded, and fifteen pence a shot will have to be defrayed by competitors previous to firing; after deducting ten per cent which will be appropriated towards defraying the expenses, the proceeds will be divided among the competitors, proportioned to the number of bull's eyes individually made. Only the regulation rifles are to be used, and the rifles are to be loaded, capped, and handed to the shooter by the person in charge of the practice, who will have orders to suspend the firing, in case his directions are not promptly and strictly complied with.

In order that regularity be ensured, His Excellency has been pleased to direct, that no Matches, except those above specified, shall proceed on the ground, unless due notice be given beforehand to the Adjutant General of Militia, who will submit the same for approval; such competitors as are approved of will be regularly entered, and targets and ammunition be allowed for them.

As Butts, Targets and Ammunition, will have to be proportioned to the work in hand, and the supply of the latter approximately calculated, applications for the entry of extraneous prizes should be in the hands of the Adjutant General of Militia, by Wednesday the 25th of September.

Should it be found necessary to issue any orders at Windsor, they will be affixed to the Head Quarters of the Commander in Chief, and to the Adjutant General's Tent on the ground, and also be circulated by Volunteer orderlies. By order,
