

THE CENSUS.—It will be seen by the copy of the schedule given in another column that the Census will be taken by each householder filling up a blank form, which will be left at his house previous to the day appointed for taking it. Some difficulty will doubtless be experienced in parts of the country where but few are able to write. The expense to the Province will of course be somewhat increased by this mode, but it will we presume be more thorough and satisfactory than if the enumerators themselves had the whole work to do. Every effort should, and we trust will, be made to render the statistics correct and reliable.

We understand that a Board has been appointed for the purpose of taking the Census but have not learned of whom it is composed, S. Fulton Esq. is the Secretary.

News Summary.

The Imperial Parliament met on the 5th inst., that was opened by the Queen in person. Her Majesty's Speech, which is not a very long one, does not contain any thing of more than ordinary moment, nor is it known as yet that any exciting question will come under discussion, at least very early in the Session. In the present state of Europe however, it is beyond mortal ken to say how soon some question may spring up to arouse the deepest public interest.

The very disorganized state of political feeling throughout Germany, the half-revolutionized condition of Hungary—the jealous watchfulness of Russia and Prussia, lest the contagion of Hungary should break out in their Polish territories—the still unsettled state of Italy, and above all the gigantic, although quiescent armaments of France, ready as it were, like a tiger to spring upon her prey, whatever that may be—all these combined lend a feverish and portentous aspect to the present state of European affairs.

The late king of Naples still holds out at Gaeta, now closely invested by sea and land by the Sarinians, but it is to be hoped that as the reactionary movements which have taken place in one or two parts of his late dominions have wholly failed, his inducements for a longer contest will cease and that he will not uselessly prolong the unnatural contest between his late subjects. Beside this also, his position is becoming untenable from the fierce bombardment of the Piedmontese under Cialdini. The Elections for the new National Parliament for emancipated Italy, to meet shortly at Turin, has taken place, and resulted, in a large majority in favor of the present Ministry of Victor Emanuel, and therefore pledged to the interests of law and order. The new Italian Kingdom will however still be incomplete until Venetia and the remaining part of the Papal dominions shall have been freed from their present despots. The accomplishment of this, though perhaps delayed for some short period, cannot be far off. As regards the Roman Pontiff he is still kept in possession of the small remnant of his temporal power by the French Army in Rome. The moment they are withdrawn that power ceases and the worn out structure of the secular dominion of the Popedom falls to the ground. With free institutions and equal laws and unrestricted religious liberty, there is, to all appearances, under the Divine blessing, a bright future to Italy.

On our own side of the Atlantic nothing further has transpired to throw any decisive light on the probable issue of the Secession movement. The Northern Slaveholding States are not yet committed to it, although no one can possibly conjecture what compromise can be devised to reconcile the conflicting interests of South and North, and heal the rude and sudden breach of the great Federal compact.
