AID TO LANCASHIRE OPERATIVES.—A meeting was held on Monday evening in Temperance Hall—called by His Worship the Mayor by a requisition signed by a large number of merchants of the city, for the purpose of devising means toward this benevolent object. The attendance was large. His Worship occupied the chair. In his opening address he stated that he had, during the day, received the sum of £62 10s. from an anonymous contributor. The meeting was addressed by Chief Justice Young, T. C. Kinnear, Esq., Dr. Tupper, Alderman Trenaman, Hon. B. Wier, Bishop Binney, and A. M. Uniacke Esq.

Resolutions were passed expressing the sense of the meeting, that a liberal subscription is demanded of us towards the aid of our fellow-subjects now suffering so severely.

A large Committee was appointed, with His Worship the Mayor, and the Alderman, to obtain subscriptions and to apply the same by transmission to the Central Committee in England.

About \$10,000 worth of cents, ordered by the Provincial Government, arrived by the Asia on Wednesday last.

At the annual meeting of the Halifax Mechanics' Library Association, held last evening, the following resolution was unanimously adopted.

DROWNED, at the mouth of the Bay of Fundy, by the capsizing of the Schooner Harvest Queen, of Givan Wharf, about 10 o'clock on the night of the 4th inst., Isaac Downey, Second son of Samel and Susanna Downey, of Stronach Mountain, in the 25th year of his age. He is said to have been an active and industrious young man, and his sudden death is much lamented by his afflicted relations and numerous friends.

All the rest on board, namely Capt. Walter Grimes, Elijah Ogilvie, Gilbert Ogilvie, Elias Grimes, (a lad,) of Givan Wharf, Thomas Smith, of Port George, and a man said to be from Prince Edward Island, were likewise drowned. Three of them were seen on the wreck, and heard crying for help; by Capt. Wm. Conley, of the Fanny Givan. He strove to the utmost to rescue them; but the wind blew with such violence that all efforts proved unavailing. May this painful and solemn visitation be sanctified to the spiritual good of sorrowing relatives, and the community at large! How loudly does it call to every one, saying, "Prepare to meet thy God!"

GOLD NEWS.—The last monthly return of the Deputy Gold commissioner at Sherbrooke, shows that 400 tons of quartz was raised at that gold field during the month of September, of which 219 tons were crushed, yielding 515 ounces. Two hundred and sixteen men were at work during the month. At the current price of gold this will give about \$45 a month per man, to every man engaged in mining. Two hundred and four ounces of gold from Sherbrooke were forwarded by the last English steamer.

On Sunday a young man named Patrick Kennedy fell from the bow of a vessel lying in the harbor, and was drowned. The body has been recovered.

The Presbyterian Witness says that a schooner is to be built and equipped in this Province for the New Hebrides Presbyterian mission. It is proposed to raise the necessary sum by subscriptions among the different Sabbath schools throughout Nova Scotia.

New Brunswick.

POLITICAL.—The resignation of the Hon. A. J. Smith as Attorney General, and member of the Executive Council, and the appointment of the Hon. J. M. Johnston, late Speaker of the House of Assembly, to fill his place, are the important political events of the last week. Mr. Smith's opposition to the Intercolonial Railway led him to take the step he has.—*Intelligencer.*

A meeting was held last week in the St. John Supreme Court Room to devise means for affording aid to the suffering operatives in the north of England, about 40 persons were present.

FATAL AFFRAY.—A man, by the name of Hart, was killed on Monday last, by one Sewell, in an altercation about a line fence. The affray took place on the Beckagumic, where both parties resided. A Coroner's Inquest was held, but the exact terms of the verdict and other

particulars we have not learned authentically, Sewell had not been arrested at last accounts, having fled to the woods after the horrible deed was committed.—*Carleton Sentinel.*

THE DOCTORS.—A meeting of the Medical Profession was recently held at St. John, when it was resolved to petition the Legislature for the repeal of all existing acts relating to medicine.
