DREADFUL COLLIERY ACCIDENT AT BARNSgy.—Barnsley has the misfortune to possess me of the most dangerous coal-fields in the bountry, and hence it too frequently happens hat we have to record fatal casualties, -some them of the most appalling character. On fonday morning a terrible disaster took place, wolving a large loss of life. When the miners were at work in Edmonds Main Colliery, Warsboro' Dale, an explosion occurred, the couse being, it is supposed, a shot fired by one of the men. That such a calamity had taken place, soon manifest from the smoke that ascended shaft. Exploring parties immediately desended and rescued several miners, one of whom shrtly afterwards expired.
