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ment from the throne of Greece, supposing
he should ever be elected to it. The for-
ign journals assure us that the English Gov-
ernment has positively declared, both at Athens
and at Paris and St. Petersburg, that Prince
Alfred will not accept the crown.

MISCELLANEOUS.

Lamarine, says a Paris letter, has just received
16,000l. (400,000f.) as the part proceeds of a
lottery, which will pay all his debts, and enable
him to end his days in comfort. The city of
Paris gave him a beautiful purse.

THE GAROTTING IN LONDON.—Vigorous
measures have been taken by the police author-
ities of London to suppress the abominable
garotte outrages which have been so fearfully
prevalent of late. Ticket-of-leave men are
placed under special surveillance, and each di-
vision of police has been reinforced by twenty-
five old and experienced constables, who patrol
the suburbs in couples and out of uniform. It
is consolatory to know that many of the accounts
of the garotte robberies and especially of the
deaths arising from the outrages, are untrue.

MISERABLE DEATH OF A CLAIMANT TO A
FORTUNE OF £3,500,000.—An inquest lately
took place in London as to the cause of the
death of a Mrs. Mobbs. It was proved that the
woman died from disease caused by destitution
and want of the common necessities of life, and
that she had neither shoes nor stockings on
when met on the street before her death. What
rendered this case of more interest was, the al-
legation that deceased was the rightful claimant
of the above large fortune left to her deceased
husband some years ago, but which had become
the object of litigation. A verdict to the effect
that death had been caused by pulmonary
apoplexy, brought on by cold, was rendered.

DREADFUL COLLIERY ACCIDENT AT BARN-
SLEY.—Barnsley has the misfortune to possess
one of the most dangerous coal-fields in the
country, and hence it too frequently happens
that we have to record fatal casualties,—some
of them of the most appalling character. On
Monday morning a terrible disaster took place,
involving a large loss of life. When the miners
were at work in Edmonds Main Colliery, Wars-
boro' Dale, an explosion occurred, the cause be-
ing, it is supposed, a shot fired by one of the
men. That such a calamity had taken place,
was soon manifest from the smoke that ascended
the shaft. Exploring parties immediately de-
scended and rescued several miners, one of whom
shortly afterwards expired. Another part of
the pit was however, inaccessible owing to the
prevalence of poisonous vapour, and here were
suffocated thirty-five other colliers. An enu-
meration of all the pit accidents in the Barnsley
district within the last twenty-one years would
present a frightful picture.

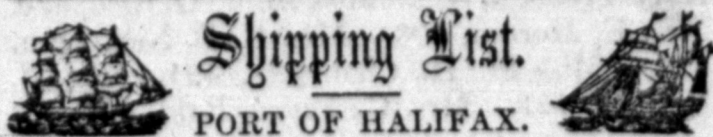
