

London money market firmer. Flour flat—Wheat firmer—Corn firm and advanced 3d.—Provisions dull—Political news unimportant.

The *Daily News* city article says that renewed heaviness prevailed in the stock market on the 29th. The Confederate loan was extremely heavy and experienced a fall of 64 percent, owing partly to the defeat of Early, but chiefly to the prospects of Lincoln's re-election.

ITALY.—Signor Pacino has accepted the post of Minister of Public Works. A letter from the Capt. commanding the troops who fired on the citizens of Turin on the night of the 21st says that the military were not ordered to fire on the people, but that the discharge took place by accident. Some Turinese citizens have published a manifesto stating their conviction of the existing necessity of the country to constitute legal agitation in order to make Parliament aware of motives for opposing the Franco-Italian Convention. The formation of a committee to collect subscriptions in favor of sufferers from disturbances of 21st and 22d is also announced.

A petition against the Franco-Italian Convention will be presented to Parliament.

HARVEST IN BRITAIN.—We learn from the *London Mark Lane Express* that "Wheat has been well secured, but the yield will scarcely be an average. Barley is a fair crop, some very good qualities having been gathered. Oats are not so well spoken of—the yield is very irregular. Beans are a very bad crop, never worse."

The Pope has published a letter to the Polish bishops, denouncing the conduct of the Russian Government.
