The Royal Mail Steamer *Cuba* arrived yesterday morning, but the news received by her mails was not so late as that already at hand by the Atlantic cable.

There will be quite a change effected by the telegraphic operations. The mail steamers will have to obtain news on arriving here, instead of our having to inquire of them as to what is transpiring on the other side of the Atlantic.

The latest news from the Continent of Europe is not of the most hopeful character. The demand of Napoleon for a restoration of territory forbodes further trouble between France and Prussia. This in connection with the activity in the French army will not tend to diminish general anxiety.

The armistice between Austria and Prussia had been extended, and Conferences were to be held at Prague, the Capital of Bohemia, to adjust the terms of Peace. Austria and Italy had also agreed on an armistice of some days, and it was hoped that a general peace between all parties would speedily result. A sharp naval action had taken place in the Adriatic between the Italian and Austrian fleets, in which the former were seriously worsted, and had a large ironclad frigate sunk.

The Congress at Washington has finally closed, without any reconciliation of the differences between the President and the other branches of the Legislature on the reconstruction of the Southern States. It has assumed the character, like most other stirring matters in the United States, of an electioneering question between the two great parties of Republicans and Democrats.
