

in the usual Spanish way of getting rid of their prisoners in their civil broils, by shooting him, appears as yet doubtful, though not improbable. We fear, however, there is small chance of any permanent repose for Mexico. Superstition, ignorance and their not unnatural consequences, misrule and what may be termed a state of chronic insurrection, has kept both Spain and her late vast American Colonies, in such a condition of semi-barbarism and revolutionary change for nearly half a century past, that it is quite impossible to conjecture what any given period of a few months may produce, in any Spanish country. The master minds that may be able to compose and harmonize the discordant elements of society in those unhappy countries are yet to appear, whether in old Spain or among her numerous colonial progeny.

The King of Prussia having got rid of his difficulties with France, through the fortunate intervention of neighboring Powers, appears to be setting himself to work in earnest to organize and consolidate his new domain. There is no doubt a large infusion of constitutional freedom in the present political form of government in Northern Germany, but the conflict is still sharp and constantly occurring between it and the high assumptions of prerogative on the part of the Crown. As a general thing, genuine religious and moral feeling is at a very low ebb throughout Germany, and while this state of things remains any permanent improvement must be slow.

One of the latest and most hopeful cases of national progress and improvement is in Hungary. Ever since the outbreak in 1848 produced by the Emperor of Austria in depriving his Hungarian subjects of the large share of constitutional liberty which they had until then enjoyed, the country has been in a state of irritation and discontent which kept it on the point of revolution. The serious reverses which Austria has lately experienced in her war with Prussia, has however, worked favorably for the Hungarian. The Emperor has found it indispensable to conciliate their good will and has at last consented to restore and secure to them their ancient laws and immunities, and the general character of the people affords a reasonable hope that they will not misuse the advantages they have thus happily regained.

The *Cuba* arrived with the England mails on Sunday evening, making the passage in eight days.

The news had been as usual anticipated by telegraphic despatches. The proclamation declaring the British North American Colonies one Dominion under the name of Canada was published in the *Gazette* of Wednesday, the 29th ult., and appears in another column. The Queen had gone to her Highland home at Balmoral.

The Duke of Edinburgh has left London to join his ship at Marseilles. He is expected to be absent about two years, and will visit the chief ports of our Indian possessions, and the Pegu. After visiting China and Japan he will go to Australia, and probably visit America on his return home to England.

GENTLEMEN,—

HAVING been nominated at a large and influential meeting of the Electors of the County as a Candidate for the General Parliament at Ottawa, I beg now most respectfully to solicit your suffrages at the ensuing Election.

For the eight years during which I have been honored by your generous confidence and support, I have endeavored to study and advance your interests, while I have had some humble share in promoting the prosperity of the country.

I need scarcely remind you of the strenuous efforts made in the Legislature by the opponents of the Government to obstruct and defeat this undertaking from its inception down to the end of the last session of the Assembly; nor need I refer to the unhandsome opposition which it has encountered from the press in their interest, not excepting the local paper of the County; which strangely enough has been among the most bitter of all its opponents; for these facts are patent to all, and will I doubt not be fully appreciated at the proper time; moreover it is known that one at least of those likely to contest the constituency with my colleagues and myself at the approaching General Election has voted against this project in the Legislature, and it is believed that the two candidates likely to be associated with him in the contest are equally hostile to the enterprise in question. Fortunately the most determined efforts of this extraordinary combination could not bar you from the privileges which you are to secure at so early a day.

I need scarcely say to you that I sought not the nomination so handsomely conferred upon me, but that on the contrary, I should have been only too happy to have escaped from the exactions and turmoil of an exciting election contest by myself nominating for the honorable position in question one deservedly popular in the County, and one perchance better qualified to serve you in the General Parliament than myself, and only consented to accept the nomination myself, when it was found that the objections of the valued friend referred to could not be overcome. Having thus placed myself in your hands, permit me again to solicit your hearty and generous support, and be assured that no effort of mine shall be spared in the way of securing a triumph for "Union," and making it what I sincerely believe it is destined with proper management to be, an inestimable blessing to all concerned.

Although a candidate for the General Parliament, I shall not cease to feel a lively interest in local affairs, and acting in happy concert with my colleagues Messrs. Whitman and Foster, the candidates for the Local Legislature, trust it may be in my power still to serve you, to some extent at least, and beg therefore in conclusion to ask for these my colleagues the same measure of support accorded to myself.

TO THE ELECTORS OF THE COUNTY OF HALIFAX.

GENTLEMEN,—

In a few days the House of Assembly will be dissolved, and new elections in the course of the summer will take place for seats in the House of Commons in the Dominion of Canada; and as I have been nominated for one of those seats by my fellow citizens, at a large and influential meeting held at Temperance Hall for that purpose, I beg respectfully to solicit from you a renewal of that confidence with which you have honored me during three successive Provincial Parliaments.

I have now to address myself for the first time of the electors of the Eastern Division of this county. It will be seen by the Act of Union, that both divisions form one Constituency, and I feel I have some claim to their support, for, in the discharge of my public duty, in all that related to the local interests of the county, I have known no east or west.

During the twelve years that I have had the honor of a seat in the Legislature, the Province has enjoyed a remarkable degree of progressive prosperity. Wealth has rapidly increased, and the revenue has always been sufficient to provide for the public expenditure. Without the burden of increased taxation, the coast has been lighted, the rivers bridged, many lines of roads penetrating in every direction opened up, and railways east and west, to grasp the trade of the Gulf of St. Lawrence and the Bay of Fundy, placed under contract, which when completed will confer lasting benefits on the people of this Province. Education has been provided for, and large grants given to steamboats, packets, and ferries.
