A WAIF.—An infant was left at the door of a house in Brunswick St. on Friday night last. It was immediately sent off to the Poor's Asylum. A young woman has been arrested on suspicion of being the mother.

A colored girl named Eliza Munro was found by the police on Friday night last in Albermarle Street. She died as she was being taken to the station. The Coroner's Jury returned a verdict "Died from exposure."

A man named George Parsons has been arrested on a charge of causing the death of a woman named Johanna McCarthy by beating her.

The jury rendered a verdict—"Death caused by injuries received at the hands of George Parsons."

GOLD.—The official returns from the gold districts of the Province for the quarter ending Dec. 31, 1866, have just been published. The total yield amounted to 7086 oz. 15 dwt. and 5 grs., against 6044 oz. 6 dwt. and 5 grs. in the corresponding quarter of 1865.

WINDSOR AND ANNAPOLIS RAILWAY.—We understand that Mr. Brassey, the great English Railway Contractor, has undertaken the building of the above line; and it is expected that the road will be completed as far as Kentville by next fall. The Bridge over the Avon River is to be constructed of iron.—Rep.

A YARMOUTH SHIP IN TROUBLE.—The Greenock Advertiser contains a lengthy description of the perilous voyage of the ship Research, of Yarmouth, N. S., from Quebec to Greenock in 88 days. Her commander, Captain Churchill, has rendered himself famous for the bravery, and ingenuity and seamanlike manner in which he brought his vessel safe into port, although in a very leaky condition. After the loss of rudder, the captain made several jury rudders, one after another being carried away, until at length good fortune rewarded his gallant skill and perseverance; and he found a haven for his tempest tossed and delapidated bark. He had been thrice spoken and supplied with provisions, but still stuck manfully to his charge.

Fifty wrecks were reported last week. This raises the total for the present year to 513.

SAD ACCIDENT AT SPRY BAY.—On Wednesday, the 27th of Feb'y., as George Corner, of Spry Bay, was out in a boat alone, off Taylor's Head, duck shooting, the gun suddenly burst in his hands, shattering the left hand and wrist, and tearing the forefinger and thumb away completely.

With great difficulty he reached the shore, Dr. Jamieson of Tangier being in the settlement amputated the hand and part of the arm.

CITY EXTENSION.—We learn that there is a prospect of the Admiralty and the City authorities agreeing upon a line for the extension of Brunswick street. The line first proposed will be departed from, and another adopted, in order to avoid unnecessary encroachment on the Admiralty property.—Unionist

The Express says that a colored man named Cassidy was tried and convicted on Wednesday last before Mr. Justice Shields, Dartmouth, and sentenced to 60 days in the County Jail, with hard labor, for swindling and obtaining goods under false pretences.

MISSING.—A man named Hector McDonald, captain of a coasting schooner, now in this port, has been missing for a few days, and it is feared that he was drowned in attempting to get on board his vessel one night last week.—Unionist.

FIRE.—It is with much regret we learn that the store owned by Dr. Bent, at Digby, over which was the printing office of the Examiner, was destroyed by fire on Thursday night last.

The dwelling house of Mr. Donald McBean, of Middle River, Pictou, was destroyed by fire on Sunday last. Most of the furniture was burnt.

BEARLY ESCAPED.—We learn from the Yarmouth Herald that on the 12th ult., as a young Indian was engaged in cutting hoop-poles near the Grand Lake, Pabuco, a young bear seized him by the leg. On looking round he discovered a few feet from him a bear's den, in which were an old pair and two young ones.—The Indian succeeded in killing three of them with a small hatchet his only weapon. THE BURNING COAL MINE.—The New Glasgow Chronicle of Wednesday learns that the fire is still raging in the old pit at the Albion mines. Our contemporary says: The water of the river was turned off on Friday last, it being thought the fire was extinguished. On Sunday there appeared evident indications that the fire was still in the pit, and the river was again turned on. For a short time yesterday the flames were bursting out at the mouth of the main shaft.—We understand to-day that the flames in the shaft have been pretty well subdued, and we hope that the fire will be extinguished without causing much further damage to the works.

UNFAIR GAME. Four partridges were seized by the police in one of our markets on Saturday last, it being unlawful to kill or sell those birds at this season of the year. It was ascertained that the birds had been sent to Mr. Wm. Cooper the man in whose possession they were found by a Mr. Lindsay, of Onslow.

A NEW BANK is about being established in Yarmouth. It will be called the "Exchange Bank of Yarmouth." The capital is to be \$200,000, in two thousand shares of \$100 each, 25 per cent. to be paid up in August next. W. H. Townsend, Esq., M. P. P., is one of the movers in the enterprise.—Chron.



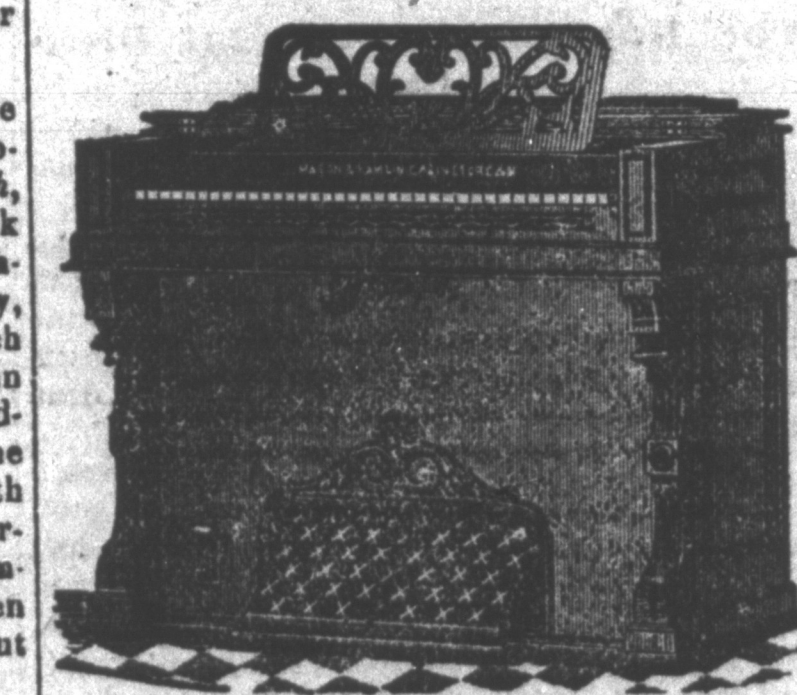
