

ment troops in Mansanella were besieged by the rebels, who were, however, unable to gain possession of the town.

Garibaldi, it is said, is about to leave his island home and emigrate to America. This determination has been arrived at in consequence of the reproaches of Mazzini and his friends, consequent on the general's failure in the Roman insurrection of last year.

A landslide took place recently near Portland, Me., which comprised forty acres in area, and completely filled the channel of the Penobscot river. The Cumberland Paper Mills, which stand near the scene of the disaster, are submerged to the height of one story. The loss is stated at \$2100,000.

Feed is so scarce in some sections of Ohio that farmers are selling off their stock at remarkably low figures. Sheep are being slaughtered for their pelts by the thousand. Five thousand two hundred and fifty sheep were sold at Cleveland last week for \$272 60 or five cents per head, the seller retaining the hides, and the purchaser slaughtering the animals. Carcasses of sheep all ready for delivery are sold at the astonishingly low figure of 40c to 60c each.

It has been proposed to divide the State of New York into two, as a means of weakening the Democratic element so prevalent there.

LATEST FROM EUROPE.

The poll table of the result of the elections is given by the "Times," on the 1st Inst. Liberals elected, 384; Conservatives elected, 272. Liberal majority, 112.

Queen Victoria, in an autograph letter, compliments Lord Monck in connection with his administration as Governor of Canada.

LONDON, Dec. 2.—Disraeli has published an address, announcing and defending the resignation of the Ministry. He reviews the progress of the resolves in favor of the Dis-establishment of the Irish Church believing the country would not sanction such a measure. The Governor awaited the Elections, for the holding of which all expedition was used. The result shows that the Ministry cannot command the respect of the House of Commons. They feel it due to their own honor and the policy supported by them, not to continue unnecessarily in office a single day, deeming it more consistent with the attitude they hold, the convenience to public business, and influence of their party to resign at once, instead of awaiting the meeting of Parliament, in which they must be in the minority. They are ready to support reform in the Church of Ireland, but will still offer uncompromising resistance to the policy enunciated by Mr. Gladstone.

December 3rd.—Hon. W. E. Gladstone had an audience with the Queen yesterday afternoon, and formally accepted his appointment as Chief of the Ministry.

There was a great gathering of the Liberal Chiefs at the house of Mr. Gladstone last evening.

The Times this morning has an editorial on the Cabinet about to be elected. It thinks Lord Russell, the present Master of the Rolls, will be appointed Chancellor of the Exchequer, and Sir Roundell Palmer, Master of the Rolls.

The London Times comments with severity on Mr. Disraeli's resignation. It announces what it terms his retreat as cowardly, and says it is unprecedented, except in case of the Earl of Ripon who had been a Premier, however, only during a recess.

The Post, Telegraph News and Standard applaud the prompt action of the Premier, as calculated to save the Queen from embarrassment, and his party from needless mortification.

Dec. 5.—The "Times" this morning says the new ministry will be complete this afternoon, and believes the following have already been settled upon:—Earl Russell to have a seat without a portfolio; Earl Clarendon to be Secretary of State for the Foreign Department; Hon. R. Lowe, Chancellor of the Exchequer; Hon. Edward Cardwell, Secretary of State for the War Department; John Bright Secretary of State for India; Henry Woods, Lord High Chancellor; John Duke Coleridge, Solicitor General; Fortescue, Chief Secretary for Ireland; Hugh Culling Eardly Childers, First Lord of the Admiralty.

There are vague rumors afloat in this City of a general seizure of newspapers and a conflict between the troops and medes at Paris. These rumors though not confirmed, have caused a panic in commercial circles in this City.

Dec. 6.—It is reported that John Bright has peremptorily declined the offer of Secretary of State for India, and insists on the appointment of Kimberly as Foreign Secretary, in place of the Earl of Clarendon. It is believed his wish in this connection will be acceded to.

The Times, in an article on the Alabama claims regrets Lord Stanley has been robbed of the glory of the settlement of the international differences; but is certain Lord Clarendon or whoever the Foreign Secretary may be, will pursue the same policy.

FRANCE.—The "Moniteur" gives an account of an attack of Democrats at Mont Martre cemetery on the anniversary of Baudin's death; fully confirming the reports previously received from Paris. The "Moniteur" says the crowds were dispersed by the police, who found it necessary to make ordinary arrests.

Despatches from Paris report that the police, fearing that manifestations would be made in

honor of Baudin, took every precaution to prevent a large number of people from assembling at the tomb. A large number of people, however, gathered in the neighborhood of Mont Martre Cemetery. The police dispersed the crowd, but they returned suddenly, and continued for some time to occupy the neighborhood.

A few of the more obstinate persons were arrested, but there was no actual violence, and at last accounts all was quiet. One of the French journals which appeared yesterday with a black border, was immediately seized by the Police.

The prosecution of the Editors and Publishers for promoting the Baudin subscription continues.

The strike among the Printers of Paris is ended.

SPAIN.—Despatches from Spain state that on Monday a political meeting of the Monarchists, in Valladolid, was broken up by the Republicans. A rumor is abroad that the Government of the United States has recognized the insurgents in Cuba as belligerents. The republicans attacked and dispersed a meeting of monarchists in the town of Orotro. General Prim, in a letter to the "Gaulois," declares the present Spanish Government have no dealings with Bourbons, and he denies with indignation the truth of the report that he proposes a coup d'état.

The Provisional Government of Spain has published a fixed Tariff schedule for the Antilles, to take the place of the present shifting and arbitrary scale of Custom duties. Lieut. Gen. Lung has been appointed Capt. General of Porto Rico. The Imperial newspaper predicts that a new ministry will be formed, with Epartero as Prime Minister. Epartero has been asked to become temporary Dictator of Spain.

TURKEY.—A despatch from Constantinople says it is believed there that the Sublime Porte will recall its Ambassador from Athens unless recruiting for Crete ceases in Greece.
