

question will be put off until the Commission on the Irish Church Establishment, already appointed, shall have made their report; 2nd, this Commission will be appointed to enquire into the relation of landlords and tenants in Ireland; 3rd, a Charter will be granted for a new Roman Catholic University; 4th, Irish railways are to be subsidized by Government.

Evening.—The Prince of Wales will soon make a visit to Ireland, where he is to be made a Knight of the Order of St. Patrick.

King Theodore has arrived in the immediate neighbourhood of Magdala with his troops and war materials. The advance of the British Expedition was steadily pushing ahead under General Napier, and at last accounts were two days march beyond the village of Altergal.

The shipments of Cotton from Bombay during the last two weeks of February foot up thirty thousand bales.

10th.—General Dix, American Minister to France, has arrived in this city, and it is understood he will remain here two or three weeks. It is said he has come here on business connected with the question of the Alabama claims.

The House of Commons, in committee of the whole, agreed to report for passage the bill introduced by Mr. Gladstone for the abolition of church rates.

It is reported in Berlin that a proposal was recently made to Lord Stanley to submit the Alabama claims to the arbitration of Russia, and that he was willing to entertain the proposition as far as it related to the question of indemnity, but he refused to submit the other point in dispute.

13th.—The House in committee of the whole, resumed the debate on the state of Ireland. The O'Donohue, member for Tralee, said the disaffection among the Irish people was widespread, and reached all classes of society, and paralyzed trade with the constant fear of its consequences. The church and land question were the leading cause of all was the refusal of independence in legislation. Ireland is now voiceless and helpless. The first remedy to be applied should be to deprive the church establishment of its endowments, and grant to tenants leases of not less duration than thirty-one years. Sir Stafford Northcote followed with a lengthy speech in defence of the Government.

15th.—The Prince of Wales will make his expected visit to Ireland during the Easter holidays. It is intimated that the event will be signalled by a Royal Proclamation granting partial amnesty to political offenders in Ireland.

Despatches were received last night from Abyssinia. Gen. Napier was about to send out a reconnoitering party to Lake Ashangee, in the Tamee district. The Pacha of Egypt, showed no disposition to withdraw his forces from Abyssinia, as requested by the British Government. On the contrary the Egyptians in Camp Masoah, received considerable reinforcements from the North.

16th.—Despatches from the south announce that the Grand Vizier had returned from Constantinople from Crete. He reports to the Turkish Government that the war between the Turks and the Cretan insurgents had at length ended.

FRANCE.—Paris March 16.—The French Corps Legislatif was engaged last week in a discussion of the new law in relation to holding public meeting, which was introduced by the Government. An important and comprehensive amendment to the bill has been offered by liberal members. It proposes to remove all restrictions from the rights of the people to meet in public assemblies when and where they please.

Advices from Berlin state Prince Napoleon has left for Paris. His visit to Germany has given rise to many surmises and rumors, and is extensively commented upon by the press, but his mission has not been divulged. His reception everywhere has been most cordial.

On the recommendation of the Honorable the Minister of Customs, and under and in virtue of the authority given and conferred by the Act passed during the present session of the Legislature, intitled: "An Act respecting the Customs," His Excellency in Council has been pleased to make the following regulation:

REGULATION.

"In addition to the Warehousing Ports mentioned in the Act passed during the present session of the Parliament of Canada, and intitled: 'An Act respecting the Customs,' the Ports mentioned in the annexed lists and being in the Provinces of Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, and which are now Warehousing Ports in these Provinces respectively, shall be and they are hereby continued as such Warehousing Ports, and are hereby declared to be so accordingly."
