As usual both parties claim that the results are a victory for their own party. The Unionists say that although McDonald is elected, yet that about six hundred votes have been gained in that county to the Union cause since last election.

THE ANNUAL SESSION of the GRAND DIVISION of Sons of Temperance last week was attended by a large number of representatives from Subordinate Divisions in the country. In addition to whom there was a delegation from Prince Edward Island and O. S. Beale, Esq., from Portland, Maine.

The Series on Wednesday evening was largely attended. The speeches in the subsequent Public meeting were enlivening and of an encouraging nature. The room after tea was densely crowded. About thirty now members were initiated to the Grand Division. The Quarterly sessions of the Grand Division are to be as follows:—

At Economy, Colchester Co., on the last Tuesday in January 1869.

At Windsor, on the last Wednesday in April.

At Amherst, on the last Tuesday in July.

At Halifax, Annual, on the last Tuesday in October.

It was resolved that a Convention of all Tem-

perance Organizations in the Province be held in Halifax in March next, to consider what steps can be taken to secure the enactment of a Prohibitory Liquor Law.

The question of receiving females into full membership was deferred for the present.

THE SUPREME COURT is now in session in Halifax. It was commenced on Tuesday of last week. In opening the Session, the Chief Justice in his charge to the Jury remarked upon the small amount of crime on the circuit from which he had just returned—less he believed than in any part of the British Empire. He referred to the age of the five Judges, they being all nearly or above 70 years of age. With all the diligence they could command it was impossible to overtake the business of the country, and it would be soon absolutely necessary to have an additional number of Judges.

In the two Provinces of Old Canada and in New Brunswick they had District Courts. New Brunswick has four Districts, and Judges appointed for the District Courts,—leaving the Supreme Court to its proper work, the trial of causes involving large amounts. Why was not the same thing done here? He called on the Local Government and Legislature to have this done. The Judges would all be paid by the Dominion Government. What was good for Upper and Lower Canada could not be very bad for us. Justice ought to be speedily as well effectually administered.

On motion of the Hon. J. W. Ritchie,—Mr. Harris H. Bligh, A. B., of this city, and James W. Ward, Esq., Solicitor of Ottawa, Ontario, were admitted Barristers and Attorneys of this Province.

The first case on the Civil side was Harris vs Casey, an appeal from the city court, given in favor of plaintiff. Verdict for defendant.

Bell vs. Tremaine. Verdict for defendant.

On the Criminal side the cases for trial were John Connolly for an unnatural assault.—Verdict given, Guilty.

Charles Mason and W. Ross for Arson near the Three-mile House. Verdict given, Not guilty.

Mason was detained on another charge for the same crime. Verdict, Not guilty.

John Murphy was tried for burglary. Guilty.

Sir William Logan, who is now engaged in making a geological survey of Nova Scotia, states that its coal seams are the richest in the world, that beneath the surface of this small peninsula there are treasures richer far than the mines of Mexico or Peru.

SAD ACCIDENT.—A little boy about three years of age, son of Capt. John Cochran, died on Sunday from the effects of a scald received on the previous day.

The sum of \$1850 has been collected in this city towards the relief of the Red River sufferers. This does not include the sum of \$1000 granted by the Provincial Government.

Mr. Daniel McEwen, Jr., M. D., of Halifax has been appointed Junior Assistant Resident Physician to the Hospital for Epileptics and Paralytics, Blackwell's Island, New York.

ACCIDENT.—A young lad named Knox fell from the roof of a house on Sackville street on Thursday and was seriously injured.

AN INDUSTRIOUS CENTENARIAN.—Among the articles exhibited at the recent Industrial Exhibition, were some cotton stockings knit by the mother of Sheriff Kaulback, Lunenburg. The old lady has reached her hundredth year. She certainly deserves honorable mention.

WINDSOR.—Edward McLatchy, Esq., has been appointed Stipendiary Magistrate for Windsor.

GOLD.—The Antigonish "Casket" says gold has been discovered on Isle Madame, Richmond Co.

IMPORTANT TO SHIPOWNERS.—By a recent decision in the Boston courts it is determined that the Consul has no right to charge the 7s. 6d. fee, as heretofore, for what he calls the clearance certificate.

ROBBERIES.—On Sunday evening last, the cabin of a schooner lying at Starr's wharf, was broken open, and two trunks containing about \$30 stolen therefrom. The trunks were afterwards found on the shore at Dartmouth.

A boy named Benjamin Bailey was convicted on Monday last of stealing some meershaumpipes from a shop opposite the Halifax Hotel. He will be tried before the City Court.

THE FIFTY-FIFTH ANNIVERSARY OF THE NOVA SCOTIA AUXILIARY BIBLE SOCIETY will be held (D. V.) in Temperance Hall, on Monday evening, the 9th inst. Chair to be taken at half past seven o'clock, and the usual collection in aid of the funds will be taken.

OUR MANUFACTURES.—A Factory is being erected at Riverdale, on the Truro and Pictou Railway, for the manufacture of spools for cotton thread. The building is nearly finished, and we understand that the principal part of the machinery is on the ground. When completed, the establishment will have cost about sixteen thousand dollars, and will give employment to about eighty persons.

COALS.—The Cape Breton News pronounces the Coal from the Victoria Mines of Messrs Fraser, Paint & Co. at Low Point, second only to the Sydney Mines. The analysis of this coal gives only one and a half per cent of ash. If this were the case with all the coals consumed in Halifax it would make a vast difference in the quantity of ashes to be removed during the winter, as well as in the amount of coals consumed.

In the County Magistrate's Court on Monday last, several young men were convicted of shooting on the Sabbath, and were fined accordingly.

FALL OF A CHURCH.—The new Methodist Church at Block House Mines was blown down on Sunday morning, 18th ult., and totally destroyed. Fortunately no one was in the building at the time, and no loss of life took place.
