His appropriations to several public institutions and projects, have amounted to several millions of dollars.

There has been of late much discussion amongst Baptists in Great Britain respecting the best means of carrying on the Foreign Missionary operations of the body. Dr. Underhill and the Rev. Mr. Landels some time since, expressed the opinion that greater efficiency and economy might be secured by adopting the practice of sending out unmarried ministers, and letting them remain at least one or two years, until they had become somewhat acclimated, and had ascertained whether they could endure the climate of India, before they were married. It is contended that they might thus travel with greater freedom into other districts, and more effectually reach the people throughout the length and breadth of the land. This position has been vigorously opposed by some of the leading men, and it has been argued that the missionary's wife may be as useful in many cases as the missionary himself, especially in carrying the gospel to heathen women; and then the pattern given of a christian family in a heathen community would be most salutary.

One feature brought forth in defence of that practice is, that not only have single men gone out and been very useful, but that even single women have gone into foreign stations and have labored sometimes all alone there for years. An extract from one of the communications on this subject will be specially interesting to many of our readers.

"The Ladies' Society for the Promotion of Female Education in the East can find agents who will go to any region of this earth. Several of the agents of this society have become devoted missionaries' wives, but there are many others who have not married, and have done noble work for Christ. I have before me an official statement, very kindly placed at my disposal by the hon. secretary of the Ladies' Society of those of their agents who have remained unmarried from 1837 to 1868.

I can only make a brief selection:—

One of the above will, I fear, have to live alone for a time, twenty-five miles away from all European society, in charge of more than four hundred children, and a large Christian community. With such examples of heroism as the annals of this society present from the gentler sex, surely some from the sterner sex will be found, ready to make sacrifice and to do the work to which the church calls them.

No inspired writer has written in such tender strains or given so much honour to the institution of marriage as him who has been honoured by this Church for eighteen centuries as the most perfect pattern as an Apostle to the Gentiles, but he could forego the happiness which "the brethren of the Lord and Cephas" enjoyed, and has not only received compensation, but a rich reward in his work.

"It is lawful to do good on the Sabbath-day." It may be somewhat questionable in the minds of some people whether the following "good deed" recorded by an Englishman writing from Carrickmacross, County Monaghan, Ireland, would not have been as good if done on some other day of the week:

"I have just heard of a good deed done on

Sunday last on this estate. A respectable Protestant tenant was, with his whole family, suddenly stricken down by fever just as his crop was ripened to the sickle. The priest, at chapel I believe, said that it would be a kindness to save the poor fellow's crop for him; the weather, glorious when he was taken to the hospital had since broken. No sooner said than done. Nearly a hundred of his flock, after chapel, took this kind hint of the priest, and before darkness had closed over the blessed Sabbath evening the poor fever-stricken Protestant's corn was safely cut down and secured by his Roman Catholic neighbours."

FATHER HYACINTHE.

The following letter from Pere Hyacinthe will show perhaps more clearly than any that have yet appeared, the position the Reverend gentleman now occupies. It was written in reply to an address and invitation to visit Boston, tendered him through the evangelical ministers of that city and vicinity:

"I am very sensible of the high honor paid me in the greeting from the clergy whom you represent. I am touched by your expressions of Christian sympathies and affection. I am a Catholic and hope to remain one. I have not broken with the Church, but its abuse. I recognize true Christians in all the Protestant bodies but I believe that the true Church, embracing all who hold Christ as their head, is far wider than any earthly organization. My purpose in coming to America is to escape excitement and rest a little. I shall soon return to Europe, but I hope again to visit this country. I shall visit Boston early in November, if possible, and then should be glad to see those whom you represent, and to explain more fully my position. The future is dark and uncertain, but I shall obey my conscience to the end. Greet in my name, with Christian salutations, those in whose name you greet me."

SUPERIOR SCHOOLS.—Much dissatisfaction is felt in many places on account of the grant being withdrawn, which was proposed to be given to Superior Schools. Teachers and Trustees have been preparing and laboring for the competition in the prospect of receiving the additional amount to Superior Schools, and now find their prospects suddenly cut off by the announcement that this grant will not be forthcoming. This is, we think, a great mistake on the part of the Council of Public Instruction. We hope they will reconsider their action, and endeavour to redress the injury to such schools as have a legitimate claim to the appropriation.
