THE 120TH ANNIVERSARY of the settlement of Halifax was observed on Monday last by a Public Holiday. The weather was not auspicious. The morning being dull and some rain falling during the day. Business was pretty well suspended except by the tobaccoists and rum-sellers. A small regatta was put through on the harbor, and a horse-race took place on the Common. The latter, though principally of horses belonging to cabmen and truckmen, attracted a large crowd. Among these we learn there was considerable drunkenness and of course a large amount of swearing, and some fighting. The purse placed at the top of a greased pole tempted several to try before it was obtained.

In the evening the Horticultural Society's Gardens were opened and the performances of one of the Military bands there attracted a large concourse of people. H. M. S. *Royal Alfred* was by kind permission of Admiral Mundy thrown open to public inspection and was visited by a great many people. The New Provincial Building was also on exhibition. We hope it may soon be put to some better use.

LIQUOR LICENSES IN HALIFAX.—The law passed in the late session of our Legislature and which will go into operation on the 1st of January next provides that: "No licenses, other than shop or tavern licenses, shall hereafter be granted, and no intoxicating liquors shall hereafter be sold in any tavern or other licensed house after the hour of nine o'clock in the evening, except to regular and constant boarders and travellers. No person resident within one mile of such tavern or licensed house, shall be considered a traveller within the meaning of this section."

GENEROUS GIFT.—We learn from the Kentville Star that the widow of Dr. Webster has presented her late husband's Cabinet of Minerals to the Province, and requested that it may be known as the "Webster Collection." Dr. How, of King's College, Windsor, has been in Kentville for a few days arranging the specimens previously to their being sent to the new Provincial Museum in Halifax. The collection is the result of the well known experience and perseverance which Dr. Webster devoted to the work, and has been examined and well spoken of by many eminent men, Dr. How and Dr. Honeyman among the number.

We learn from the Chronicle that the following resolutions were passed at the Repeal Convention lately held in Halifax:

"Whereas, In the opinion of the members of this Convention, the further continuance of Nova Scotia in the Canadian Confederation will be but a daily progress to ruin;

"And Whereas, Our only hope of commercial prosperity, national development, and permanent peace lies in closer relations with the United States;

"Therefore Resolved, That every legitimate means should be used by the members of this Convention, to sever our connection with Canada and to bring about a union on fair and equitable terms with the American Republic;

"Resolved, That the Convention recommend the formation of Leagues throughout the Province, for the purpose of carrying the foregoing resolution into effect."

A porpoise was shot in the Avon River opposite the town of Windsor, one day last week.—This is the first of this species ever known to come so far up the Avon.

OUR CITY SCHOOLS.—A new School-house is to be erected in the north part of the city. The new brick School-house in Morris Street will afford accommodation for about 500 children. The building has cost \$27,483.

RECOVERING.—Mrs. Clawson, who was shot with a rifle, by her husband, in Dartmouth some weeks since, has so far recovered, as to be pronounced by medical men, to be out of danger, provided she is kept free from excitement, and her general comfort attended to.

SUPREME COURT AT AMHERST.—The Supreme Court opened at Amherst on the 15th inst. Judge Wilking presiding. The Sheriff presented the Judge with a pair of white gloves, the usual custom when there are no criminals for trial.

ROBBERY AT BEAVER RIVER, YARMOUTH.—The Yarmouth Herald says the store of Mrs. Goudy, Beaver River, was broken into on Wednesday morning, and £200 worth of dry goods stolen.
