Resolved, That organization is a most powerful agency to secure these objects; and, that the American Woman's Educational Association is an organization which aims to secure to woman these advantages enumerated, that its managers have our confidence, and that we will co-operate in its plan as far as we have opportunity.

Resolved, That the Protestant clergy would greatly aid in these efforts by preaching on the honor and duties of the family state.

General Intelligence.

Provinces of Nova Scotia.

The 21st instant is to be proclaimed a PUBLIC HOLIDAY. It will be the 120th Anniversary of the settlement of Halifax. It is proposed to provide some public amusements for the occasion.

THE INTERCOLONIAL.—The St. John Telegraph: We learn that 300 men, divided into 7 gangs, are engaged on the 24 mile Section of the Intercolonial Railway between Campbellton and Eel River—Messrs. Grant and Elliot's section. Also, that on the 24 mile Section of John Tobin & Co., extending from Eel River to near Jacques River, 100 are employed. The former are chiefly Irish just from Newfoundland, and the latter principally French Canadians.

DEATH OF JOHN TOBIN, Esq.—The community was startled on Wednesday last by a report that John Tobin Esq., late member of the Legislature for Halifax county, had departed this life. Mr. Tobin had, for some time, been in a very depressed state of mind. He entertained the idea that he was about to suffer great losses and be reduced to poverty, and this preyed on his mind. On Tuesday he was in apparently good health. On Wednesday morning he was found lying dead in his garden, his brains scattered about, and a small rifle, which had been the instrument of death, beside him. An inquest was held on the body in the afternoon by Coroner Jennings, and the following verdict returned:—"That the deceased John Tobin came to his death on the morning of Wednesday, 8th June, in his own garden by a gun shot wound, caused by the accidental discharge of a rifle in his hand, while he was labouring under mental aberration."—Chron.

THE FISHING SEASON has thus far been much in advance of last year. There is a promise of more successful results during the present year.

A number of sailors from the French war ship *Jean Bart* were exercised on the common on Wednesday last. They were armed with the Chassepot breach-loading Rifle.

DESERTER ARRESTED.—One night last week a sailor was arrested on account of his having baggage, for which he did not satisfactorily account. It was ascertained that he belonged to H. M. S. *Phoebe*, and that he was endeavoring to desert. He was sent aboard his vessel to be dealt with.

SECOND ADVENTISTS.—We learn from the *World's Crisis* that "there will be a general Advent Conference held at Bear River, Nova Scotia, commencing June 26th. A cordial invitation is extended to all the lovers of Jesus and his soon coming, especially to the preaching brethren."

DEATH IN PRISON.—A colored man named Silvey Pride a convict at the City Prison, died there on Monday 7th. An inquest was held and the jury found that the man had died of Typhus Fever.

The *Unionist* understands that it is in contemplation to run a steamer between Halifax, and what is known as the Lower Ferry, Dartmouth, by a company. Large quantities of land have recently been purchased in the latter locality.

OUR CHAMPION OARSMAN.—We regret to learn that Mr. George Brown who holds the belt as the champion of Halifax Harbor, recently met with an accident, while in the pursuit of his occupation as a fisherman, which renders it improbable that he will be able to participate again in any contest.

SUDDEN DEATH.—A laborer named John Gibson, employed at Messrs. A. & W. Smith's new building, corner of Buckingham and Barrington Streets, fell dead on Saturday afternoon. An inquest was held yesterday before Coroner Jennings and a verdict of death from natural causes returned.

There will be a total eclipse of the sun visible to North America on the 7th August next.

REPEAL.—The Repeal Convention met in the New Provincial Building last Thursday evening. About fifty persons were present, including delegates from the Country.

NEW PROVINCIAL BUILDING.—On motion of Mr. Townsend, the House of Assembly authorized the Government to sell the new Provincial Building to any person or company who will pay the Province the sum the structure cost.

The ship building business in Montreal is reported to be very dull at present.

The Intercolonial Railway Commissioners intend establishing a machine shop at Amherst.

The Wesleyan Conference will meet in Charlottetown, P. E. I. this year, commencing on the 17th inst.

An Ottawa despatch states that the Governor General and lady Young, will, this summer, make a tour of all the provinces of the Dominion.

THE BOSTON PEACE JUBILEE.—The great peace jubilee, at Boston, on the 15th, 16th, 17th, 18th and 19th inst., to celebrate the return of peace to the land, is to be a huge affair. The musical arrangements are on a grand scale, and some eight hundred voices will take part in the concert, besides an orchestra of over a thousand musicians. The drum to be used on the occasion is a monster, the heads measuring nearly eight feet each in diameter, and are made from the hides of two mammoth oxen, and it is about three feet through, from head to head. It is, without exception, the largest drum in the world. Another feature in the musical portion of the proceedings will be the great anvil chorus, from one hundred anvils. The anvil corps to consist of one hundred city firemen, and the novel feature cannot fail to add greatly to the auxiliary effects of the jubilee, and prove inspiring and grand in the extreme. A mammoth pavilion has been specially erected for the entertainment. This will be one of the biggest things in the musical line that Jonathan ever entered into, and it is bound to succeed.

The Viceroy of Egypt's son is in England on a visit to the Queen.

A number of young men are organizing in Montreal for departure to the North-West.

A New York paper supposes that during the Peace Jubilee the Boston landlords will furnish their tables with tuning forks.

Mr. George Peabody arrived at New York in the Scotia on Tuesday, in better health than when he left Liverpool. He will spend a few days in New York, and then go to Boston with President Grant and attend the Peace Jubilee.

A boy about six years of age, son of Joseph Carruthers, of Wallace River, was lost about two weeks since. He was last seen driving a cow along the bank of the river. An unsuccessful search was made for two or three days. On Sunday evening last his body was found, floating in Kerr's mill pond about two miles below his father's residence.—Rep.
