

GETTING TO THE CONVENTION.

SAINT JOHN, July 22, 1870.

Editor of Christian Messenger.

Dear Brother,—There are two items of importance I wish to bring at once to the notice of your readers, and so write thus early, and before I am fully prepared to furnish definite statements of either, but hope to be in a position to forward details in season for your next issue.

The first is with reference to arrangements with steamboats and railroads for accommodating delegates and visitors to and from the Convention. These, so far as Bay and River steamers are concerned, are completed, excepting the time of departure, which may be changed before the Convention meets. Delegates and visitors from Nova Scotia can come and return on the steamer from Annapolis and Saint John for one fare, that is \$2, and on either line of the River Steamers for one fare, that is \$1, making the whole fare from Annapolis to Fredericton and return \$3. Those coming to Convention will buy a ticket on the Bay Steamer to Saint John only, and procure another on the River Steamer to Fredericton. The return ticket will be given at the Convention, signed by the President, or by one of the Secretaries. This arrangement, let it be understood, will accommodate all, both male and female, who wish to be at the meetings of the Convention. I expect to arrange for one fare on the European and North American Railway for the benefit of our Prince Edward Island brethren and friends coming over to Shediac.

The second item is a MINISTERS' INSTITUTE.—The Baptist churches and pastors in Saint John contemplate holding a Ministers' Institute in this city, during the week immediately prior to the Convention, commencing on Monday evening, and closing in time to go forward on the Saturday following to Fredericton. We are hoping to have, in conjunction with lectures from three of our Professors at Acadia College,—Dr. Crawley, Dr. Crump, and Dr. Sawyer,—lectures from several distinguished Theological Professors and Baptist ministers of the United States. The time and place for convening the INSTITUTE are very favorable, and we hope to have a large gathering of our ministering brethren from the three provinces, as they can avail themselves of the facilities provided for attending the Convention. A meeting of our city churches and pastors will be held on Monday evening to conclude measures for carrying forward this enterprise. So soon as our plan is drawn up, I shall communicate through the Messenger and Visitor.

The members of the Faculty, who have these studies in charge, will make special arrangements to accommodate all such persons, so that they will find even a short term of study profitable.
