PROCEEDINGS OF THE FOREIGN MISSION BOARD

The Board of Foreign Missions met this evening, at 7.30, in the Committee Room of the Leinster Street Baptist Church. Members present:—The President, Hon. A. McL. Seely, Revs. W. B. Biggs, D. A. Steele, J. W. Titus, I. E. Bill, & I. E. Bill, Jr., G. M. W. Carey, and W. S. McKenzie, Secretary.

The meeting was opened with prayer by Rev. D. A. Steele. Records of the last meeting read and approved. Revs. Thomas Todd, A. R. Macdonald, and Deacon J. F. Masters being present, were invited to a seat in the Board.

A question came from the Central Board of the W. M. A. Societies respecting the time when the payment of Miss DeWolfe's salary from the funds of these Societies would commence. It was answered that the payment of Miss DeWolfe's salary, out of monies provided by the AID SOCIETIES, would begin on the first of January, 1872, and that the remittance of \$200, ordered by the Board at its meeting on the 14th ult., was intended to date from January, 1872, up to which time her salary is paid by the general funds of the Board.

Correspondence between the Secretary and the A. B. M. Union, relative to the payment of 73 rupees for the construction, at Henthada, of shelter for Miss Norris, was laid before the Board; whereupon it was

Resolved, That, under the circumstances, this Board holds itself responsible for the expense incurred for the building of a room for Miss Norris in connection with the American Baptist Union premises at Henthada.

The correspondence between the Secretary and Prof. J. E. Wells, of Ontario, relating to a union of the Dominion Baptists in the work of Foreign Missions, was read; also a letter addressed by Dr. Fyle to Professor Wells upon the same subject. All of which is merely preliminary to an official course of action, if such action shall eventually appear to be advisable. As the Board is not yet in possession of data on which to frame an affirmative or a negative judgment in the case, the Secretary was instructed to continue and extend the correspondence, addressing certain questions to Rev. W. Stewart, of Toronto, Secretary of Foreign Mission Board in Ontario.

A letter was read from Mrs. Selden,

Secretary of Central Board of W. M. A. Societies in Nova Scotia, enclosing an application from a young sister for an appointment to the Foreign field as a missionary. The application is made to the W. M. A. Societies, as a preliminary to an application to this Board. After considering our present position and relations, as without any fixed field, with unsettled and somewhat complicated arrangements existing between us and our female missionaries already in India, the following was passed:

Whereas this Board does not at present feel prepared to make any further appointments to the Foreign work, since it is as yet unknown where our future field of operations will be, it is

Resolved, That R. v. Dr. Cramp and Rev. Dr. Topper, members of the Board residing in Nova Scotia be requested to consider the application of Miss —, who has offered herself to the N. S. Central Board of the W. M. A. Societies for service in the Foreign field, and that they report their impressions of the case to the next meeting of this Board.

The bill of Barnes & Co. for blank books, letter press and stationery, etc., was approved and ordered to be paid.

Other correspondence and matters of missionary interest were laid before the Board, but the hour being late, an adjournment was made, to meet on the second Monday evening in January, 1872, at the Brussels Street Baptist Church. Closed with prayer by Rev. Thomas Todd.

News of the Week.

PROVINCIAL APPOINTMENTS.—PROVINCIAL SECRETARY'S OFFICE, Halifax, 7th Dec., 1871: Cumberland Co.—To be Registrar of Probate, James Z. Bliss, in the place of C. Seaman, resigned.

Halifax Co.—To be Justices of the Peace, James W. Turner, George J. Troop, Francis C. Elliott, Patrick Hayden and Thomas Durney. To be a Coroner, C. E. Burnaby, of St. Margaret's Bay.

THE NEGRO MINSTREL SWINDLING CASE came up before the City Court on Thursday last, when the Stipendiary Magistrate committed John H. Connors, Luke Whelan, and Joseph Doyle for trial at the Supreme Court. They were subsequently admitted to bail of \$500 each.

DALHOUSIE STUDENTS VS NATIONAL SCHOOL BOYS.—A snow-balling affair last week resulted in a charge against two students of Dalhousie College—Masters Oxley and McDonald who were on Friday before the Police Court, charged with ill-using a boy named Michael Blackall. The court room was crowded. The case was however adjourned until Tuesday. It appears the boy Blackall is subject to fits and was taken with one in the hall while being punished by the Dalhousie combatants.

The Central Board of Health have appointed five of its members to investigate the charges against Dr. Gossip, the Health officer of this port. The following are the Committee:—Hon. S. L. Shannon, Dr. Almon, Hon. Mr. Vail, W. J. Squires, Esq., A. James, Esq., Secretary. They met on Thursday and Friday afternoons and had before them several persons who were occupied with the steamer *Franklyn*. They met again on Monday, and are still pursuing their investigations.

BELCHER'S ALMANACK for 1872, has just made its appearance with its usual amount of useful information. From the examination we have been able to give to this venerable periodical, we believe its statistical matters, lists of officials in public and private institutions, &c., &c., are correct and reliable.

LOSS OF BARQUE BREAMISH.—The barque *Breamish*, of and for this port from Little Glace Bay, was wrecked on Devil's Island on Thursday morning and two men drowned. She was sold by auction on Saturday for \$550, her rigging &c., for 280, and her cargo of coals for 100.

YARMOUTH.—On Monday of last week the American Hotel was discovered to be on fire. It was soon extinguished. Investigations have led to the opinion that it was the work of an incendiary and the residents of the town have subscribed and offered a reward of \$700 for a discovery of the guilty party. It is to be hoped that the criminal may be speedily detected.

FATAL ACCIDENT.—The barque "W. E. Heard" was taken on the Marine Railway on Monday morning, and when nearly up to the head of the slip, the principal chain parted, when the slip and cradle glided down the incline to the end of the slip. Four persons were on the cradle, three of whom saved themselves by seizing and climbing the frame-work; the fourth Mr. Alvin Crosby, mate of the ship, failed in attempting to do so, fell into the water, was swept off by the tide and drowned. A diligent search was made for his body, and at low tide it was found near the head of Commercial Wharf. The deceased was a son of Mr. Reuben Crosby, of Beaver River, and was a young man of excellent character. He had been married about six months. An inquest was held over the remains by John Tooker, Esq., Coroner, and a verdict of "Accidentally drowned" returned.—*Yarmouth Herald*.

IMPORTANT INVENTION.

Combination of Reeds and Pipes.

THE MASON & HAMLIN ORGAN CO., have the satisfaction of announcing the successful combination of reeds and pipes, so long attempted by organ-makers in vain, but which is now effected by the inventions of Mr. CARL FOGELBERG, a Swedish organ builder, now resident in the United States.

This invention they offer in the MASON & HAMLIN REED AND PIPE CABINET ORGAN.

The introduction of pipes in the Cabinet Organ, by which are added to the rich, vivacious tones of reeds the more liquid and rare, though passionless, tones of the pipe, has long been deemed an object so important that experiments have been unceasing for its attainment. There are few Organ-makers who have not given much time and attention to the matter, though heretofore without success. It is true that certain attachments have been presented as "pipes and reeds," but these have in no case been real pipes, but only tubes of tin or other material, not capable of producing any tones themselves, but only supposed to modify somewhat the tones of the reeds.

The difficulty, heretofore found insurmountable, arises from the fact that the pitch of pipes and reeds is differently affected by changes of temperature. Pipes are quite sensitive to such changes, and reeds much less so; while the change is in different directions. As the atmosphere becomes warmer the pitch of pipes becomes sensibly higher, while that of reeds, though affected very little, is yet a trifle lower. Thus, though pipes and reeds be tuned exactly together, a few hours may produce sufficient change in the temperature to throw them so much apart that they cannot be used together. It is evident that until this difficulty was overcome it was impracticable to combine reeds and pipes.

Mr. Fogelberg's invention includes the modification of the form of the pipe, and the employment of a valve or cover extending over all the pipes and regulating one of the openings to each, so that by a single movement the pitch of all can be raised or lowered sufficiently to compensate for atmospheric changes. When a change of temperature has thrown the pipes out of tune with the reeds, the simple turning of a screw is sufficient to raise or lower the pitch of the pipes to the exact pitch of the reeds.
