

## DEAN STANLEY AND THE BAPTISTS.

*The insignificant sect of Baptists.*  
—Dr. Cramp requests us to state that he has received a letter from Dean Stanley, expressing his regret for the retention of that "inaccurate and inappropriate" phrase in the Volume of Essays recently issued. It appeared first in an Essay written twenty years ago, and would have been expunged in the re-publication, but for an unaccountable "inadvertence."

In his Lectures on the "Eastern Church," published in 1862, Dean Stanley, having observed that "there can be no question that the original form of baptism—the very meaning of the word—was complete immersion in the deep baptismal waters," states that the Eastern Church "still rigidly adheres" to it, but that in the Latin Church "a few drops of water are now the Western substitute for the threefold plunge into the rushing rivers, or the wide baptisteries of the East" he remarks, however that this is "with the two exceptions of the cathedral of Milan, and the sect of the Baptists." The word "insignificant" does not occur there, and it would not have appeared in the recently published volume but for an unfortunate "inadvertence."

Dean Stanley is generally so "candid and liberal" that we felt sure some such explanation as is given above would be furnished. We insert it with satisfaction.

## HALIFAX INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL.

We were unable to accept the polite invitation of the Industrial School Committee to participate in the pleasures of their first annual meeting in the spacious new building near the North West Arm. It appears to have been a very satisfactory occasion, and was attended by a goodly number of the benevolent-minded ladies and gentlemen of the city.

After a tour of inspection through the several departments, P. C. Hill, Esq., was called to the chair, Rev. Dr. Pickard by request opened the meeting by prayer. Rev. G. M. Grant was called upon to read the Report, which contained a number of interesting particulars, from which we copy the following:

We have moved two miles out of town; have purchased a valuable property of 14 acres for little more than the price of the former site of an acre and a half; and instead of the old rickety building that could accommodate only 40 boys and our confined workshops, we have erected a handsome and substantial house for 100 boys, and roomy comfortable workshops for our four departments of labour. The price of the property was \$11,200. We sold our old site for \$8040; as to our new buildings, we estimated in the last Report that \$13,000 would be needed for them. That sum would include everything. The work is now done and we find that our estimate was correct, but as we have received less than \$12,000 we have the advantage of four stories. In the basement, are the bathroom, dining-room, kitchen, pantry, &c. Half of the ground floor is the schoolroom; and the other half the committee room or library; and the rooms for the Superintendent, his family and servants. Immediately over the schoolroom is a room of the same size, not needed for much now but which will eventually be required for dormitories for 34 boys; and the other half of the story is divided off into a sick-room, Mr. Ayres' (the master shoemaker's) room, the clothes room, &c., &c. Then in the top story are the dormitories of our 43 boys, and there is accommodation in it for about 30 more.

The profits from the various trades have been greater than in the preceding year, as the following table shows:

There is nothing we would like so much as to have that \$1100, and so be square with the world. Our stock in hand would then meet all our other liabilities; and we think from the improvement in the work done by the boys that hereafter our ordinary income will be sufficient to meet the ordinary expenditures.

We began 1870 with 42 boys, a larger number than we ever had before. We begin 1871 with 43. Our average for 1870 was about 43, and for two months we had 46 on our roll. Sixteen were admitted during the year;—four of them from the City Prison, ten from the streets, on \$40 or \$20 guarantee, by benevolent people, Sunday Schools &c.; and two extreme cases on our free list. Fifteen went out from us in the same time; five of them to farmers' comfortable homes in Pictou County, where

they are doing well; six to work at their respective trades in the city, five of whom are in regular employment.

It costs us \$50 a year in addition to what is made by their work to keep, educate, and teach a trade to each boy; when we take them from the Police Court for \$40, it is easy to calculate on which side the debt of gratitude exists.

While we have accommodation for 100 boys, our present revenue will not allow us to take in more than 44, and we have an actual debt of past years on us of \$1100. We ask the friends of Him who was poor for us, who loves us and would not have us perish, to come to our help, for it is to His help. Come and visit our School, see what we are doing; give your sympathy, and we shall be grateful, your counsel and we shall welcome it, your money, and you shall have abundant interest, and sure returns.

The boys sang a number of their appropriate songs in the course of the evening. The following gentlemen, were elected the managing Committee for the ensuing year:

If any confirmation were required of the correctness of our statements last week, respecting the discussion of special favors sought for Roman Catholic Teachers, it might be found by reading a Jesuitical article in the *Recorder* of Wednesday last, of nearly a column in length; in which the writer indulges in wrong quotations, unworthy insinuations, and unwarranted assumptions, but not a word to disprove the accuracy of what we wrote. Being well paid for such work it is to be expected that he will do it.

The *Religious Intelligencer*, the organ of the Free Baptist body in New Brunswick contains an appeal for Funds from the corresponding Secretary of their Foreign Missionary Society. He states that the last General Conference, the following resolution was passed unanimously:

"Resolved, That all the Elders and Licentiate of this Conference pledge themselves to collect (if possible) ten dollars each for the Foreign Mission Society by the first of January, 1871."

He further states "We learned from the Treasurer, a few days ago, that none of our Ministers had forwarded anything, and that (with the exception of some \$30.00 handed in by us) there was not one dollar on hand."

After mentioning several churches that, combined, will probably raise \$100, the Secretary adds:

"To every Free Baptist that reads this, we say Brother, Sister, our Treasurer is in want of funds immediately. \$430 was due our Missionaries on the first of the present month, and there is only about \$50.00 on hand to meet this payment. Have you given anything to this cause during the present year? If not, will you not send in your contribution at once? We would earnestly remind you that on us alone are our Missionaries depending for their support in the foreign field. On us devolves the duty of helping to evangelize over one million precious souls. No other Christian agency is caring for them. The Free Baptists of this continent have taken this as their field to Christianize; hence the greater necessity of our liberality to this cause."

We shall be glad to learn that the appeal has been effectual in bringing forth abundant means to meet all the wants of the noble undertaking of our brethren.

The friends of Universal Peace are making new efforts to extend their principles "The Advocate of Peace" published at Boston and Chicago comes to us monthly filled with excellent matter. Its purpose is to shew the folly and wickedness of war, and the evils of maintaining a standing army.

The RAINBOW, a monthly Magazine published by W. Kent & Co., Paternoster Row, London is devoted to second Adventism.

Our friends in St. John understand well how to make a "more blessed" occasion out of a social gathering. At a recent Social reunion in Leinster Street Vestry, a young lady came to the pastor—Rev. W. S. McKenzie—with "something to eat," having inscribed upon it "a sandwich for our Pastor, from his loving people." On dissecting the "sandwich," it was found to contain various metallic and paper articles of value, amounting, with other sums received during the evening to \$185.
