

London Journal, of an extraordinary event which took place in the cemetery of Kingston-on-Thames, when the Rev. Mr. Burney, Rector of St. Mark's, Kingston, conducted the funeral service in an unconsecrated ground. Some of the family of the deceased are dissenters, and he had been visited during his last illness by a dissenting minister but as he had been a hearer of Mr. Burney, the clergyman was desired to officiate at the interment, and at the same time was told that the burying-place was in the unconsecrated part of the cemetery. He expressed himself quite ready to assent to the request and did so in presence of a great number of persons. The burial service of the Church of England was read throughout, the first part in the consecrated church and the second at the side of the grave as usual. We learn that the Rev. gentleman had applied previously to the Bishop of Winchester, Dr. Wilberforce, for his sanction in this affair, and that his Lordship had offered no objection to it. Honour to Bishop Wilberforce who is also the Bishop of the diocese for the Channel Islands, for his greatness of soul. There is no doubt that if the Church of England clergy of this island would take the trouble to apply to him for permission to inter in the pretty and picturesque cemetery of Foulton it would no more be refused to them than to the Rev. C. Burney, and of what advantage is consecration to us when the Bible tells us "all the earth belongs to God."

News of the Week.

THE COURT OF QUARTER SESSIONS met on Tuesday, His Honor the Custos of the County presiding. The report of the jailer showed that during the quarter just closed, there had been 58 criminals and 49 debtors incarcerated in the Jail; and for the year just ended there had been 205 debtors and 170 criminals, in all 375. There were now in jail 8 criminals and 6 debtors.

THE SUPREME COURT opened on Tuesday of last week when the following law students were admitted to the Bar: Thos. B. Flint, B. A., L. L. B., of Yarmouth; A. McIsaac, M. A.; Alex. McGillivray, M. A.; Wallace Graham, B. A., of Antigonish; N. H. Meagher, of Halifax; Geo. H. King, B. A., and Sedley Blanchard, of Windsor. The examination of Messrs. Graham, King, Meagher, and McGillivray, have not been finally passed upon, and their admission was only moved for *pro forma*.

There were about one hundred and fifty cases on the list for trial. It is expected that the court will sit daily for four weeks.

FIRE AT ST. MARY'S CATHEDRAL.—The basement of St. Mary's Cathedral caught fire about half past eight o'clock on Sunday morning in consequence of some wood being piled too close to the furnace. The alarm was given and the firemen were soon at the scene, when as usual with our heavy force of water, the fire was speedily washed out. The damage to the basement by fire and water was considerable. No damage was done to the upper part of the Cathedral.

PRESENTATION.—An interesting presentation ceremony took place at the African Baptist Church on Thursday evening. Mr. John R. Thomas, who has been for thirteen years secretary of the Association, was presented with an elegant pair of silver mounted ink-stands as a token of the Association's appreciation of his work. One of the silver plates bears this inscription: "Presented to John R. Thomas by the African Baptist Association, December 7, 1871."—*Chron.*

THE COMMISSIONERS OF THE INTERCOLONIAL RAILWAY arrived in Halifax on Friday last and left again by special train at 7 o'clock on Sunday evening. The *Chronicle* of Monday in making a note of their desecration of the Sabbath said, "We commend them, however, to the tender mercies of the editors of the 'Witness' and 'Christian Messenger,' who are better fitted to deal with them as they deserve than are the ordinary mortals of the secular press."

But on the following morning, without waiting for us, our contemporary treated them with two long editorials on the subject. In which one of the Commissioners is reported to have stated "that 85 per cent of the work on the Intercolonial in Nova Scotia was already completed and the Commissioners expected to visit here again in a few months, when they would pass over the N. S. section of the Intercolonial Railway in a Pullman Palace Car, and at that time the line will be opened to the public."

He had been making some purchases at a shop in the vicinity of the wharf on Monday evening, and upon returning to the vessel the accident occurred. An inquest was held yesterday, and a verdict of "Accidentally Drowned" returned.—*Col.*

THE LOSS OF THE PARRSBORO PACKET "ACHILLES," took place on the night of the 30th ult., on her passage from Parrsboro to Windsor at the mouth of the river, and it is supposed that all on board perished.

The following are the names of those who left in her on the previous afternoon: Frederick Pratt, Chas. Doyle, Andrew Cameron, George More, John Geddis, James Pratt, William Battie, James Meeks, Thomas Fulmore, and Charles Webb. A small schooner arrived at Parrsboro on Monday the 4th with the bodies of four first named men. Eight of the unfortunate belonged to Parrsboro, and George More and William Battie to Economy, Colchester Co. The packet was laden with produce.
