STEAMERS IN OUR HARBOR.—In addition to the Ferry Steamers and tug boats there were nine large steamers in our harbor on Monday last. "Cambrian," "Nestorian," "Olympia," "Alhambra," (of Boston), "Carliotta," "Alpha," and "Delta."

BODY FOUND.—The body of a man in an advanced stage of decomposition was found in the water near Richmond Depot on Monday last. It was identified as the body of Mr. Riddick, a Scotchman, employed for some time as a clerk in the Railway Department, who was reported missing several months ago.

The steamer *Peruvian* entering the harbor on Saturday morning last went ashore on the Thruway Cap shoals but after throwing up several rockets two tug steamers were sent down to her aid and she was got off and brought up the harbor to anchor with slight damage. By the aid of her steam pumps the water was kept from rising. On examining her bottom it was found that a small hole had been made which let the water into the coal-bunker but would be stopped with but little difficulty. The pilot appears to have been in fault, and is severely censured.

DEATH OF A MAN 107 YEARS OLD.—The Antigonish "Casket" says:—We record this week the death of the oldest man in the county, perhaps in this province. Born in 1765 in Midair, Scotland, John McNeil, with his wife and family, came to America in 1802, and having lived for many years in Cape Breton, and for some time in Newfoundland, he removed latterly to Upper South River in this county, where he died on the 26th Feb. last. He retained all his faculties up to the very moment of dissolution.
