

LATEST FROM EUROPE.

ENGLAND.—George Jessel, Solicitor General, made a speech to his constituents at Dover, on Tuesday last. He dwelt at some length on the operation of the new Ballot law, and congratulated his hearers that England was at peace with all Nations; and declared the award of the Geneva Board of Arbitration would be paid within a year, without increasing the taxes of the country.

Lord Redesdale has written a letter condemning the conduct of the Government representatives in the Geneva Board of Arbitration, where, he says, the interests of the country were sacrificed to those of the Cabinet.

Sir Charles Adderly, Conservative Member of Parliament for North Staffordshire, addressed a large meeting of his constituents at Burslem on Wednesday night. He alluded to the work of the Geneva Tribunal, and settlement of the dispute between England and America, and said that the prosperity of the world depended on the cordial understanding between the two nations. England had made great sacrifices to terminate the state of semi-alienation, and relieve the anxiety of Canada. The settlement of the difficulties arising out of depredations of Confederate Cruisers, had been dearly purchased by England, and parties who had fitted out these vessels and made fortunes at the risk of the honor of the country ought to bear the burden of the Geneva Tribunal.

The Staffordshire iron-masters have reduced the price of finished iron 2 por ton. Sir James Shaw Willis, an English Judge, committed suicide, while temporarily insane, on Thursday.

During the past three months 54,000 emigrants sailed from Liverpool for America.

A despatch from Melbourne, Sept. 11, says the overland telegraph is completed. The riderpost has appeared in Fangloss parish, west riding of Yorkshire.

The Gazette officially announces Lord Hatherly has resigned the Chancellorship. Miss Nellie Grant and her brother Ulysses have arrived in London.

The American ship Jane J. Southard took fire on the 30th ult. off the coast of Munster, Ireland and was scuttled.

Two-thirds of the treasure on board the burned steamer "America" at Yokohama, has been recovered.

Agrarian violence has again commenced in Ireland.

Isaac Butt, the "Home Rule" member of Parliament, in a speech at Limerick on Thursday evening, advocated a Federal Union.

The train from London to Edinburgh on Wednesday morning, while running at very rapid speed, came in collision near Kirtle Bridge, with a freight train. Eleven persons were killed. At the investigation into the cause of the collision evidence was produced to warrant the Station Master at Kirtle Bridge responsible in large degree, and he has been jailed to await further proceedings.

Despatches from India say that Russian forces are marching on Khiva. [Khiva is a country of independent Turkistan with a population of 200,000, mostly wandering tribes.]

FRANCE.—The French Government condemns Gambetta's course in addressing the people in the Provinces. His speeches are considered indiscreet and ill-timed, and calculated to agitate the country which needs repose.

Gambetta is overworked and very ill. The time for choosing between German and French citizenship has expired; and there has been an overwhelming exodus from the conquered Provinces to France. All the French newspapers appear in mourning.

Eighty-eight thousand Alsatians will cross the frontier to live in the city of Nancy to avoid German citizenship.

Eighteen thousands persons have left Metz during the last fortnight, and the city has but 20,000 inhabitants.

The journals of Paris have opened subscriptions for relief of the Alsatians who left home who retained French citizenship.

The "Journal Official" announces the appointment of a French Supreme Council of War, composed of Marshals McMahon and Canrobert, General Ladmirault, Duke d'Aumale, Admiral Ronciere, and Mozenne. The Council is charged with the organization and administration of the army, but not with military movements.

SPAIN.—On the 1st inst., the monastery of Escorial in Madrid was struck by lightning, and the Royal Palace with its splen-

did library, paintings, and rare and costly manuscripts were in danger of entire destruction. The fire was extinguished but not before two towers and a portion of roofing had been destroyed. The damage is estimated at three millions of reals. All valuables are reported safe.

Expatriation has resigned his position as President of the Spanish Senate.

Spain is going to send 14,000 more soldiers to Cuba.

During the discussion on the reply to the address from the Throne in the lower branch of the Cortes, an amendment was moved asking for the abolition of slavery throughout the Spanish dominions.

GERMANY.—One hundred and twenty-five Alsatians have volunteered in the German army.

ITALY.—The Pope has appointed the Rev. Mr. Vaughan Bishop of Salford. The Bishop elect was recently connected with the Mission of spiritual instruction of the colored people of the Southern States.

The Pope on Monday the 30th, went beyond the Vatican, for the first time since the occupation of Rome by the Italian Government. He proceeded to the Portal del Zecca, and by that gate he walked into the gardens.

TRKRY.—A telegram from Ragusa reports that a fight occurred on Monday between the Turks and Montenegrins. Many were killed on both sides.
