News of the Week.

The Windsor Mail learns from a reliable source that Rev. S. T. Rand, Indian Missionary, has withdrawn his self from the Baptist denomination, and connected himself with the sect known as the Plymouth Brethren. Will the *Messenger* call attention the friends of Indian Missions to—Recorder.

Where it reads "It is of no use to complain as the road officials will justify themselves;" it should be, "it is of no use to complain except in a flagrant case as the employees will as a general thing justify themselves."

HALIFAX HARBOR shows signs of advancement in commerce. Perhaps there was never a larger amount of tonnage—ships and large merchant vessels—in this port than at the present time.

WIFE BEATING.—In the Police Court on Saturday last, Wm. McDonald and John Nauffts were each fined \$5 or 50 days' imprisonment for beating their wives.

DISABLED.—On Wednesday the steamship *Nebraska* of the Guion Line from New York, bound to Liverpool, towed into port the bark *Mallard*, Young, master, of London, from a port in Java, with a cargo of sugar, bound to Boston, which vessel was picked up dismasted, on the 6th inst. The *Mallard* had been 150 days out, and was dismasted in a gale which she experienced on the 16th of April. The cargo of sugar is damaged and some of it lost. Having towed the bark up to George's Island the *Nebraska* resumed her voyage.

WINDSOR, N. S., and ST. JOHN, N. B.—The steamer *City of Saint John*, has been placed on the route between Windsor and St. John, N. B., and will call at Parrsboro every trip.

GUYSBORO.—Murder by an Insane man. On Friday of last week, at Oyster Ponds, country of Guysboro', an old man named Daniel McDonald, who, for some time, had manifested symptoms of insanity, stabbed an acquaintance, named Matthew Corner, with a clasp knife, inflicting six wounds in his breast from which death resulted almost immediately. An inquest was held, and a verdict rendered in accordance with the facts: McDonald was secured and lodged in jail at Guysboro'. Corner, the murdered man, was a widower; he has several small children at home, and two sons, sea faring men sailing out of Halifax. McDonald has a wife and two small children. Corner was at McDonald's house when the murder was committed.

ACCIDENT.—On 23rd ult., at Williamsdale, Cumberland Co., a man named Jackson, working on a brow of logs slipped and rolled into the river with them and broke his left leg.

The Kentville Star reports that a man named Robt. Loney, was drowned in the Gaspeaux river last week, from falling off a log on which he was crossing the stream.

RECOVERED.—The Yarmouth papers report that the brigantine *James*, coal laden, sunk at the entrance to that harbor some time since, has been successfully raised and taken up to a wharf.

CUMBERLAND.—A very considerable freshet has prevailed in this county for two days with some damage to mill owners. J. R. Thompson, Esq., has lost 1,200 logs, and other parties less numbers. Several small bridges have been swept away, a substantial private bridge across the River Philip on the farm of Rufus Thompson went down with 10 or 12 head of cattle, all on it and two boys driving them, but strangely, all escaped unhurt.

CHEESE FACTORY.—A cheese factory is to be established at Nappan, by Mr. William King, of Hopewell, N. B.

SUPREME COURT.—The prisoners convicted at the present term were sentenced on Monday last as follows:—George Oliver, for breaking into a store at Tangier, and stealing eight kegs of powder—one year in common Jail.

Wm. Medley—for doing serious bodily harm to Samuel Evans—one year in Penitentiary.

Peter McCrory—for perjury—two years in Penitentiary.

Duncan Campbell—for subornation of perjury—four years in penitentiary.

Dennis Shea, for robbery from Mr. Blacks store, six months in the Penitentiary.

Two cases of some interest were before the Court last week. Hagarty against the City of Halifax, for taking away the porch of his house. Verdict given for plaintiff \$500. And that of Ingfield against Merkel and Harrington for assault in St. George's Church. Verdict for plaintiff \$25.
