Father Hincinthe has no idea of becoming Protestant. He says in the *Independent*, "We are Catholics; and we are not going anywhere. Yes; if we had to choose between those two errors, my choice would be for the perilous emancipation of each conscience, set free to face with the Bible and with Christ, and against the prostration of all consciences, sundered from the living Saviour and the Bible, in subjection to the unquestioned word of a man who might be John XII. or Alexander VI. A system like this is no more Protestantism than it is Catholicism. Its real kindred is with the religion of Buddha! I am not exaggerating. I have breathed that atmosphere; I know what there is in it!"

GRAVES HAVE NO WORMS.—One after another we have to surrender our most firmly settled beliefs. From childhood we have been led to associate in an unpleasant manner worms and graves. According to a speaker at a recent meeting of a Northern farmers' club, the worms are perfectly innocent of the practice laid to their charge.
