

THE LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR-SHIP.

Great disappointment has been felt in political circles, and by the community generally since the reception of the following despatch, on Wednesday last, from Hon. Dr. Tupper at Ottawa:

"I regret to say that after Judge Johnston had taken his passage, his physician remonstrated so strongly that he felt obliged to decline the Governorship. A Governor will be appointed immediately."

Much regret has been expressed at this conclusion of Judge Johnston to decline the Governorship. That appointment was regarded by all parties as eminently judicious and satisfactory, but that having failed it was not so easy to find another person who would in all respects be as acceptable.

Conjecture was busy through the remainder of the week as to who would receive the appointment. The names of several of our more prominent men were suggested—some of whom it appears were unwilling to accept the honor. The Hon. Adams G. Archibald, late governor of Manitoba, had been named for Judge in Equity. Technical objections were however urged by some parties against this appointment. Such objections do not lie against Mr. Archibald being made Lieutenant Governor. That course is therefore concluded upon, and Mr. Archibald is to be appointed to the vacant office. This appointment will we presume be generally acceptable to the people of the province.

METHODIST.—The Wesleyan Conference was sitting in Fredericton, N. B. last week. The finances generally are reported to be in a very prosperous condition. Seventeen young men successfully passed the usual examination and are received on probation, five Ministers become supernumeraries, and six supernumeraries return to the active work of the Ministry this year. The Rev. Dr. Rice, President of the Canadian Conference and Representative to this Conference arrived on Saturday.

Rev. A. W. Nicholson is appointed editor of the *Wesleyan* and Book Steward, in place of Dr. Pickard, who has removed to Sackville, and is to proceed as a delegate to England. The following are the city appointments: Halifax, North (Brunswick Street)—John Lachern; Kaye Street, Robert McArthur; Charles Street, Jas. Struthard; Lingham Sutchiff, Edmund Botterell, Supernumeraries. Halifax, South, (Grafton Street), John Read; Pope, (A) Supernumerary.

WENTWORTH, June 17, 1873.

News of the Week.

THE CIVIC ESTIMATE.

The following comprise the heads of the estimated civic expenditure for the year 1873-74:—

Salaries—\$12 040 00.
Police Department—\$19 890 00.
Fire Department—\$2 104 45.
City Prison—\$12 620 00.
Board of Works—\$42 826 39.
Miscellaneous—\$18 453 63.
Contingencies—\$2730 14.
Interest—\$11 036 39.
Extra Assessment—97 274 47.

The amount under the last head is to provide for the support of the Public Schools; for the City's proportion of support of the Poor's Asylum and Hospital; for salaries of Stipendiary Magistrate and City Engineer; interest on Lockman Street debentures; and on account of Engine House, &c.

The probable income, from Licenses, Rents, Court Fees, &c., is put down at \$31 761 00; and the amount to be assessed on the citizens is \$187 274 47.

A Washington letter says that Mr. Edward Young, formerly of Nova Scotia, Chief of the Bureau of Statistics, received last week from Mr. Somenov, the Russian counsellor of state, an invitation to be present at Vienna on the 23rd of August next, to attend a meeting of the permanent commission of the International Statistical Congress, of which commission Mr. Young was designated a member during his attendance as a delegate of the session of the congress held in St. Petersburg in August 1872. Mr. Somenov is chairman of the commission above named.

FATAL ACCIDENT.—On Wednesday afternoon a melancholy accident occurred in the establishment of Messrs. Stairs, Son and Morrow. A heavy keg of nails was to be lowered from the third story to the ground floor, by a winch which was on the second floor. One of the men employed in the warehouse arranged the gear and started down stairs to work the winch. While he was on his way, Mr. George McDonald, a clerk in the office of the firm, who happened to be in the store, undertook to lower the keg by the winch. In some manner he lost control of it, and the keg fell to the lower floor. The handle of the winch revolved with great velocity, and striking Mr. McDonald on the back of the head smashed his skull and threw him bleeding and insensible to the floor. Doctors were summoned and he was removed to his home as quickly as possible. He died about four hours after the accident.

Deceased was a promising young man in his 21st year, the eldest son of Mr. E. M. McDonald, Collector of Customs, and was universally esteemed by those who knew him.

THREE SISTERS, CUMBERLAND COUNTY, is a new lumbering district on the northern side of the Minas Basin. The following statement of shipments of Lumber by Messrs. D. R. & J. F. Eaton from their mills from the 27th day of April to the 26th day of June of the present year shew its productiveness.

Nineteen cargoes of Lumber of various kinds, containing upwards of one Million Six Hundred thousand feet superficial. They have now on hand ready for shipment about seven hundred thousand feet. All of which is of their own manufacture. The Barque "W. E. Heard" of Yarmouth 587 tons, was loaded with 527 000 feet and sailed from Three Sisters for Liverpool, England on the 26th inst.

The International Convention of the Y. M. C. A. of the United States and British Provinces assemble to-day at Poughkeepsie, N. Y. The Provincial Convention of Ontario and Quebec meets this year at Guelph, Ont., in August.

The Bridge-ton Agricultural Society purposes holding a combined Fruit and Cattle Show this fall, prizes to the amount of \$200 will be awarded.

PICTURE CO.—We learn from the *Eastern Chronicle* that the West River cheese factory has got fairly into operation. Their vat has a capacity for 600 gallons of milk, and so much more milk has offered than they can use, that the Company have decided to double their manufacturing capacity.

"BAD FOR THE COGS."—The *Truro Sun* informs us that one night last week as the freight train from Halifax was approaching the town it encountered a herd of cattle on the track, and seven of the animals were killed by the locomotive. The cattle belonged to Mr. Birnhill, who has made application to the Railway authorities asking to be remunerated for his heavy loss.

The Antigonish "Casket" says the salmon fishery on that coast the present season is better than for several years past. Mr. James Cairns, of P. E. Island, has an establishment at Antigonish Harbor for preserving salmon in cans for the English market. He buys about 150 salmon per day, and one day last week he canned 2000 pounds.

THE DRY GOODS MERCHANTS of Halifax have agreed to close their establishments at 8 o'clock in the evening during the summer.

On Wednesday last in the course of some skylarking at a Tavern on the N. W. Arm, a handful of lime was thrown into the face of a man named Patrick McGrath. The unfortunate man has lost the sight of one eye, and Dr. Moren, who attended to his injuries, is of opinion that he will lose the sight of the other one too.

STEAMER ON THE MINAS BASIN.—Messrs. Lunt of St. John have made arrangements for putting the "Hiram Perry" on the Basin, to call at Parrsborough, Windsor, Londonderry, Maitland, Cheverie, Oak Point and other places, connecting with the steamer "St. John" and the Windsor and Annapolis Railway. This matter has long been talked of, we hope it may now be accomplished.

ACCIDENTAL DEATH.—Reginald Tooker, aged 16 years, one of the crew of the Barque *Blanche Thomas*, of this port, now loading at Philadelphia, whilst playing with a pistol on the 27th ult., accidentally shot himself, causing instantaneous death. He was a son of Mr. Thomas B. Tooker, jr., formerly of Yarmouth, but as present residing at Canning, King's County.—*Yarmouth Herald*.

SHIPWRECK.—The *Iman Steamer "City of Washington"*, wrecked on the Western Shore—A Special despatch to the *Morning Chronicle* on Monday from Lockeport, says the *Iman Steamer "City of Washington"*, from Liverpool, G. B., bound to New York, with four hundred passengers, struck about 2 o'clock on Saturday afternoon, during a dense fog, West side of Port LeBear, about ten miles Eastward of this place.

The passengers and crew have all been landed safely.

The ship has about fifteen feet of water in the hold, and will likely prove a total loss.

The "City of Washington" is an iron screw steamer of 2870 gross, 1950 net tonnage, and 460 horse power engines. She was built at Glasgow in 1855, for the *Iman Line*, recently enlarged, and has been regarded as one of their finest vessels. She was commanded by Capt. Phillips.

The *Great Eastern* having landed the new Atlantic Cable at Hart's Content, Newfoundland, is to be employed the remainder of the summer in grappling for the Cable of 1865, to be continued till September if not sooner successful.
