News of the Week.

PROVINCIAL APPOINTMENTS.

PROVINCIAL SECRETARY'S OFFICE, Halifax 22nd March, 1873.—To be a member of the Central Board of Agriculture—Hiram Black, Esq., of Cumberland.

Digby Co.—To be a Commissioner for giving relief to Insolvent Debtors, &c., W. B. Stewart, Esq.

In the District of Clare.—To be a Commissioner of Schools—Peter S. Godet, Esq.

Cumberland Co.—To constitute a Board of Health for the District of Oxford; J. W. Cove, M. D., William Oxley, John Robb, James B. Woodland and James P. Thompson.

QUEEN STREET is to be extended south into Victoria Road. At the City Council on Friday last \$5000 was voted to be borrowed on debenture for the purpose. Appraisers are to be appointed to value the property required for this improvement. It is probable that it will take \$20,000 or \$30,000 to complete this work.

THE PARK AT POINT PLEASANT is to be begun this year. The City Council by 8 to 4 voted \$4000 towards that object for this year, and \$2000 per annum afterwards.

ACCIDENT.—A servant girl in the employ of Mr. Bares, fell down the stairs on Thursday night last, and broke her collar-bone.

SUDDEN DEATH.—Mr. Thomas Boggs, of the firm of Thomas Boggs & Co., hardware merchants, died suddenly on Thursday last. He left his office at one o'clock, and at three he was dead. He had previously appeared in his usual health.

THE GENERAL DOYLE TESTIMONIAL.—The Committee on the proposed testimonial to General Doyle have collected about \$500.

HALIFAX ACADEMY OF MUSIC. A bill is before the Legislature for an Act of Incorporation for the "Halifax Academy of Music." A building has been designed, by H. R. Selden, Esq., to be 50 feet front by about 90 deep, the auditorium capable of seating 1100 people. The stock to be in \$20 shares. We have not heard where the site is proposed to be.

HOSPITAL FOR INFECTIOUS DISEASES.—Our City and Provincial Hospital does not receive persons having infectious disease. The only provision for such cases has hitherto been the small-pox hospital at Rockhead. It is now proposed to erect a more permanent building for this purpose. The City Council are applying to the Legislature for an act to permit them to borrow \$10,000 for this purpose.

THE PHILHARMONIC SOCIETY will give their fourth subscription Concert at Temperance Hall to-morrow Thursday evening. The Programme will consist of Mozart's "Twelfth Mass," and several pieces of Choral Harmony.

FALL OF A WHARF.—Some alarm was caused early on Saturday morning in the Northern part of Water street by the breaking down of about 150 feet of Messrs. J. T. & A. W. West's wharf, on which were about ten hundred barrels of fish. The wharf was a comparatively new one, but either from defects in its construction or from being strained during the winter's storms it was unable to bear the weight that was put upon it. A party of men were immediately set to work recovering the fish and timber from the dock. The loss will probably amount to \$500 or \$600.

CENTRAL BOARD OF AGRICULTURE.—At a meeting of the Board held on Tuesday last, the following officers were elected: President, Joseph J. Northup, Esq.; Vice President, D. Matheson, Esq.; Pictou; Secretary, Professor Lawson.

A committee was appointed to ascertain if the Government would allow a sum sufficient for carrying out a Provincial Exhibition this year.

At a subsequent meeting, next day, the following members of the Agricultural committee of the House of Assembly, viz: Hon. Edmund Flynn, Henry Allison, Esq., M. P. P., Albert Gayton, Esq., M. P. P., Dr. Campbell, M. P. P., S. H. Holmes, Esq., M. P. P., John Ross, Esq., M. P. P., were present and various matters were discussed in reference to Provincial Exhibitions, Farmers' Clubs, Importation of Stock, &c.

A conference was afterwards held with Members of Government in reference to the proposed Exhibition, and subsequently an unfavorable reply was received, on account of the short time for notice and preparation. Steps have therefore been taken preparatory to a Provincial Exhibition in the fall of 1874.

OUR DOCTORS do not allow themselves to advertise what they do, but there appears to be no prohibition upon their advertising what they are not doing. And so as there have been some cases of small-pox in the city, several of the doctors have intimated in the daily papers that they have not been in attendance upon any small-pox patients, as erroneously reported.

DARTMOUTH.—Dr. Lewis was thrown off his wagon on Thursday last whilst crossing the Canal bridge. The horse started at the whistle of the Skate Factory. The Doctor was considerably bruised, though no bones were broken.

At the late town meeting it was resolved to purchase the old Presbyterian Church for \$3,600 to be made into a Town Hall and Engine House. A good move.

BRIDGEWATER.—A young man named Bateman, in the employ of Messrs. Morton & Co., was killed last week by a tree falling upon him, whilst he was chopping in the woods.

"GLENWOOD" is the new name given to Argyle Head, Yarmouth County.

ACCIDENT AT SUBENACADIE.—A few days ago a man named Adam Boyd was jammed between two cars while coupling them. Several of his ribs were broken.

OUR MINING DISTRICTS are terribly afflicted with the curse of intemperance, which is the parent of all other crime. Good wages are earned by the miners and when pay-day comes instead of its bringing blessings to the households, in many cases it becomes the terror of the wives and families. A few days ago at Lingan, C. B., there was a serious fracas, during which Wm. Ling, an employee of the General Mining Association, was stabbed in the hip by one McDonald.

Provincial Parliament.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

On TUESDAY last Mr. Blanchard introduced a bill, to alter and amend the City Charter, by reducing the number of Aldermen to ten or twelve and pay them for their services.

The House in Committee on Bills passed a number of local and Private Bills, and proceeded with the case of Mr. Parsons, which occupied the remainder of the day. A summary is given on another page.

On WEDNESDAY a Bill to incorporate a Cheese Company at Upper Stewiacke, was received.

The Revised Statutes relating to Mining Leases occupied the remainder of the day.

On THURSDAY last the House was occupied with a question respecting contemplated lines of railway.

In Revising the Statutes Mr. Morrison objected to the clause enabling the owners of Marsh lands to carry a drain through that of another owner, and moved that the clause be struck out. After some discussion it was decided by 14 to 11 to retain the clause.

The Report of M. B. Desbrisay, Immigration Agent was submitted and read showing how he had disposed of the pamphlets entrusted to him, &c.

On FRIDAY the Chairman of the Committee on Local Bills reported in favor of the Bill to incorporate the town of Dartmouth.

The Prov. Secretary laid on the table the report of Mr. Murphy, Provincial Engineer, on a proposed breakwater at Mabou harbor.

The report of the Board of Agriculture for 1872 was read. It showed that there were in the province sixty societies, with a

membership of 3597. The receipts amounting to over four thousand dollars.

Mr. Blanchard, by special leave, introduced a bill to incorporate the Halifax Academy of Music. Read a first time.

The House in committee on Bills, passed several, including one to incorporate the Sydney Hotel Company, and one to incorporate the Marble and Lime Manufacturing Company, of Cape Breton.

SATURDAY was occupied by several local and private bills being read a third time.

Mr. C. J. Campbell in alluding to Immigration said the Province needed Irish and Scotch settlers, who were used to hardships and privation. We cannot expect to attract the English, who live in a warmer climate. Nova Scotia needed more and better roads. New Brunswick had in this way made herself far more attractive to emigrants than Nova Scotia. In his county (Victoria) there is a tract of land of some six or seven hundred thousand acres about Smoky Mountain that is totally inaccessible for want of roads.

Mr. Holmes asked the Government to lay on the table a return showing the number of Journals of Education published and their cost; also the number of Education Reports published and their cost.

On MONDAY after the presentation of petitions and the third reading of several bills, the Provincial Secretary brought in the estimates for the ensuing year, and gave explanations concerning them.
