Mr. Rusk'n, one of the great literary men of the present century, does not become more genial as he grows old. In his "Fors Clavigera" for December addressing, working men he says:

My friends,—I shall not call you so any more, after this Christmas; first, because things have changed to me, of late, which have made me too sulky to be friends with anybody; secondly, because in the two years during which I have been writing these letters not one of you has sent me a friendly word of answer; lastly, because, even if you were my friends, it would be waste print to call you so once a month. Nor shall I sign myself faithfully, yours, any more, being very far from faithfully my own, and having found most other people anything but faithfully mine. Nor shall I sign my name, for I never like the look of it, being I apprehend, only short for "rough skin" in the sense of "pig skin" (and, indeed, the planet under which I was born Saturn has supreme power over pigs); nor can I find historical mention of any other form of the name, except one I made no reference to when it occurred, as it at of the leading devil of four, red skin, blue skin—and I forget the skins of the other two—who performed in a religious play of the fourteenth century, which was nearly as comic as the religious earnestness of our own century. So that the letters will begin henceforth without address, and close without signature. You will probably know whom they come from, and I don't in the least care whom they go to."

WOOD'S HOUSEHOLD MAGAZINE, Jan. 3, 1873 is received and presents a very attractive appearance. It is well freighted with readable matter supplied by sensible, lively writers. It is well worth its dollar a year, published by S. S. Wood & Co., Newburgh, N. Y.

Judge Marshall's prolific pen has again brought forth a pamphlet of 46 pages under the title of "A Scriptural Examination of certain Articles of religious creeds." Plymouthism, Ritualism, and Purgatory are the topics he discusses, and brings forth much of correct thought on each of these subjects.

The ex-Emperor Louis Napoleon is dead. His life has been an eventful one. He was born in the palace of the Tuileries on the 20th of April, 1808, under the reign of his uncle Napoleon 1st. He became an exile when seven or eight years of age, together with his mother, and lived in Switzerland. His cousin the son of Napoleon 1st, died in 1832, and left Louis Napoleon heir to his uncle's honors and name. Attempting to raise a rebellion he was captured and sent to the United States, but soon returned ostensibly on account of his mother's illness. Switzerland being threatened by Louis Philippe if Napoleon were permitted to remain there, he went to England and remained there several years. After the revolution of 1848 when Louis Philippe fled from the throne and became a fugitive in England, Napoleon returned and was elected a member of the French Assembly, and subsequently to the Presidency. In 1851 by the bold, unscrupulous, and bloody coup d'état he, in a very short time, became President of the Republic, and then Emperor. After consolidating his power and using every means for continuing the dynasty, he entered upon the late war, from which he emerged a defeated and disgraced sovereign, compelled to seek asylum in Great Britain, where he has since lived in comparative quiet and seclusion. After having lived as a sort of dictator of peace and war for Europe he sank as in a day to comparative obscurity. He managed to surround himself with a sort of enigmatical power, so that his word and especially his New Year's Day remarks to the diplomatic corps, were regarded as indicative of what might be expected to befall the several countries during the year. France is still smarting for allowing Napoleon the possession of supreme power, and it is not likely that another of the Buonaparte family will sit on its throne. Whilst he reigned, Napoleon was perhaps as suitable an Emperor as France could have had. The Republic will doubtless be more firmly established now in consequence of his removal.
