

school for boys in a successful manner. Subsequently he located as teacher in Paradise, N. S., where his labors not only in the prosecution of his profession, but also in connection with the church were crowned with remarkably blessed results. From Paradise he was called to occupy the position of Principal of the Horton Academy. There our brother found an ample field for the display of his abilities, and here more fully, perhaps, than on any previous arena of his professional life, he impressed the influence of his life and character on men destined to occupy prominent places in church and state. There, too, were offered excellent and special advantages for the education of some of his children, one of whom, Mr. F. C. Hartt, graduated with honor from Acadia College, and now holds an honorable and distinguished position as Professor in the Cornell University of Ithaca, N. Y.

After several years absence, for reasons unknown to the writer, our Bro. Hartt again returned to his native province, and resumed the work of teaching in our city. He henceforth devoted himself to the instruction of the female sex, and in this work was ably assisted by his accomplished wife and daughters. When the present provincial school law came into operation, Mr. Hartt was immediately awarded the position of Principal of the female high school, and up to the hour of his death he continued to discharge the duties of his office to the satisfaction of his pupils and their parents.

Such is a brief and imperfect record of our brother's professional life. Let us for a moment more glance at other features and elements of his career and character.

As a citizen, Mr. Hartt was universally beloved and respected. While naturally retiring and unobtrusive, he still possessed much public spirit, and delighted as far as his means and time permitted, to aid in any work which tended to advance the general interest of the community in which he resided.

That he had commended himself to public esteem, and was one of those citizens whose loss is felt to be a public calamity, is very apparent from the hearty eulogies which have been bestowed on him by almost the entire secular press of St. John.

As a husband and father, he was a model, and has left behind him those who have learned to emulate his virtues, and for whom an unusually large sympathy exists among all classes of society.

As a Christian, our brother was distinguished for many remarkable traits which endeared him to his brethren in a special manner, and renders it a matter of great doubt whether his place in the church so suddenly vacated can soon be filled. Men combining such talent, disposition and piety as existed in him, are by no means common.

As a deacon, and Sunday-school worker, and a counsellor in church affairs, he was most efficient, and the body of which he was a member feels that they have met with an irreparable loss.

We shall also miss him from our Association gatherings, and from the sessions of our Home Mission Board, which he regularly attended, and where his services as Corresponding Secretary were invaluable and indispensable.

But why should we linger longer in expatiating on our departed friend's virtues? Let us thank God for what he was. By His rich grace, he was permitted to achieve the object of his highest and laudable ambition, namely, to perform to the best of his ability, his duties as a Christian citizen, in his home, in the school, in the community, and in the church. We are glad that he was spared to live among us so long, and that his manner of life was such as to elicit admiration. And it affords us satisfaction to notice the readiness of so many to eulogize the career of our loved friend; for we well know that "magnanimously to appreciate excellence is at once the prophecy and guarantee of its possession." We must expand, fortify and adorn our own nature, while we are prompt to aid, and zealous to commend, the companions of our common life.

THE FREDERICTON SEMINARY.

The resolution of the N. B. Baptist Education Society to offer their Seminary at Fredericton for sale, may strike some parties as an unsatisfactory course.

The following are the resolutions passed by the Society at a meeting held at St. John:

First, That it is not expedient to carry on the Seminary at Fredericton, under its present management, for another year.

Second, That it is not expedient to put forth efforts for the establishment of Academics institutions in this Province, at present.

Third, That the property known as the Baptist Seminary at Fredericton be sold at the highest possible price, and the proceeds invested until otherwise appropriated by the denomination.

The Visitor of last week has a summary of the reasons for adopting this course which we think many of our readers will be pleased to read:

The Baptist Seminary of Fredericton has performed a noble mission, not only for the Baptists, but for all denominations in this country. When it commenced its career, King's College, now the Provincial University, was barred against all applicants who refused adhesion to the creed of a dominant church; and the Government of the country was in the hands of the favor-

ed few. * * * * The battle that commenced with education extended in the issue to the whole range of Governmental power and patronage. As a matter of course the Baptists said, make the Government as well as the education of the country free, equal, civil and religious privileges for all. The contest went forward until the Baptist sentiment, on the question of civil and religious liberty, was in the ascendant, and now we have the triumphant climax—our glorious system of free and non-sectarian schools, for all of every sect and grade. In the presence of these facts let no one who respects himself say that the Baptist Seminary of Fredericton is a failure.

Then think of its direct benefits in preparing male and female teachers for the primary and higher schools of the country; in training young men for the study of the professions of law and medicine; qualifying students to enter upon a Collegiate course, and aiding candidates in the course of preparation for the ministry; and it will be seen at a glance that this Institution has a glorious record, the influence of which will be seen all along the track of the mystic future.

Now if cloed as a Baptist institution, it is pleasing to know, that if purchased by the Educational Board of Fredericton, it will still be devoted to educational purposes, and therefore will not be wholly diverted from its original design.

Let no one imagine that if the Baptists of New Brunswick sell their Institution at Fredericton, that therefore their educational mission must terminate. Not so, it has but now commenced. It true to themselves, as we trust they will be, they will beg rt themselves anew for the work. They have Acadia College upon their hands, as their own institution, to the support of which they are pledged by every principle that is sacred; and in addition to this, they have to do their full share in the establishment of a first-class Theological Institute for the Baptist ministry of the Maritime Provinces. Where this shall be located, whether in Wolfville, St. John, or elsewhere, is a question not yet decided, but on all hands it is felt that such an Institute is an absolute necessity, and that there is no time for turning aside from our educational work. The all-absorbing question now before us, however, and one that takes precedence of all others, is the endowment of Acadia College. This must be placed upon a satisfactory basis, and in the mean time let us do all we can for the rising ministry.

THE METHODIST CONFERENCE ON THE SCHOOL QUESTION.—The Wesleyan Methodists at their recent Session of Conference in Fredericton, N. B. on the 3rd inst. passed the following resolution:—

Resolved, That this Conference hereby expresses its earnest conviction that the non-denominational Common School system is best adapted to the circumstances of this country, and does deprecate any attempt to substitute for it, for the gratification of any one body of Christians, or class of citizens, a sectarian system of education.

Rev. D. Henry Miller, D. D. has accepted an invitation to become pastor of the Plymouth Baptist Church, New York city, and has left the Worthen Street Church, Lowell Mass., for that purpose, but with an earnest protest from the church against his doing so, and a request that he would reconsider whatever encouragement he had given to the afore said church.

The publication of Sir Hugh Allan's affidavit respecting the Canadian Pacific Railway affairs shows his position to be a very unsatisfactory one at the least. How far the government stands implicated, will of course be regarded differently by different parties, according as they stand in relation to the government or opposition. Hastily formed opinions on imperfect information, are usually unsound, and require subsequent modification or reversal. It may be wise therefore to suspend judgment till all the facts are made public.
