News of the Week.

The Halifax School Commissioners have concluded to hold their meetings with open doors. At the first of these open meetings they had the subject of a High School for the city before them, but instead of passing upon it they have referred the question to the City Council for their opinion as to the propriety of incurring the necessary expense.

The City Council have appointed to-morrow Thursday to hear the members of the School Association recently organized.

DARTMOUTH.—The Town Council have been exercised on the matter of licenses to sell liquor. They have decided to raise the rate of licenses from \$25 to \$100 with the design of diminishing the number of places where liquor is sold. There are now 25 such places.

FIRE DISTRICTS.—At the suggestion of Mr. Scriven, Chairman of Firewards, sanctioned by a Committee, the city has been divided into the following fire districts:—
1. All that portion of the city south of Sackville street.
2. All north of Sackville to George street.
3. All north of George street to Hurd's Lane.
4. All north of Hurd's Lane to the city boundary.

SUDDEN DEATH.—A man named Sherwood Thompson a cabinet-maker, died last week whilst at dinner. The verdict of the jury states that he had been poisoned by taking hydrate of chloral.

The House of Assembly Room in the Province Building has had a complete renovation and several important improvements made in it. The raised floor has been removed and the speaker's chair placed in the centre of the north side of the room opposite the entrance instead of at the eastern end. The galleries have been extended on the south side, by that means providing separate accommodation for the press and a corresponding portion of space for a ladies' gallery. The room is heated by a furnace in the cellar instead of the big stoves and stove-pipes that were formerly required. Comfortable chairs have taken the place of the old red benches. It has a more social aspect but whether the change has given greater dignity to the general aspect of the house is questionable. The liveried pages as messengers is a decided step in the march of improvement. The whole aspect of the house is now rather a place for attending to business than as an arena for debate and public discussion.

FOUND.—The body of Mr. Daniel Allan, who has been missing from Grand Pre, since Feb. 3rd, was found on Thursday, 5th inst., in a small creek outside the Wickwire Dyke, and near the "Great Discharge" creek and abutment, by Mr. D. L. Palmer of Long Island. No marks or bruises were found on the body, which was in a remarkable state of preservation.

SCHOOL INSPECTORSHIP FOR QUEENS COUNTY.—The Rev. Charles Duff who has held the office of Inspector of Schools for this County for the last four years, has resigned, and Dr. Andrews, of Brookfield, has been appointed in his place.

THE SHORE MAIL.—Dissatisfaction is expressed with the post office authorities' proposal to receive tenders for carrying the mails along the south coast. Instead of a mail between Halifax and Shelburne, in a wagon drawn by two horses, at a minimum rate of speed of six miles per hour, it is contended that "in consequence of the importance of the mails and the large amount of travel, and to give general satisfaction, it is absolutely necessary, that there should be large first class covered coaches, drawn by not less than four horses, at a minimum speed of seven miles per hour." A meeting was held at Mahone Bay on the 7th inst., for the consideration of this matter and resolutions passed setting it forth and requesting a change in the tenders to meet such requirement, and asking the aid of the county representatives in securing such object.

FRESHETS.—The eastern part of the province has been visited with destructive freshets, Truro, Onslow, Stewiecke and Tatamagouche appear in particular to have suffered by the destruction of roads, bridges, &c. In some parts of Picou it was the greatest run of water, ice, &c., ever known, and will take large sums of money to repair the damage. The Musquodoboit river was three feet higher than it has been known for years past.

KING'S COUNTY is progressing. Two large vessels are to be built at Wolfville this summer. Extensive preparations are being made for the erection of new buildings in Kentville during the summer.

A large codfish weighing 94 lbs. was brought into our market one day last week.

GUYSBOROUGH.—A man named Joseph Torey has been arrested in Truro under a charge of a criminal assault on a married woman.

MAIL CONTRACT.

SEALED TENDERS, addressed to the Post Master General, and marked "Tenders for Mail Service," will be received at OTTAWA, until 12 o'clock, noon, on FRIDAY, the 27th of March, for the conveyance of Her Majesty's Mails, six times per week, each way, between

HALIFAX AND SHELBURNE, And on the Branch Routes Between Lunenburg and Mahone Bay, and between Lunenburg and Bridgewater,

on and from the 1st July next. The conveyance to be made on the Main and Branch Routes by Wagon, drawn by not less than two horses.

The route pursued in the conveyance of this Mail to be as above.

The computed distance between Halifax and Shelburne—including the Branch Routes is one hundred and fifty-seven miles.

The Rate of Travel to be not less than six miles per hour, including stoppages for all purposes.

The days and hours of Arrival and Departure to be as follows, subject to a right of the Postmaster-General to alter the same, should he consider it advisable so to do.

MAIN ROUTE:
Leave Halifax, Daily at 6 A. M. Arrive at Bridgewater on same day at 6 P. M.

Leave Bridgewater Daily at 6 A. M. Arrive at Shelburne on same day at 5.30 P. M.

Leave Shelburne daily at 6 A. M. Arrive at Bridgewater on same day at 5.30 P. M.

Leave Bridgewater Daily at 6 A. M. Arrive at Halifax on same day at 6 P. M.

BRANCH ROUTES:

Leave Lunenburg Daily at 6.15 A. M. Arrive at Mahone Bay at 7.30 A. M. to connect with Mail for Halifax.

Leave Mahone Bay Daily, on arrival of Mail from Halifax. Arrive at Lunenburg in one hour and a quarter.

Leave Lunenburg Daily at 3.30 P. M. Arrive at Bridgewater at 5.30.
