News of the Week.

DR. JAWETT the celebrated temperance lecturer, comes here by invitation from Chebucto Division, No. 7, S. of T., and will deliver his first Lecture at Temperance Hall on Thursday evening, Aug. 20th. Doors open at 7 1/2 o'clock. Chair to be taken at 8 o'clock. Tickets of Admission to all parts of Hall, 10c each, to be had at the usual places, and at the door on the evenings of meetings.

CIVIC.—The Committee of Common recommend the Council to accept the Horticultural Society's offer to sell their property to the city for \$15,000 on condition of its being added to the public garden. If the offer is accepted a number of the shareholders in the Society promise to donate one or more shares to a fund for the improvement of the garden.

On Thursday afternoon the Council, by a vote of 10 to 7, refused to reconsider the previous action respecting the purchase of the Jennett property for the site of a new City hall. After which His Worship read a carefully prepared Statement informing the Council that he could not sign debentures for the purchase of said property after the condemnation of the transaction by the public meeting of citizens. And it demanded to do so by the council he should resign. The meeting broke up in confusion.

SUPREME COURT.—At the opening of the Court on Saturday last there was just a little unpleasantness between Judges Ritchie, Wilkins and Desbarres on the subject of precedence. The other Judges refused to interfere in the matter. The Court gave judgement in more than twenty cases and then adjourned until the 1st day of September. The Chief Justice gave judgement in the case of the "Charles Forbes" and awarded the crews of the several vessels engaged in getting her into our harbor the sum of \$2840.

Granville Street Sabbath School had a high time on McNab's Island on Thursday last. The day was delightful. The Goliath took them down in the morning. At 2 30 another party with the harpers joined them. After a most pleasant afternoon all returned to the city between 6 and 7 in the evening by steamer.

John Smith charged with stealing from the Railway some iron chairs who was partially examined before the City Court, is to appear to-day for examination preparatory to being committed for trial before the Supreme Court.

A young man named William Boutillier, in the employ of Miss Katzman, met with a serious accident on Friday morning, in which he broke his leg by falling through into the cellar. On the same day Julius Pierre, a brickmaker, employed in the Shubenacadie brick yard, had his left hand frightfully crushed and mangled in one of the presses about which he was working on Thursday.

BAD ACCIDENT.—Mr. J. D. Potter, of Clements, had some of his ribs broken by a fall last week, which will prevent him from working for some time.—[Annapolis Farmer.]

A PRETTY YACHT called the *Dracana*, the property of Mr. B. Burrows, of Teignmouth, Devon, arrived on Friday evening. She left England four months ago; visited St. John's, Nfld; then proceeded through the Straits of Belle Isle to Bay of Islands. She registers 64 tons.

The Fourth Sunday-School Convention of the Maritime Provinces will be held at Yarmouth, Nova Scotia, commencing on Saturday, August 20th, at 2 1/2 o'clock, P. M. Arrangements have been made for a reduction of fares on most of the lines of travel leading to Yarmouth.

Steamer *Linda* leaves St. John Friday, Aug. 28th, arriving in Yarmouth Saturday morning. S. S. Delegates by this Steamer go and return for one fare.

The Y. M. C. Association Hall was crowded on Sunday afternoon to hear addresses from Major Corwin of Brooklyn, N. Y., and H. Thane Miller of Cincinnati, who is spending two or three weeks in Halifax.

Symonds' steam yacht *Helena* has been sold to parties in Charlottetown, P. E. I., where she is to be employed as a ferry boat. She has been lengthened to 46 feet re-modelled, and changed from a paddle to a screw steamer.

A meteor of magnificent proportions was seen in the North Western sky on Thursday night. As the earth is now passing through a stream of meteor, such appearances will probably be frequent.

A SHARK was seen in the Eastern Passage on Thursday last.

H. M. S. *Bellerophon* sailed on Tuesday for Quebec. She will probably return about the middle of September. The *Argus*, paddle sloop, is the only ship of war now in port.

RAILWAY EXTENSION.—Ald. Ackhurst and Mr. McNab, C. E., have been valuing the property to be taken by the Dominion Government for the railroad extension into the city.

TERRIBLE COLLIERY ACCIDENT.—TWO MEN FALL DOWN A 900 FEET SHAFT.—A terrible accident occurred on Saturday at the Albion Mines, Stellarton, Pictou county. Two men fell down the pumping shaft of the Ford Pit, 900 feet deep, and were instantly killed. The accident was caused by the breaking of a rope.

ACCIDENT.—Capt. Svang of the bark *Professor Schweegaard* was badly injured at Mahone Bay by the explosion of a gun he was firing off.

We learn from the *Kentville Chronicle* that, on the 6th inst., Abram Bentley, residing at Canning, in a sudden fit of insanity attempted suicide. Medical aid was procured, and he is now pronounced out of danger.

SCOT'S BAY.—Rev. D. Freeman in a brief note refers to the recent death of Mr. Jas. Hatfield at Scot's Bay, in connection with the Shad Fishing there and remarks: "The circumstances will no doubt be ascertained in the coming trial, and justice to all the parties be awarded. The people at the Bay are an intelligent upright and sympathizing community, and feel deeply grieved at the sad result."

SYDNEY, C. B.—A child of Mr. John Boyd was killed a few days ago by a coal wagon running over it at Sydney Mines.

The mackerel have struck into the harbor somewhat plentifully during the past few days.

Capt. Morrison of Arichat, reports fishing on the Banks as very poor, more so than at any time in his experience of 15 years past, he knows of 200 sail of vessels that have been out now for six weeks without a quintal of fish on board.

TRURO.—The investigation into the shooting affair which occurred at Truro last week, has resulted in the commitment of Jotham McCully for trial at the Supreme Court. Bail amounting to \$2000 was accepted for his appearance.

On Sunday last, Rev. Dr. M. McVicar, Principal of the New York State Normal School at Potsdam, N. Y., preached very able sermons, in Granville Street Church in the morning, and in the North Baptist Church in the evening.

On Monday last, a boy named Parsons, 7 years of age, had two of his fingers taken off in a hay-cutter, at Fieswick's stables.

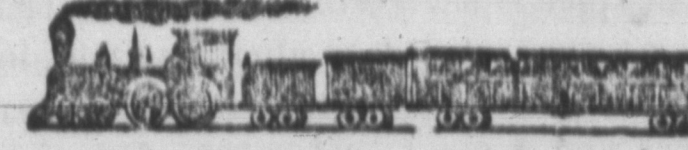
