THE ANNUAL REPORT OF THE ENGLISH BAPTIST MISSIONARY SOCIETY for the year ending March 31, 1874; is a thick pamphlet of 221 pages, and gives a vast mass of information of the proceedings of the Society in the East and West Indies, China, Ceylon, Western Africa, France, Norway and Italy. The Society has in all 87 missionaries, 229 Native Pastors and Evangelists, and 280 Teachers.

During the past year there were 1822 persons baptized on a profession of faith. The membership of the Mission churches amounts to 32444, Day Scholars 12,101; Sunday Scholars 17,701.

The total contributions for the year was £40,255 17s. 9d., or about \$200,000.
