

be produced in the minds of hundreds of men and women toiling in the school room to do noble work amidst most depressing circumstances, and longing for some word of wise counsel and hearty cheer.

No more striking proof can be found of the sagacious benevolence and statesmanship of the men who founded the American colonies than the early provision which they made for education. Eight years after the establishment of the colony of Massachusetts Bay, Howard College was begun. The second American College, that of William and Mary in Virginia, was founded in 1692. Yale was the next, in 1700. Besides these six other colleges were founded before the war of the Revolution, Princeton in 1746, Kings (now Columbia, N. Y.) in 1754, the University of Pennsylvania in 1755, Brown University in 1764, Dartmouth in 1769, and Queens (now Rutgers), in 1770. The Colleges grew up out of the intelligence and generosity of the communities in which they still exist. They were not the offspring of patronage. They were not erected for the people by somebody else; they were erected for the people by themselves. And as they were the result of a multitude of small offerings from the hands of the people, they have always been very near to the hearts of the people. Excepting the Christian Church, no other institution in American has been so much revered, honored and confided in by the American people, as are the colleges of America.—*Professor M. C. Tyler.*

Local News.

HALIFAX RAILWAY DEPOT.—At the meeting in Temperance Hall on Friday evening there was a full and free discussion of the question as to which would be the best site for a Halifax Depot. The following resolution was carried unanimously:—

"Whereas, the future prosperity of the City of Halifax depends upon the Railway extension affording every facility for the increased trade that ought to arise from the completion of the Intercolonial Railway; and

"Whereas to give this facility, it is important that the terminus should be extended as far as possible and on the water level,

"Therefore Resolved, That it is the opinion of this meeting that such extension should be to a point on the water side not further north than the South end of the Dockyard."

The following gentlemen were appointed a committee to act with the Committee of the City Council to take such steps as may be deemed necessary for securing the location of the terminus:—Messrs. Cathcart Thomson, W. Roche, Jr., W. C. Silver, W. Chisholm, W. H. Neal, and Dr. A. P. Reid.

The meeting then adjourned.
NEWS ITEMS are scarce. The snow storms of the past week have kept people so busy that they have had but little leisure for anything else than clearing it away and keeping the fires up and avoiding the avalanches from the roofs.

After the snow on Friday and Saturday it was expected that our harbor would surely be frozen over, but the mild day on Sunday sent it all away and there is nothing to obstruct navigation. Our having no river flowing into Halifax harbor or to bring ice down, a northern breeze soon carries all pieces of floating ice or snow out to sea.

Travelling in our streets is now a pretty difficult operation.

IN A TRANCE.—One of those unpleasant occurrences, which are happily rare, took place on the Range a few days ago. A woman named Mrs. Wright, died to all appearance, and continued thus long enough to allow the arrangements for the funeral being satisfactory completed. Consciousness, however, returned, and the woman lived for twelve hours thereafter. She then died and was buried yesterday.—*Digby Courier.*

ACCIDENT.—The locomotive attached to the Pictou train, due at nine o'clock on Saturday evening, met with an accident when about two miles from Truro. The tire of one of the wheels broke, smashing the running board and plunger, and punching a hole in the boiler. The disabled engine was taken back to Truro and another one brought the train to Halifax.—*Chron.*

At the meeting of the Halifax School Board on Wednesday last the *Chronicle* informs us, Mr. J. E. Irish, on behalf of the Baptist congregation worshipping in Gerrish Hall, applied for leave to hold a Sunday school in the Vinecove school room. Some objection was made on the ground that the granting of the request would be a bad precedent, but one gentleman urged that the schools could be devoted to no better use than to what Mr. Irish proposed. The Board decided to allow the room to be used for the present.

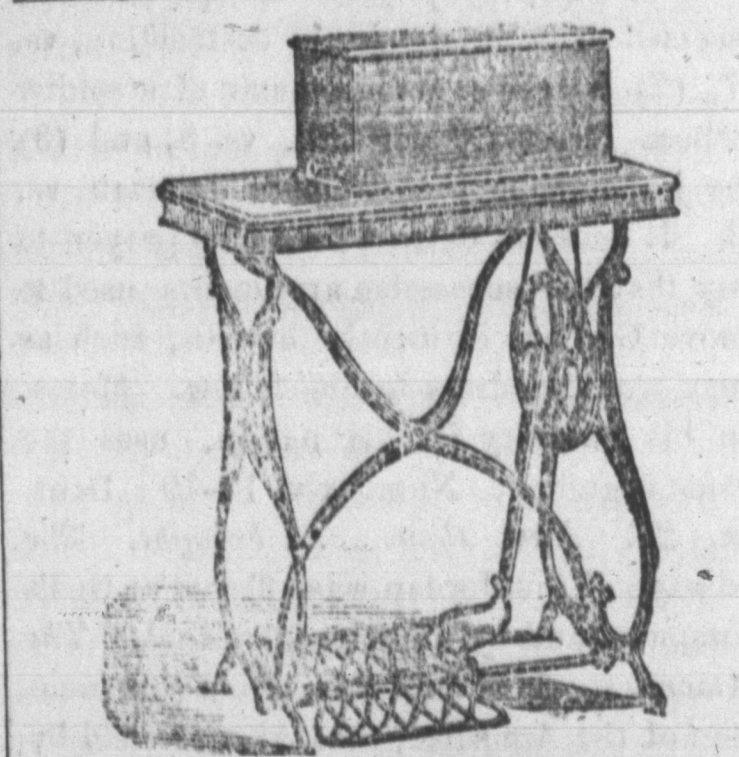

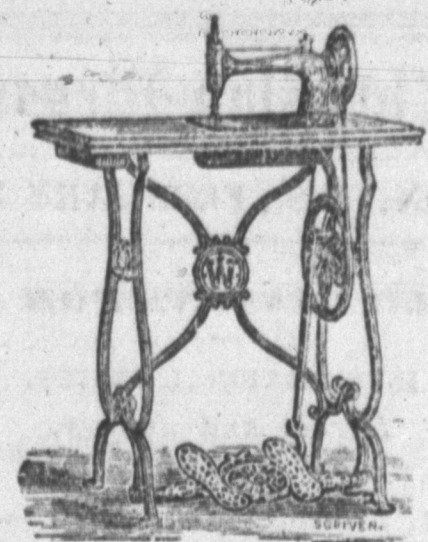
