LOCAL NEWS.

SUPREME COURT.—The criminal side has been a scene of great interest during the past week in the trial of C. T. Watson and C. G. Hampton, charged with robbing the Bank of Nova Scotia on the 1st of August, during the procession of Bannum's show through the Halifax streets. The excitement has been greatly increased by the quarrelsomeness of the counsel during the examination of witnesses which several times greatly interfered with the trial and lengthened out the proceedings.

The first of the Dominion Line of Steamers—the Dominion, 3200 tons arrived here on Thursday last with 1600 tons of cargo for Halifax and Montreal. She discharged at Richmond Depot.

Milton.—On Tuesday night, the 14th, the whole manufacturing establishment of our worthy brother and deacon, J. B. Wyman was destroyed by fire. His loss was very severe, being about \$6,000 and no insurance. Under the present depression of trade it is all the heavier, as it will be felt very much in the neighborhood. The store of Bro. Jos. N. Freeman, adjoining the manufactory, was also entirely destroyed, his loss is about \$2,000. A dwelling house occupied by Mr. Wall, shoemaker, was also burnt, his loss being between 100 or 200 dollars. Much sympathy is felt, and expressed for them and we sincerely hope that such as have the power will with a ready hand help. We are sure that it help be measured by desert it will flow freely.

CLEMENTSVILLE, ANNAPOLIS CO.—From the *Digby Courier* we have an account of a horrible affair—an attempt at wife murder and suicide which occurred here on Monday of last week. It appears that Jesse Henshaw, his wife and son reside on the cross road between the Henshaw and Waldeck lines, and that about midnight, Henshaw called his wife into a private room, and through some cause or other a dispute arose between them, and high words ensued, and at last Henshaw drew from his vest pocket the blade of a razor, and seizing hold of his wife, attempted to cut her throat. A desperate struggle ensued, in which the terrified wife seems to have bravely held her own. Grasping the naked blade in her hands, she succeeded in wrenching it from the grasp of her infuriated husband, and threw it from her beyond his reach. In this struggle for her life, the poor woman received some awful gashes about her hands. The struggle did not end here, however, for the madman, bent on accomplishing his deadly purpose, reached for his hand and seizing the nearest weapon—a dull case knife—he again attempted to cut the throat of his wife, and he even succeeded in inflicting a light scratch on her neck before she succeeded in making her escape from his grasp. The affrighted woman fled from the house and in the meantime the son who had been asleep in an upstairs room, hearing the scuffle, had leaped from the window, and also ran for help. In a short time they returned, having procured the assistance of some of the neighbors. On taking the precaution to look through the window before entering they encountered a horrible sight. Henshaw was seen deliberately sawing at his throat with the same blunt table knife, with which a few minutes earlier he had attempted his wife's life. Henshaw's habits, his sons and others, rushed into the house and took the ugly weapon from his hand. The self-injured man then sat down on the floor, the blood streaming from a horribly lacerated gash in his throat, stretching almost from ear to ear.

Dr. Maxwell had been hurriedly sent for. On examination it was discovered that on the right side of his throat he had succeeded in partially severing the jugular vein, which bled profusely. Dr. Maxwell took the necessary measures for saving the man's life, stitching the wound in six places, and the wound, he is hoped, will recover.

Beyond the gashes on her hands, received in her struggle with her husband, and the necessary excitement consequent on the enactment of such a scene, Mrs. Henshaw is not seriously hurt.

The infuriated man, it is stated, is now thoroughly awake to the terrible nature of his conduct, and laments it deeply.

The steamer Alpha, Bennett master, Boston, for Summerside, P. E. I. with a general cargo was ashore on Friday at Cape Sable. She is owned in Summerside, P. E. I.

A cable message received at Pictou on Thursday from St. Thomas reports that the barkentine Elie D., which left Havre about the 1st, October for Sydney, put in there, having been driven off the coast, and proceeded to Tybee for orders.

A building at Louisburg, owned and occupied by Mr. Cahoon as a general store, was totally destroyed by fire on the evening of the 21st. A portion of the goods were saved.

Several young men have during the past week enlisted in the 87th Regiment. On Thursday one named Collins, on Friday three named respectively, Thos. Walsh, Joseph Wilson and Chas. Connors, on Saturday one named Thos. Brint, and on Monday one Frank Ralph. This is a very unusual circumstance and shows that employment is in demand.

A man named Grono was working on the roof of a shed at the old Richmond depot on Thursday afternoon, when he slipped and fell to the ground, a distance of several feet. One of his arms was dislocated.

A young man named Patrick Phalen, who with others was coaling the steamer Delta, fell down the hold on Wednesday. He struck on his head and became insensible. He remained so up to Thursday morning when he died.
