Last Sabbath, our pastor, the Rev. Mr. Kempton, opened the place by preaching. The house was filled with an attentive congregation, earnestly listening to the word of life.

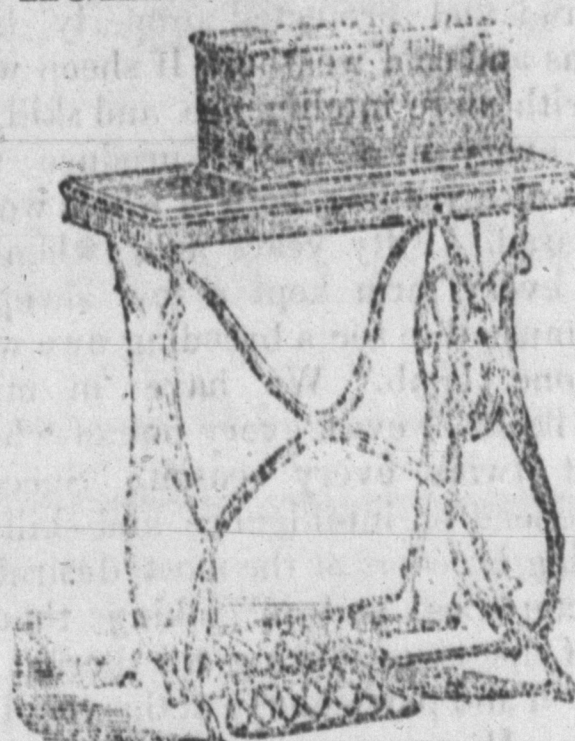
