

At the meeting of the School Board last week, Mr. F. Bowes, of Waterville, Kings County, was appointed principal of the National School, for six months, to be continued should his services prove satisfactory. A night school is to be established at Lehighville, from Nov. 1st, under Mr. Elliot, and continued month by month as long as the attendance shall warrant.

The Board refused to enter into any negotiations with the governors of Dalhousie College or the City Council for the south-end of the Grand Parade for a High School site, but agreed that the City Council be communicated with to see if that portion of the South Common, lying between Spring Garden Road and Morris Street, could be procured for a High School site, provided the sanction of the Legislature could be obtained.

At the City Council meeting on Thursday last a letter from the Secretary of the School Board was read, asking, in accordance with the resolution of that body, that that portion of the Common lying between Spring Garden Road and Morris Street, be sold or leased to them for a High School site. The letter was laid on the table.

Ald. Power moved that the amount asked for by the Commissioners of Common and Public Gardens—\$500—for the maintenance of the Gardens during the winter, be appropriated. After some discussion the motion passed.

It is pleasant to see a diminution in the consumption of Spirits. That on Tobacco and Malt, however, are largely increased. This is a matter of regret.

The Windsor Mail shews the capital sailing qualities of some of the ships built at that place, as follows:

Ship Hannah Morris, with lumber and freight, Captain Dunbar, arrived at Bristol, England, October 30th, making the run from Chatham, N. B., in 20 days. Ship Rhine left Lubec October 3rd and arrived in Liverpool October 26-23 days. Barque Alice Cooper left Chatham, N. B., October 7th and arrived in Liverpool October 25th—19 days. Barque Sultana, Captain Mosher, has made the run from Horton Bluff to New York, and there loaded a cargo of grain, and arrived in Bristol, England, in the short space of 37 days after leaving the Bluff, making the passage from New York to Bristol in 16 days.

By some mistake in the directions given, there was very nearly a collision on the Western Counties Railway line one day last week. The Beaver Bank station agent, conductor and driver of the freight train have been suspended till an investigation takes place.
