THE TECHNOLOGICAL INSTITUTE is about to commence operations in good earnest. On Saturday a preparatory meeting was held and the treasurer reported that 66 students had been enrolled for the several classes. The teachers are as follows:

The Palace Car is at Moncton, receiving extensive improvements, and being repainted to be used by the Marquis of Lorne.

"LORNE" is the name given to the district hitherto known as Big Brook, West Branch, East River, Pictou.

On Tuesday evening, as Mr. Wm. J. Hatfield and wife, of Yarmouth, were about starting from Hebron in their carriage, the horse stepped ahead suddenly and started for the side of the road on which was rather a steep embankment. The carriage was overturned and both occupants were thrown out. Mrs. Hatfield's left arm was broken above the elbow, and she sustained other injuries more or less severe. Mr. H. was badly jarred by his fall, but received no further injury.

COMMITTED FOR TRIAL.—Edwards, the soldier of the 97th Regt., who was arrested on Wednesday night for entering a house at the north end and attempting to steal clothing therefrom, and Davis, another 97th man, who smashed the front windows of M. S. Brown's jewelry shop, were both committed for trial in the Supreme Court on Friday, after examination before the Stipendiary Magistrate.

A quantity of telegraph cable was brought from the steamer Minia on Saturday and placed in a trench on Corbett's wharf. A large quantity of cable which is in the barque John Bull, from Heart's Content, Nfld., will be placed in two large iron tanks to be put in Corbett's dock. The ends of the two lots of cables will be spliced and a room in a store on the wharf used for testing it.

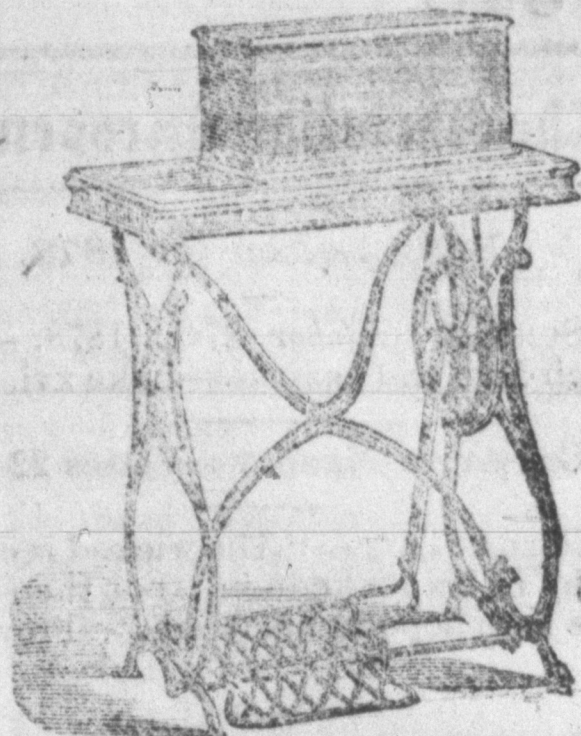
