News.

The Canada Gazette has a list of new Queens' Council appointments. Amongst them is that of George B. Cramp, Esq., second son of the Rev. Dr. Cramp, of Wolfville. Mr. Cramp has a standing of 25 years as a barrister in Montreal.

The Sugar Refinery is so far progressing, that a meeting of the stockholders is called for Tuesday, 30th, to complete the formal organization.

About forty Sable Island Ponies were sent up from Sable Island last week, in the steamer *Newfield*. They were all pretty wild. They were sold at auction and brought prices varying from \$11 to \$51. Some of them were very pretty animals.

The Gilchrist Scholarship has this year been gained by Wm. F. W. Jarvis, of Toronto. Mr. Geo. W. Allen, of New Brunswick, comes next, and Mr. John Waddell, of Nova Scotia, third.

A letter in the *Gazette*, published by command of the Governor General, says: "Six candidates in all presented themselves, viz.: two at Toronto, and one at Kingston, Halifax, Fredericton and Ottawa, respectively. All of these candidates have passed, and passed in the honors' division, so that the Colonial colleges are to be complimented upon having presented, on this occasion, an unusually good set of men."

Mr. Henry Flowers, of the firm of Messrs. G. Flowers & Son, sailmakers, of this city, has received a patent from Ottawa for his new method of reefing ships' sails. The name of the patent is "Diagonal Reefing Sails," which, if used successfully, will create quite a change in the method of handling sails at sea. With Mr. Flowers' patent there is no necessity for going aloft as the sails can be reefed from the deck, and a great deal of time saved thereby. It has been practically tested and is very highly spoken of. In a gale of wind the harder it blows the easier it is for the reefing of the sails to be done.

Montague, about 9 miles from Halifax has been of late, furnishing gold in good quantities to its miners. On Tuesday last the Rose Gold Mining Company sent to Halifax a brick of gold weighing over 397 ounces, valued at about \$7,600. It is represented as the product of the work of, on the average, 14 men for a month. The first crushing from the lead yielded 24 ounces to the ton, the second 5 ounces, and the third (the present) 7 ounces. This company has in three months produced 586 ounces of gold, worth upwards of \$11,000, and as the cost of production has been about \$2,000 it will be seen that they are reaping a rich return. The lead is said to be steadily improving as it is worked.

The Exhibition Building is receiving vast quantities of goods from various parts. The Committee has now removed its office to the Building.

Permission has been given to the Dominion and Western Union Telegraph Companies to open offices in the building, and the Committee authorized to grant the necessary space.

It has been decided that after space for Nova Scotia, exhibits is allotted, any remaining space may be allowed to other Canadian manufacturers.

The offer of Messrs. Macdonald & Co. to fit up one of their patent hot water heating apparatus, in the floral department is accepted.

The Exhibition grounds are to be closed at six o'clock every evening, but the building is to be kept open until 10 o'clock.

The floor of the building has been boarded over.

The painting of the inside of the building is nearing completion, and shows it off to great advantage.

The Decoration Committee were authorized to expend not more than \$100, in the purchase of flags and bunting.

There have been about 4,000 entries made.

The Committee have decided to set apart the room adjoining the Secretary's office for the use of the press representatives. Provincial editors, and representatives of the New Brunswick press will be cordially welcome.

At the opening ceremonies it is understood that His Worship the Mayor will preside, and that His Honor the Lieut. Governor will deliver the opening address. An address is also expected from Hon. S. H. Holmes, Provincial Secretary.

The Halifax School Commissioners had a number of applicants for the situation vacated by Dr. Bayne in the High School.

A resolution was then moved by Mr. Pugh, seconded by Mr. Ackhurst, and adopted, that the names, &c., be referred to the teachers' committee, who should report on the matter at the next meeting of the Board.

It is decided that Latin shall not be taught in the Common Schools—only in the High School.

THE ROWING MATCH between Warren Smith of Halifax and Eyan Morris of Philadelphia, for \$1,000 a side, came off here on Wednesday last. Smith was again victorious, beating his opponent by about four boats length. The excitement had expended itself on the former race between Smith and Ross, and this race excited but comparatively little interest except among the racing and betting fraternity. There was no dispute and both contestants met and shook hands afterwards. A present of \$300 was made up for Morris by his friends the next day. It is said that about \$15,000 were won in bets by Halifax.

On Sunday morning a man named John Bangay, living at Osbourne, Shelburne County, attempted to murder his wife, by striking her several blows with an axe. He then tried to drown himself, but was rescued, and is now under arrest. The woman is not expected to recover. Jealousy is supposed to have been the cause.

EASTERN EXTENSION.—The portion of the Eastern Extension from New Glasgow to Antigonish was opened on Wednesday last. His Honor the Lieutenant Governor, members of the Government, and some of our civic authorities and other gentlemen were present on the occasion and enjoyed the trip. The train consisted of three first-class passenger cars, a luggage and smoking car, drawn by the locomotive "Antigonish" handsomely decorated with flags.

The road is described as having its cuttings 22 feet wide and embankments 16 feet. The bridges are of wood. Sutherland's River bridge, the largest, is 160 feet span; French River, 80 feet; the two branches of Barney's River, 75 and 80 feet; James River, 80 feet; Yankee Grant, 80 feet. There is also a trestle bridge at Pine Tree Gut, near New Glasgow.

There are no station buildings on the road yet, but the stations have been located and marked by fences. They are as follows:—(the distance given being from New Glasgow)—Glenfalloch, 5 1/2 miles; Merigomish, 9 1/2 miles; French River, 13 1/2 miles; Peidmont, 18 1/2 miles; Avondale, 22 miles; Barney's River, 24 miles; Marshy Hope, 28 miles; James' River, 32 miles; Bailey's Brook, 36 1/2 miles; Murphy's Mills, 41 1/2 miles. The last named was the station at which the train stopped at 2 45 p. m.; sharp on time, having made the 41 1/2 miles from New Glasgow inside of an hour and three quarters, about a mile from Antigonish town. The regular station for Antigonish, which is also some distance from the town, is further on, at a place called Trotter's Mills; but as there is a heavy bridge this side of it, which is unfinished, the Murphy's Mill station will be used for the present.

The excursion seems to have been a very pleasant one. After the lunch in McDonald's Hall at Antigonish various loyal and patriotic toasts were given, and spoken to by Lieutenant Governor Archibald, Messrs. S. H. Holmes and J. S. Thompson, Abbot, Mayor Tobin, Chancellor Hill, A. C. Bell, and W. B. Vail.

It would seem that by some want of consideration the car in which the parties from Halifax were returning from New Glasgow, it was coupled on to a coal train, and by that means the Lieutenant Governor and other dignitaries to the number of about twenty were detained on the road all night much to their disgust and inconvenience. The *Herald* very properly gives them a sound rebating. Somebody is surely much to blame.

At LUNenburg a sudden death occurred on Friday last under peculiar circumstances. A young girl, about fourteen years old, named Sophia McLachlan, was accused on Tuesday of stealing a sum of money, about one hundred dollars, from a lady who employed her as sewing girl. The accusation evidently preyed upon her mind and health, and she died suddenly on Friday morning. She protested her innocence to the last. An inquest was held in the afternoon before Coroner Jost. Medical evidence indicated as the cause of death paralysis of the heart, induced probably by strong excitement. A verdict was rendered in accordance with the facts.

ANNAPOLIS AND ST. JOHN.—On and after the 24th the steamer between St. John and Annapolis will leave the former place for the latter on Monday, Wednesday and Saturday; and Annapolis to return on Tuesday, Wednesday and Saturday.

A LARGE SHIP.—The *Yarmouth Herald* gives the following description of a large ship launched at Tusket on Thursday last. Her dimensions are: 209 feet keel, 40 feet beam, 24 feet depth of hold; she is 1668 tons, carpenters' measurement, and 1600 tons register, and is named the *William Law*. She is to be rigged and fitted for sea at Yarmouth.
