

ly execute the commands of newly appointed Governors General, virtually extending the military regime to the whole empire. It is intended to send 12,000 prisoners with their families from Novgorod to Siberia during the summer.

Berlin bombs are exploded in St. Petersburg daily.

AUSTRIA.—A violent hurricane at Szegein on Tuesday destroyed the works prepared for restoring the railway and filling breaches in dams. Barge filled with building material and earth sank. The storm caused extensive fresh breaches in railway embankments, and laborers are in great danger. Relief has been sent to them.

The work of closing gaps in the dykes at Szegein is not yet finished. The waters have risen in that town, re-occupying some of the ground already dry.

PERSIA.—An earthquake at Mianch, on the 22nd March, destroyed 21 villages 922 persons, 3964 sheep, oxen horses and camels.

TURKEY.—The Porte has opened negotiations with Russia regarding the transfer of the administration of Roumelia, and will probably assent to a continuance, for a short time of Russian administration.

The inhabitants of Lebanon have petitioned the Powers, declaring that civil war is inevitable if Rusten Pasha is retained in the Governorship.

EGYPT.—The Khedive's emissary informed the Porte that the Khedive refuses to assent to the appointment of foreigners as Ministers of Finance and Public Works, but would make other concessions to meet the wishes of France and England.

AFRICA.—A letter from Zanzibar announces the arrival of Henry M. Stanley, with M. Dutalis, officer in command of the Belgian expedition, in Africa. Stanley will act as guide and interpreter. Plan of operation unknown.

A despatch from Cape Town on the 15th ult. says, Dubalmanzi, who led the attack of Gingleova on the 3rd inst., and other chiefs with large armies following, have proffered submission. Lord Chelmsford promised them personal safety and possession of their cattle, but said pending the termination of the war they would be located on British territory. John Dunn having pledged his word for their safety, the chiefs are expected in at once.

The head of the intelligence department has moved from Grayton to meet representatives from Cetawayo, but the sincerity of his proposals is suspected.

Everything portends an early peace. Meanwhile the war operations are actively proceeding, and an advance on the King's Kraal seems certain from Colonel Wood's direction, whether peace is offered or not.

An universal hope is entertained that the resignation of Sir Bartle Frere will not be accepted. As regards Lord Chelmsford every kindly allowance is made for his conduct of the war, but public opinion remains as adverse as ever.

INDIA.—Serious disturbances are reported at Dakashan. Negotiations with Yakob Khan are progressing favorably. A decisive answer is expected in a few days. The British have asked the cessation of the Khyber and Kurum Passes and permission to maintain a resident at Cabul.

Despite the peaceful desires of the ministers of the King of Burmah, the mass of the people are in favor of war. Troops are being despatched to the frontier in detachments of a thousand at a time.

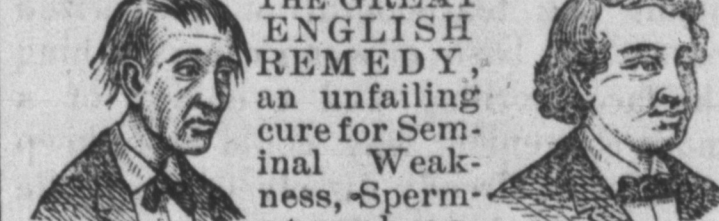

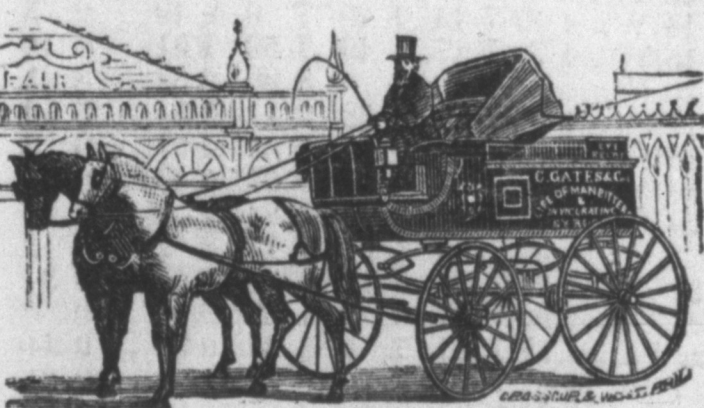
