

the rarity of christian charity under the sun!" The illicit dealer committed a greater injury against his fellow man than the postal clerk who robbed a few letters, yet he was sympathized with and assisted in evading the law. What was wanted was the most stringent measures to ensure that this law should be enforced and not evaded. He thought the proposed clause was not too stringent, and he would vote for its adoption.

Mr. Van Blarcomsail, the law of the land legalized the liquor trade and made it a legitimate business, and the effect of the law was to protect the legitimate trader, if he was not mistaken, as the legitimate seller must be benefited by making the provisions against illicit selling as stringent as possible.

Mr. Pugh said he had not a word to say in favor of the illicit trader, but he thought that those legitimately engaged in the business had a great many hardships to contend with. The hon. members for Lunenburg and for Liverpool could, if they choose, have the Dunkin Act adopted in their counties and prohibit the sale of liquor in the county entirely, but those hon. gentlemen were now passing laws affecting the whole province and the city of Halifax. He had no objection to their confining their legislation to Lunenburg or Liverpool, but they had no right to bring it here.

Mr. T. Smith said he did not want to interfere with the men who had a license and who sold in accordance with its terms, and it could not be said that the law was unfair to the men who sold illegally. The violation of the law must be stopped in some way.

Mr. LeBlanc said he thought it was a very hard case that the Government should allow liquor to be imported, impose a very large duty on it, and then prevent it from being sold. He thought the proposed clause was very severe.

Hon. Prov. Secretary said he thought himself that the laws relating to the sale of intoxicating liquors were very stringent. If further legislation was to be adopted he thought it was time the House carried the principles of the existing laws to their logical conclusion, and punished the buyer as well as the seller. The person who bought was even worse than the one who sold, as he invited the other to commit the offence. The law at present imposed penalties he thought sufficiently stringent to suit the most ardent temperance man, and the clause now proposed went too far, and would become an instrument of tyranny instead of a valuable aid to the cause of temperance.

After some further discussion the question was taken, when there appeared for the motion, 13; against it, 16.

The remaining clause of the bill was passed without amendment.

Mr. Gayton said he had a number of additional clauses to propose that had been unanimously approved of by the Committee on Temperance.

The first clause was then read, providing that the penalty for violation of the law should be imprisonment in addition to a money fine.

Hon. Atty. Gen. said it would be equally in the power of the House to propose that the offender should be sent to the penitentiary for life. The House might as well assume the whole authority of criminal legislation.

Mr. Gayton said there was a lawyer on the Temperance Committee, and the objection had not been raised before that committee.

Hon. Atty. Gen. said he did not wish the hon. member for Yarmouth to take his word as to the proposed clause being *ultra vires*. The matter could stand over to enable the hon. member to advise with other legal gentlemen.

On THURSDAY, after some routine business and various correspondence had been laid on the table,

Mr. Gayton said he had been looking over the temperance legislation of yesterday and the only remaining clause to be disposed of was one to make all the enactments apply to Halifax the same as to the other parts of the province and he thought that perhaps it would not be wise to press this clause.

Mr. Kinney called attention to defects in the assessment law and gave notice of motion on the subject.

On FRIDAY Mr. Shaffner, in presenting the report of the Committee on Agriculture, spoke to good effect of the progress that is being made in its various branches, especially in stock raising.

Hon. Prov. Secretary moved that a Committee be appointed to prepare an address to the Dominion Government on the financial condition of the province. The motion was unanimously adopted and Messrs. Bell, Gayton, and Pugh were named.

Hon. Provincial Secretary introduced a bill providing for County Corporations. It was read a first time.

The House was in Committee on Bills the remainder of the day.

On SATURDAY the office of Law Clerk in the Legislative Council was under consideration. A motion was made to adjourn the office.

A number of local bills were read in Committee.

On Monday the County Incorporation Bill—giving each county the right to become a municipality and govern itself—passed its second reading by a vote of 28 to 7.

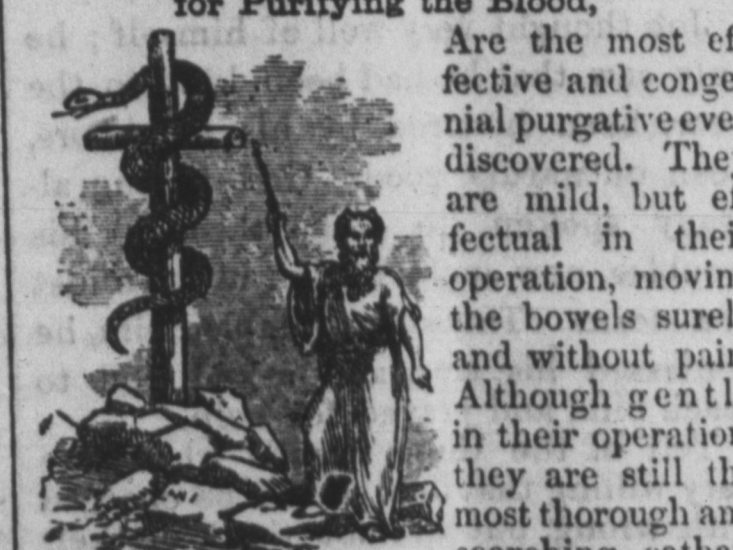
