

Resident at Mandalay, is that the latter protects and refuses to deliver up to slaughter two Royal Princes and their families, refugees at the Residency. The King of Burmah, mad with drink, urged by fanatics and the reactionary party, threatens to force the Residency. Such a hostile measure, on the part of the Government, it is believed would be the signal for a general massacre of Europeans.

EGYPT.—The joint note of the English and French Governments telegraphed to Egypt March 8th, includes the right of Ministers De Bligneres and Wilson conjointly to veto all measures they may disapprove.

INDIA.—Despatches received from Cabul since the death of Shere Ali, announced that tranquility reigns there. Yokoob Khan was proclaimed Ameer at the capital.

Late news from India announces the marriage of Rev. James Fraser Campbell, to Miss Forrester, daughter of the late Dr. Forrester. Mr. Campbell was formerly laboring at Richmond. He went to India three or four years ago. Miss Forrester went out to India last year. Both were missionaries laboring in connection with the Presbyterian Church of Canada.

A young man named Paw, who had been for several years one of the clerks in the Halifax Post Office, was detected on Saturday evening last abstracting money from a letter. He is under arrest and will doubtless be committed for trial. He has been led to this by an irregular life and indulging in drinking.

At Mount Hope Asylum on Saturday afternoon a man named Edward O'Neill was out on the grounds walking; and finding the attendant's back turned, by some means he escaped, and, it is supposed, jumped off the wharf. His hat was afterwards found in the water. Diligent search was immediately made in the water, but he was not discovered. He had been very melancholy and wanted others to kill him, but never attempted injury to himself.

Mrs. Hunt, belonging to Quebec, a passenger on board the Allan steamer *Sardinian* from Liverpool, G. B., to this port, died on board that ship on Friday, the day before the ship arrived. Her son arrived here from Quebec on Friday to meet his mother.

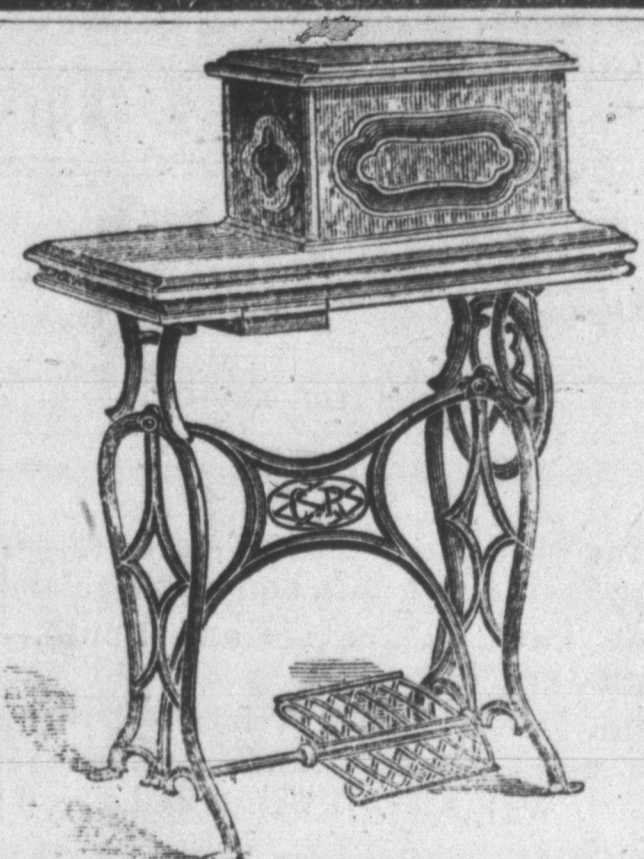
